Dantsick, Jan. 12. The Moscovite seems not so pressing as formerly to perswade the Electors to savour the young Prince Lis Son in the approaching Election, expecting that what he has already proposed as advantageous to the Kingdom of Poland, will sufficiently convince the publick of the conveniency of promoting him to the Crown; yet are his storces more and more draving towards the Frontiers of Lythnania, which gives the Poles no little jealousse that he intends to make use of the Sword, as a stringer Argument to perswade the Electors to conclude in his savour.

In the meantime our Letters from Kiga in Livenia inform us, that Count Tot, the Governour of that Countrey, having some apprehensions of the intentions of the Moscovite, is putting all places under his Command into a posture of defence, reinforcing all his Garrisons; into which he draws such Companies of Swedes as are daily sent thither for

the guard of that Province.

The Arcl billiop and Grandees of Poland are not yet refolved what answer they shall return to the Demands of the Coffacks on this fide the Borifihenes whose Deputies urge strongly that their General Dorosensko be admitted into the Diet, with power to give his Suffrage in the enfuing Election; the Poles being unwilling to disoblige that people in the present conjuncture of aff irs, and as unwilling to reestablish them in their old Priviledge, which by later Agreements hath been laid aside and taken away: in the mean zime the Cossacks beyond the Boristhenes, having degraded the said Dorosensko from his Command as Genera', and charged him with Treason, have sent their Letters to the Officers and Commanders of the Polith Army, defiring them that no be ief or authority be given to whatever shall be proposed by the other Cossacks.

Hambourgh, Jan 22. This day was folemnly enterted here the lately deceased Envoy from the Prince Elector

Palatine.

The Emperour has prohibited all new levies both here and in other places, but especially such as were to have been set on, foot for the P ince Palatine or Duke of Lorrain, with a severe penalty upon such as shall direct y or indirectly supply them with Arms, ammunition, or any other

provision for the Warr.

From Gottenbourgh they write, that a confiderable part of that City is lately deflroyed by Fire 3 and from Stockholme, that the Crown of Swedeland has granted feveralpriviledges to the Citty of Landferson in Scania, as a Fair for Horses, exemption from customes upon all materialis for building, a grant of the Revenue of the Isle of Weenen, to be employed for the bringing in of fresh water into their Towne, freedome from Quartering Souldiers so soon as the Cittadel shall be, finished, liberty for He ring-fishing upon the coasts, exemption from payments upon the importation of Timber, Cordage and other materials for Shiping, the priviledge of Coyning monies, liberty to build a Datch Church, towards which his Majelly gives t'em 600 Rixdollers, and an abatement of cultomes upon all merchandiles that shall be exported thence, besides which, his Majesty will be at the charge of maintaining their ports, will allow liberty of conscience in the Isle of Weenen, and oblige his ships to buy their provisions of them.

From Ratisbanne we are told that the French Minister continues in the name of the King his Master, to press for an answer to his demand of admission into the Assembly of the States of the Empire, to which he puts in his claim by vertue of their late conquests in the Netherlands, which as they pretend, renders him a member of the ci-

ele of Burgundy.

Plymouth, Jan. 26. Yesterday arrived here the Mary and Jane of London in 11 Weeks from Jamaica, which they lest in a peaceable and thriving condition. The Dartmouth Fregate is still in this Port, with several Merchant ships bound for London and other Ports, expecting a fair wind.

Portsmouth, Jan. 29. The Portland Fregat which some time since sayled hence to attend the Prince of Instant for his transportation from Corunna into England, was off the Lizard severely handled by a violent storm, which much entammaged her Masts and forced her to put into Moants-Bay, from whence she put back again hither to refir: The Milford Fregat has since received orders, and is sayled upon the same Errant, and may be followed by the Portland in case she can be timely resisted, for the better accommodation of that Prince.

Deal, Jan. 30. There are now riding in the Downs the Roebuck and Dartmonth, two of His Majesties Men of War, with 7 or 8 Merchant ships, intending some of them for Malaga and the Coasts of Spain, others for several of our American Plantations; with sour other ships returned homewards from Gallipoli, the Canaries, Oporto, and Rochelle.

The Gainy ship which first ran on ground and af erwards fell on fire upon the Goodwins, was beyond expectation by the Wind and Tyde turned up upon the highest part of those Sands; so that several Boats having been sent out to attend her, have saved a considerable part of her

Lading.

London, Jan. 30. On Wednesday last arrived here upon one of His Majesties Yachts Sir Edward Spragge, on his return from his Employment as Envoye from His Majesty to the Constable of Castille, to complement him upon his Entry upon the Government of the Spanish Netberlands.
