COMPANIES ACT, 1929.

The Companies (Forms) No. 2 Order, 1929 (Amendment) Order, 1930, dated April 3, 1930, made by the Board of Trade under the Companies Act, 1929 (19 & 20 Geo. 5, c. 23).

Whereas by Section 155 of the Companies Act, 1929, it is provided that the Transferee

Company may give notice to a dissenting shareholder of the Transferor Company in the prescribed manner, and

Whereas by Section 380 of the said Act the expression "prescribed" means prescribed by the Board of Trade.

Now therefore, the Board of Trade, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon them, do hereby prescribe as follows:—

1. The Companies (Forms) No. 2 Order, 1929 (S.R. & O. 1929, No. 1103), shall be amended by the addition thereto of the following paragraph:—

1.—(a) The Notice to be given by the Transferee Company pursuant to Section 155 to dissenting shareholders who hold Share Warrants to Bearer of the Transferor Company shall be in the Form No. 100 of the Companies (Forms) Order, 1929 (S.R. & O. 1929, No. 823), with any necessary adaptations to meet the circumstances of the case and shall be given (a) in cases where the Articles of Association or Regulations of the Transferor Company provide that notice to such shareholders may be given by advertisement, by advertisement in the manner so provided and (b) in any other case in such manner as the Board of Trade may direct.

2. This Order may be cited as the Companies (Forms) No. 2 Order, 1929 (Amendment) Order, 1930.

Under and by virtue of the powers conferred upon the Clearing Office and the Administrator by Article 1 (xiv) of the Treaty of Peace (Hungary) Orders 1921 to 1923, a rule was made on the 7th day of March, 1923, duly approved by the President of the Board of Trade, prescribing the 30th day of June, 1923, as the final date by which proofs by British nationals of debts due to them by Hungarian nationals or of pecuniary obligations of the
