To the King's Most Excellent Majesty,

The Humble Address of the Gentlemen, Freemen, and Inhabitants of St. Edmonds-Bury in the County of Suffelk.

May it please Your Majesty,

It is not the Formality of Addressing, but the Duty of it, that has brought us to the Feet of so great a Monarch, though all the Kingdom had been silent, yet whilst we had Tongues to speak, we would ever have acknowledged Your Majesty the most Glorious Instrument of Heaven in Rescuing our Lives and Laws, our Estates and Liberties, and all that is Sacred and Dear to us, from the utmost Hazards; The whole Christian World has long since known, how full Your Royal Break has been of Valour, Your Conduct of Prudence, and Sword of Steel; One of the greatest Princes of Europe has been lately convinced, how far his Ambition has extended his Strength; Your Enemies at home are now confounded, that all their Efforts and Barbarous Define have and the form of the form signs have ended but in the firmer Establishment of Your Rightful Throne, and all Your Dutiful Subjects will daily Rejoyce, that Your Majesty is so much at Ease from what You have thought their Burthen: May it be the Immortal Honour of Your Majesty to be the best of Princes, the Head (under God) of the Protestant Interest; a Healer of Churches, a Resormer of Manners, the Delight of Your People, and the Glory of the Crown of England; so Pray Tour Majesties most Dutiful, most Loyal, and Obedient Subjects.

Venice, Jan. 3. N. S. The Senate have given Commissions to several Officers to make new Levies for the Service of this Republick, which they are to have compleat by the beginning of April; The Ships and Galleys building in the Arfenal here, are to be finished against the same time; it being intended to augment both our Sea and Land Force for the next Campagne. The Turks at the same time make their utmost Efforts, to put themselves in a condition to withstand the Attempts that are like to be made upon them the next year, as well by the Moscovites and Polanders as by the Germans and Venetians; The Grand Signior has fent Orders to the Baffa's of the several Provinces within his Dominions, to raise all the Men they can, and to require those who are obliged by the Lands they hold to serve the Sultan in his Wars, to repair to his Armies the next Summer. : We have received an account from Dalmatia, that Colonel Canagetti was returned to Zara from an Incursion he had made with 500 men into the Enemies Country, where he had burnt feveral Villages, taken divers Prisoners, and got a considerable Booty. The

Lisbon, Dec. 4. The Cortes or States of this Kingdom mer here on the First of this month; About I'en in the morning the King came to the Place where they were assembled (being the Great Hall of the Palace) accompanied by the two Princes his Sons, and the Great Officers and Principal Persons of the Court; The King seared himself on the Throne, the eldest Prince sitting on his Right Hand, and the youngest standing on his Lest; and the Nobility, Bigshops, and Deputies of the several Towns, being placed in theusual manner, the President of the Assembly made a Speech, wherein he represented the great Obligations the Kingdom of Portugal have to the House of Bragance, and to the King In particular, and that it having pleased God to Bless his Majesties Marriage with a happy Issue, and above all to give him a Son of so great Hopes, as is the Prince Royal, this Assembly could not begin their Proceedings with doing any thing more becoming their Duty and Gratitude to His Majesty, than by publickly acknowledging the Prince as Heir of the Crown, and taking an Oath of Fidelity to him as such; atter which the Oath to be taken by the States was read, and then the Second Prince took the Oath, as did afterwards the Bishops, the Officers of the Crown, the Nöbility, and Deputies of the Towns; and the Ceremony ended with a treble Discharge of the Kings Guards of Horse and Foot, who were drawn up near the Palace.

Recuting the War against the Turks, which the King is very intent upon, having a great desire to recover Gaminiee, by means whereof the Tartars have the opportunity to make frequent Inroads into the Frontier Provinces of that Kingdom. We are told, that the King intends to come to Pruffa towards the end of this month, or the beginning of the next, ro receive

the Homage of Elbing, Thorne, and of this City.
Pienna, Jan 8. The Count de Harash, whom the Emperor has appointed his Ambassador Extra-ordinary to the King of Spain; intends in few days to begin his Journey thither, having already fent away greatest part of his Equipage. The Emperor has named the Sieur Quarient to reside as his Envoy Extraordinary in Moscowy, and he intends to depart hence the next month; The Advices from those Parts fay; the Moscovites are making several new Fortifications at Afop, which they took from the Turks about two years ago; and that they have a great many thousand Men constantly at work to cut a Canal or Passage into the Black-Ses. They write from Transilvania, that General Rabutin, who commands the Emperor's Forces within that Principality, had been to visit them in their several Quarters, and had appointed some Works to be cast up, to secure the Passes of that Country towards Valachia; and that about 100 Hungarians, who lately retired with their Families into the Turkish Dominions, not being able to subsist there, returned to their former Habitations, but the Chief of them are made Prisoners by the Emperor's Officers, as being concerned in the late Rebellion in Upper-Hungary. The States of the Lower-Austria are to meet here the next weeks 'Tis believed they will raise a certain number of Men to recruit the Imperial Forces for the next Campagne. Several new Galleys are building to be employed on the Danube, where the Emperor intends to have a stronger Fleet the next Summer, than he has yet had during the War, they being found extreamly useful for convoying the Artillery, Provisions, and Ammunition, sent by Water for the Service of the Army, as well as for annoying the Enemy. The Count de Sinzendorf, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Poland at this Court, has taken his Leave of the Emperor in order to his return home; He intends to go hence the next week, and to meet the King his Master at War-faw, where a General Dyet will be held in the month of March, or sooner, if it can be conveniently: The Saxon Forces who some time ago were ordered for Poland, continue for the present near the Frontiers of Hungary, being designed to join in the Spring with the Forces of that Kingdom, for carrying on the War against the Turks.

Francfort, Jan. 15. N.S. Prince Lewis of Baden has deferred his Journey to Vienna for some time, his presence being thought necessary in these parts, till the Places on the Rhine which the French are to restore by the Peace, are evacuated, which 'tis believed will now be done in few days.
