WE Your Majesties most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects humbly beg leave to Congratulate Your Majesties Happy Return to the People, and to acknowledge the blessed effects of Your great Power and Conduct, which we now enjoy in an Honourable Peace, which we have our Religion and Liberties confirmed and secured; That Cause which Your Majesty at first generously espoused, and for which You have since so often hazarded Your Royal Person; This we cannot but remember with the utmost Sense of Duty and Gratitude, and we do Solemnly assure Your Majesty (never may have been Suggested to the contrary) that we are in all occasions ready to Support and Defend Your Majesty's Right and Title to the Crown against all Your Enemies whatsoever.

Venice, Dec. 7. The advices come this Week from the Levant inform us, that the Venetian Men of War and Gallies were laid up for the Winter at *Napoli di Romania*, except some light Ships who were still cruising in the Archipelago; That the Venetian Forces are all gone into Quarters: And the Captain-General *Molimo* was preparing for his return hither, intending to embark, so soon as Signior *Cornaro* his Successor arrived there, who passed by *Zant* with 4 Men of War and several Transport-ships laden with Provisions, in the beginning of the last Month. We have an account from *Dalmatia*, that 600 Morlaques had made an Incur- sion into the Enemies Territories; where they had burnt several Villages; and made a very good Booty; and that there is a general Consternation among the Turks, occasioned by the defeat of their Army in *Hungary* this last Campaign, which they look upon as a greater blow to them; than any other they have received since this War. Commissions are given out for raising several new Troops for the Service of this Republick, against the next Summer, which will be sent to reinforce their Army in the *Mores*.

Warsaw, Dec. 4. Preparations are made here for the Kings Reception, who is expected from *Crotow* in 10 days or a Fortnight, and soon after his arrival Circular Letters will be issued for Summoning a General Dyer to meet in this City in the beginning of February. Greatest part of the Saxon Forces are quartered in *Prussia*, that they may be ready to give assistance to the City of *Dantzicke*, as there may be occasion. The Cardinal Primate continues at *Lowitz*; The Gentlemen that lately resorted to him there, have all left him, and most have made their Submissions to the King. Prince *Sapieha* with his whole Family is entred into the King's Interests, and his Example has prevailed with others of the Principal Nobility in *Lithuania* to do the like, so that whole Duchy is now united under his Majesty's Obedience. The Minister of *Brandenburgh* who has been very useful in his Majesty's affairs, does at present endeavour to bring off the Primate from the Engagements, to which he has hitherto adhered, and the encouragement he has received in what has already passed between them, gives him hopes of a good success. The last Letters from the Frontiers say, the Tartars are marching to supply *Caminiec* with Provisions and what else may be necessary for that Garrison, and that the Crown General has ordered some Troops to be sent out to observe them.

Vienna, Dec. 7. Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* is shortly expected here from *Germany*, and when he arrives a great Council of War will be held, to consider of the Preparations to be made for the War against the Turks, which is intended to be prosecuted with greater Vigor than ever. The King of *Spain* has sent the Order of the Golden Fleecce to the Arch-Duke *Charles* the Emperor's Second Son, and on Thursday last was performed the Ceremony of investing him with it. The Deputy of the States of *Transylvania* continue still here, to adjust several matters relating to the Winter-Quarters and Subsistence for the Imperial Forces, lodged in that Country. The last Letters from *Croatia* tell us, another Party of the Militia of that Country have made an Incur- sion into *Bosnia*.

Hamburgh, Dec. 20. Monsieur *de Bonrepos*, who has resided several years at the Court of *Denmark* as Ambassador from *France*, arrived here on Tuesday last from *Copenhagen*, going with the same Character to *Holland*; and yesterday he was Complimented, and presented with Wine by the Magistrates of this City as usually. The Dutchess Dowager of *Holstein* with the Princess her Daughter are gone for *Stockholme*, to make a visit to the Queen Mother of *Sueden*. Monsieur *Bidal*, who before the War, was resident here, from the most

Christian King, is now returning hither in the same Quality, and expected in few days.

Kensington, Dec. 21. His Majesty having received Letters from the most Christian King and the Dauphin, to acquaint him with the Duke of *Burgundy's* Marriage, His Majesty has appointed the Duke of *St. Albans*, one of the Lords of His Bed Chamber, to return the Compliment; and his Grace will be going in 2 or 3 days to *France*.
