Acts, 1894 to 1927, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

Authorisation of Landing of an Animal for Exceptional Purposes.

1. The landing of the animal described in the First Schedule hereto, is hereby allowed subject to the provisions of Part II (Quarantine) of the Third Schedule to the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894, and of the Foreign Animals (Quarantine) Order of 1896, and of this Order.

Definition of Quarantine Station.

2. The premises described in the Second Schedule hereto are hereby defined as a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station for the purpose of the detention of the animal described in the First Schedule hereto.

Examination before Landing.

3. No such animal as aforesaid shall be landed except with a licence granted by an Inspector of the Ministry, which licence shall not be granted unless and until the animal has been examined by a Veterinary Inspector of the Ministry and certified by him to be free from symptoms of contagious disease.

Regulations applicable to the Animal on Landing.

4. The animal on being landed, shall forthwith be moved direct from the quay to the premises described in the Second Schedule hereto, and shall be there detained for a period of twenty-eight days. During the movement from the quay to the said premises and during the said period of detention the animal shall be kept separate from all other animals and no other animals shall be moved into such premises.

FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE (INFECTED AREAS) ORDER OF 1929 (No. 26).

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1927, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

Contraction of Cadder (Lanarkshire) Footand-Mouth Disease Infected Area.

1. The Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Infected Areas) Order of 1929 (No. 25) as amended by the Order of the Minister (No. 4759) dated the 11th September, 1929, shall be read and have effect as if the Area described in the Schedule to this Order were substituted for the Footand-Mouth Disease Infected Area described in the Schedule to the first-mentioned Order.

Revocation of Certain Orders.

2. The Orders of the Minister (Nos. 4760 and 4761), respectively dated the 15th and 16th September, 1929, relating to the holding of special markets of fat stock at Glasgow Market are hereby revoked.

Commencement and Short Title.

3. This Order shall come into operation on the twenty-seventh day of September, nineteen hundred and twenty-nine, and may be cited as the FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE (INFECTED AREAS) ORDER OF 1929 (No. 26).

An Area comprising :—

In the county of Lanark.

The Municipal Wards of Springburn, Cowlairs, Provan, Cowcaddens, Woodside, Ruchill and Maryhill in the city of Glasgow; the parish of Cadder, and that part of the parish of Glasgow which lies outwith the city boundary.

In the county of Dunbarton.

The burgh of Kirkintilloch;

The parish of Kirkintilloch, and so much of the parish of New Kilpatrick as lies to the east of the road from Strathblane to Maryhill via Bankend (but not including any part of the burgh of Milngavie).

In the county of Stirling.

The parishes of Baldernock and Campsie, and so much of the burgh and parish of Kilsyth as lies to the west of the road from St. Ninians
