In pursuance of an Act for better preserving the Navigation of the River Mersey (5 and 3 Vic., cap. 110), We, the Liverpool Corporation Electric Supply Department, 24, Hatton Garden, Liverpool, hereby give you notice that we propose to construct at the Clarence Dock, in accordance with Plans and Sections deposited at the Office of the Mersey Conservancy, a Screening Chamber, in concrete, on the site of the embayment outside the present entrance to the Clarence Half Tide Dock, for cooling water in connection with the new electrical power station, and to bring the River Wall into alignment with the existing River Wall immediately northward and southward thereof by means of either a concrete wall or a concrete duct supported on concrete piles.

ORDER OF THE MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 5TH OCTOBER, 1929.)

FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE (INFECTED AREAS) ORDER OF 1929 (No. 27).

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1927, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

Further Contraction of Cadder (Lanarkshire)
Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Area.

1.—(1) The Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Infected Areas) Order of 1929 (No. 25) as amended by the Order of the Minister (No. 4759), dated the 11th September, 1929, and the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Infected Areas) Order of 1929 (No. 26), shall be read and have effect as if the Area described in the Schedule to this Order were substituted for the Infected Area described in the Schedule to the last-mentioned Order.

(2) This Article shall come into operation on the eleventh day of October, nineteen hun-

dred and twenty-nine.

Release of Infected Area from Restrictions.

2. The Area described in the Schedule to this Order shall cease to be an Infected Area for the purposes of the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Infected Areas Restrictions) Order of 1925, as from the eighteenth day of October, nineteen hundred and twenty-nine.

Short Title.

3. This Order may be cited as the FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE (INFECTED AREAS) ORDER OF 1929 (No. 27).

An Area comprising:

In the county of Dunbarton.

The burgh of Kirkintilloch; and so much of the parish of Kirkintilloch as lies to the west of the road from Gavell to Mollinburn via Twechar.

In the county of Lanark.

So much of the parish of Cadder as lies within and generally to the north of the following boundary, namely:—

Commencing at a point on the Kirkintilloch -Cadder parish boundary where it is crossed by the road from Easter Bedcow, thence following the said road in a southerly and then generally westerly direction via Muckcroft, Davidston, Blacklands, Auchinloch, Cardyke, Lumloch and Old Auchinairn to the point where it is met by the road leading to Myriemailing; thence following the latter road in a generally northerly direction via Myrie-mailing and South Crosshill and continuing along Wester Cleddens Road to its junction with the main Kirkintilloch-Glasgow road; thence southerly for a short distance along the last-mentioned road, thence turning west along Balmuildy Road; thence northerly along the road past Jelly Hill Cottages and Hilton Farm to the point where the road turns west at the extreme south-west corner of Cawder
