**T**HE 22th Instant the Duke and Dutcheſs of Savoy were complimented by the Publick Miniſters and Perſons of Quality here, on the Marriage of the Princeſs their Daughter to the Duke of Burgundy; and the 3 following days were ſpent in publick Rejoycings and Divertiſements.

*Warsaw, Jan. 7.* The King of Poland is not yet arrived here, but expected in 2 or 3 days, having in his Journey ſtopped at ſeveral Gentlemen's Houſes, and been very ſplendidly Entertained by them. The Biſhop of Raab, who was here at the time of the Election with the Character of Ambaſſador Extraordinary from the Emperor, and has been ſince at Vienna, is returned hither, and very much labours to bring the Primate over to the Kings Intereſt, though hitherto the Endeavours that have been uſed of this kind have had little ſucceſs. The Primate in the mean time continues at Lowitz, and it's ſaid he has received Letters by an Expreſs from France, which encourage him in his Reſolution to adhere to the Intereſts he has hitherto eſpouſed. The Advices from the Frontiers give an account, that the Cham of Tartary, according to the Summons he has received from the Grand Signior, is gone to Adrianople to aſſiſt at a Great Council of War that is to be held there.

*Vienna, Jan. 8.* This Court being reſolved to go on the War againſt the Turks with all the Vigour poſſible, the preparations for the next Campaigne are made with great diligence, and they talk of opening the Campaigne early the next year with ſome conſiderable Siege, to which they are not a little encouraged by the repeated Advices that come from Turkey, of the ill Condition the Ottoman Forces are reduced to, and the Probability they will have to bring a good Army into the Field the next Summer. The Turks themſelves ſeem ſenſible of this, and apprehenſive that the Germans have a deſign upon Belgrade; and therefore they do particularly apply themſelves to put that place into the beſt Condition of Defence that is poſſible: At the ſame time the Chief Miniſters at the Ottoman Court have perſuaded the Sulcan to lay aſide all thoughts of Peace, ſaying they cannot think of making it but upon very diſadvantageous Terms at this time: And Orders have thereupon been ſent to all the Provinces of that Empire to raiſe Men, and the more to encourage and promote theſe Levies the Sultan has declared, that he will himſelf go again into the Field, and has cauſed the Standard of Mahomet to be expoſed to publick View, which is only done at times when the Affairs of that Empire are under great Difficulties and Diſtreſs. The

States of the Lower-Austria are to meet here the next week, as uſually, moſt of the Deputies being already come to Town. The Moſcovite Prince Kemeret will depart in 2 or 3 days for Italy, and has not only received a Satisfactory Answer to the Letter he preſented to the Emperor from the Czar his Maſter, but will carry with him Letters of Recommendation from the Miniſters of this Court to the Emperor's Ambaſſadors at Rome and Venice. Count Caunitz the firſt of the Emperor's Ambaſſadors at the Treaty of Peace is arrived here from Holland, and in a day or two will take the uſual Oath of Vice-Chancellor of the Empire, which Office the Emperor conferred upon him during his Reſidence at the Hague. Prince Montecuculi died here yeſterday; He was Lieutenant General of the Emperor's Forces, Captain of his Guard of Archers, and Colonel of a Regiment of Horſe.

*Francfort, Jan. 15.* The French have not yet fixed any time for the evacuating of Philipsburgh, but we expect they will now do it in very few days, and the German Regiments who are to go into Garifon there, lie ready to march upon the firſt Orders.

*Cologne, Jan. 17.* We have Advices from Straſbourg of the 10th, that the Intendant de la Grange was arrived there with Orders for demolishing the Works made on the Iſlands in the Rhine, which are to be razed purſuant to the late Treaty of Peace; and we hear from Lorraine, that the French Forces are marching out of that Country.

*Hamburgh, Jan. 17.* Yeſterday Mr. Creſſer, His Maſteſty of Great-Britain's Envoy Extraordinary to the Princes of Lunerburgh, and Sir Paul Rycaut, His Maſteſty's Reſident here, celebrated the Thankſgiving for the Peace, and gave ſplendid Entertainments at two ſeveral Places to all the Foreign Miniſters, the Magiſtrates, and the Engliſh Merchants, and in the Evening there were Fireworks on the River, and the Company were again Entertained with a Banquet of Sweetmeats. Monſieur Bidal is daily expected, who is to reſide here as Ambaſſador from France.

*Paris, Jan. 17.* His Grace the Duke of St. Albans is arrived here from England, to make the King of Great-Britain's Compliments at this Court upon the Duke of Burgundy's Marriage. The Count de Comanges, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of Lorraine, has had Audience of the King, in which he acquainted him with the Death of the late Queen Dowager of Poland, Dutcheſs of Lorraine; as he had afterwards of the Dauphin and the reſt of the Royal Family on the ſame Occaſion. Monſieur Palmquit, Envoy of Sweden, in an Audience he had of the King the 14th, notified the King his Maſteſty's being Crowned, and having taken upon himſelf the Administration of the Government. Count Baglioni, Envoy of Mantua, has Complimented this Court on the part of that Duke, upon the Concluſion of the Peace, and the Marriage of the Duke of Burgundy; The like Compliments have been made on the part of the King of Denmark by Monſieur de Meyerkroon, his Envoy Extraordinary, and thoſe of the Great Deke of Tuſcany by the

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
