liament passed in the session holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 106, and the second and third years of Her said late Majesty's reign, Chapter 49, the said extra parochial district of Little Kelk may be advantageously annexed to the said benefice of Lowthorpe with Ruston Parva for ecclesiastical purposes.

"7. That pursuant to the directions contained in the 26th section of the first mentioned Act the saild Archbishop has prepared a Scheme in writing appended to this Report describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration above proposed may be best effected. And the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with such Scheme he doth by this Report to Your Majesty in Council certify the same to Your Majesty together with the consent in writing to the said Scheme of the patron and incumbent of the said parish of Lowthorpe with Ruston Parva to the intent that Your Majesty in Council in case it should be thought expedient and proper so to do may make an Order for carrying such Scheme into effect.

And whereas the said Scheme drawn up by the said Archbishop and the Consents referred to in the said Report are as follows:—

" SCHEME.

- "1. That the said extra parochial district of Little Kelk edged round with red on the plan attached hereto shall be annexed to the said parish of Lowthorpe with Ruston Parva for ecclesiastical purposes.
- "2. That the Vicar of Lowthorpe with Ruston Parva shall have exclusive cure of souls in and over the said district so transferred.
- "3. That all ecclesiastical dues fees and emoluments within or in respect of the said district of Little Kelk shall henceforth belong to and be received by the Vicar of the parish of Lowthorpe with Ruston Parva.
- "4. That the patronage of the said benefice of Lowthorpe with Ruston Parva shall not be altered.
- "5. That subject to the provisions of the Compulsory Church Rates Abolition Act, 1868, the inhabitants of the said district of Little Kelk shall in future be liable for the repair of the parish church of Lowthorpe as are the other inhabitants of the said parish.
- "6. That the inhabitants of the said district of Little Kelk shall henceforth be entitled to accommodation in the parish church and churchyard of Lowthorpe aforesaid in the same way as are the other inhabitants of the said parish of Lowthorpe.

" Consents.

"I, William Henry St. Quintin, of Scampston Hall, York, the true and undoubted patron or person entitled to present to the Vicarage of Lowthorpe with Ruston Parva in the County and Diocese of York were the same now vacant, and the Reverend Felix Amcoats incumbent of the same Vicarage do hereby respectively signify our assent to the foregoing Report and Scheme.

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the said Scheme be carried into effect.

WHEREAS the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William, by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of York, has, under Section 26 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, made a Report to His Majesty in Council, in the following terms:—

- "1. That there is in the County and Diocese of York the new Vicarage of Selby the boundaries of which are well known and defined.
- "2. That there is also in the said County and Diocese of York the Vicarage of Barlby the boundaries whereof are well known and defined and include the two areas edged round with red on the plan annexed hereto and known as New Barlby and The Holmes respectively.
- "3. That according to the last census the population of the parish of Selby was 7,029 persons and that of the parish of Barlby including the said two districts of New Barlby and The Holmes was 2,615 persons.
- "4. That that part of the parish of Barlby which is known as The Holmes is situated at a considerable distance from the parish church of Barlby and is separated therefrom by the river Ouse and is contiguous to and at a very short distance from the Abbey Church of Selby which is capable of affording accommodation for the inhabitants living within that district.
- "5. That that part of the parish of Barlby which is known as New Barlby is also situated at a considerable distance from the parish church of Barlby and the greater part of it is quite close to the Abbey Church of Selby being actually separated therefrom by the river Ouse and it will be for the greater convenience
