THE following Address from the County of Gloucester, was presented to His Majesty by the High Sheriff, and . . . . . Stephens Esq; one of the Knights of the Shire, Introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Dursley, Lord-Lieutenant of the said County.

*To the King's Most Excellent Majesty.*

The Humble Address of the High Sheriff, Deputy Lieutenant, Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury and Gentlemen of the County of Gloucester, at the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace held the 11th day of January, 1697.

*Most Dread Sovereign!*

**Y**OU have done very great Things for us, and we take this Occasion to assure Your Majesty, that we will, as long as we live, with Hearts and Hands, support Your Royal Person and Government against all Your Enemies.

The Humble Address of the Steward, Bayliffs, Aldermen, Burgeses, Brothers, and Freeholders of the Mannor and Ancient Corporation of Morpeth in the County of Northumberland, was presented to His Majesty at Kensington, by Lieutenant-General Bellasse and Mr. Nicholas their Representatives in Parliament, introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Carlisle.

The Humble Address of the late Chaplains of His Majesty's Fleet, was presented to His Majesty by the said Chaplains, introduced by the Lord Bishop of London.

The Humble Address of the Justices of the Peace and Grand Jury, at the Quarter

Sessions lately held for the County of Warwick, was presented to His Majesty by Will. Bromley and Andrew Archer Esqs; their Representatives in Parliament, introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Northampton, Lord-Lieutenant and Custos Rotulorum of the said County.

The Humble Address of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, was presented to His Majesty by the Right Honourable Sir James Ogilby, Principal Secretary of State for the said Kingdom.

Which Addresses His Majesty received very Graciously.

*Milan, Dec. 27. N. S.* The Marquis de Leganez prepares to leave this Government, so soon as his Successor arrives, which may be towards Spring, and then the said Marquis intends to return to Spain. He designs to go the next Week to Turin, to make the Duke of Savoy a Visit. The Marquis de Burgomano, who is now in this City, has received an account of his being made a Gratitude of Spain, and has been thereupon Complimented by the Persons of chiefest Quality here.

*Genova, Dec. 28.* The Gallies Comanded by the Duke of Turis are come into this Port, having been in great danger by reason of the bad Weather they had at Sea, during which 2 Gallies of Sicily are said to be lost, with most of their Men. The Slaves belonging to the Captain-Galley of Sardinia having found an opportunity lately to get off their Chains, they intended to fall upon their Officers and the Soldiers on Board, and were ready to put their design in execution when 'twas discovered and prevented; And the Chief of them were exemplarily punished.

*Lembergh, Dec. 28.* The Count de Jablonowski, Great General of Poland arrived the last Week at Rava, where he had several Conferences with the Principal Officers of the Army, about regulating the Winter-quarters for the Troops, and making the necessary provision for their subsistence; The distribution of Quarters was accordingly agreed on, and 10 Troops of Horse are ordered to Quar

ter within the Archbishoprick of *Gnesna*. The Crown-General issued out Orders likewise for the security of our Frontiers, and took particular care to reinforce the Garison of the Fort *de la Trinite* near *Caminiec*, and to supply them with Ammunition and Provisions, and having dispatched these Affairs he returned 2 days ago to *Warsaw* to wait upon the King at his arrival in that City from *Cracow*. The last Advices from *Valachia* assure us, that the Cham of *Tartary* is gone to *Adrianoople*, being sent for by the Grand Signior; The Turks at *Caminiec* are expecting a great Convoy of Provisions, which is to be conducted thither by the Tartars, and they appear more then usually careful to put that place in a good posture of Defence, which must be attributed to the apprehensions they have of being Attacked the next Summer by the Forces of this Crown.

*Vieima*, Jan. 8. Several Officers, who serve in the Saxon Forces now in *Poland*, are lately arrived here, and do all speak of the King's design to prosecute the War against the Turks with all the Vigor possible, and that he may be in a better condition to do it, no endeavours are omitted which may contribute to the good Success of the General Dyet, which is to meet at *Warsaw* the 5th of *March*. There passes at present nothing of moment in *Hungary*, the bad Weather hindring the Forces from making Excursions, as they usually do at other times; And many of the Officers are come hither to receive Directions about making their Recruits. The Moscovite Prince *Szeremint* has made a present to the King of the Romans of a very fine Horse, with Rich Furniture; He intends to go hence in few days for *Italy*, where several Gentlemen of that Nation are now Traveling, not so much to satisfy their curiosity, as to be instructed in several useful Sciences. Count *Harach* the Emperor's Ambassador to *Spain* has orders to hasten his departure, and he will accordingly set out the next Week.

*Cologne*, Jan. 17. The Letters from *Mentz* give an Account, that the French at *Philipsburgh* had begun to demolish the Fort on the other side the Rhine, but the hard Frost gives at present a stop to this Work; We are told that the German Garison which is to enter into *Philipsburgh* when the French leave it, is to be one third of the Emperor's Forces, and the rest of the Troops of *Suabia* and *Franconia*, and that the Emperor is to nominate the Governor. The Count de *St. Maurits* Governor of *Bon*, passed through this place 2 days ago, to wait upon the Elector of *Cologne*, who is now in *Flanders*.

*Falmouth*, Jan. 17. Yesterday sailed out of this Port the Spanish Aliyance for the *Groyne*. The same day came in the *James* and *Elizabeth* of *Weymouth*, laden with Salt from *Rochelle*; And the *Unity* of and from *Kindfale* bound to *France*.

*Plimouth*, Jan. 18. Yesterday came into this Port His Majesty's Ship the *Dover*; And the *Lewis* sailed about the same time to the Westward.
