He 17th instant came into this Port a ship of Haure de Grace, laden with Fish from the Bank; about 14 dayes since they were severely tost at sea in a violent long tempest, which had forced them so far out to sea, that their Victuals sailing, they were reduced to great wants; which would have obliged them to have tun themselves on shoar for relief, had not they fortunately lighted here on an Harbour.

On Saurday last was cast away about the Lizard a ship belonging to Nemca, ile, laden with Spanish Wines, the Master and one man lost, with the greatest part of the Trainby.

Here are lately come in the Pallican of London and Batchellor of Tarmouth, both laden with Wines and bound for London; the William of London intende, for Virginia, and leveral other Vessels outwards bound.

The 24th instant about 14 sail of Merchant ships homewards bound for several Ports of England, put out to sea with a favourable wind.

Madrid, Jan. 9. Venice, Jan. 11. Before the departure of this Ship from Smirna, there were arrived twelve Turkish Gallies of the Fleet under the Command of the Captain Bassa, upon shich were to embark 800 Janisaries, for the re-information of the Visiers Army, and 4000 other soldiers were expected also to be sent out of Natolia for the same service.

Letters of the 25th past from Zante, inform us, that the Holland Convoy was departed thence, on their Way for Smirña, as were the Auxiliaries for Candia) and that the German forces were there embarked upon three Ships, and lay onely in expectation of the arrival of Cavalier Moxosini, who was ro undertake their Conduct into Candia

The Popes Nuncio having been lately indisposed, little progress has been yet made in the Sale of those Religious Houses and Revenues, granted by the Pope to this Republick, to be emploied in the carrying on the War against the Turks.
