The Crown-General issued out Orders likewise for the security of our Frontiers, and took parti-cular care to reinforce the Garison of the Fort de la Trinite near Caminiec, and to supply them with Ammunition and Provisions, and having dispatched these Affairs he returned 2 days ago to Warsaw to wait upon the King at his arrival in that City from Cracow. The last Advices from Valachia as fure us, that the Cham of Tartary is gone to Adrianople, being fent for by the Grand Signior; The Turks at Caminiec are expecting a great Convoy of Provisions, which is to be conducted thither by the Tartars, and they appear more then usually careful to put that place in a good posture of Defence. which must be arributed to the apprehensions they have of being Attacked the next Summer by the Forces of this Crown.

Vicima, Jan. 8. Several Officers, who ferve in the Saxon Forces now in Poland, are lately arrived here, and do all speak of the King's design to prosecute the War against the Turks with all the Vigorpossible, and that he may be in a better condition to do it, no endeavours are omitted which may contribute to the good Success of the General Dyet, which is to meet at Warfaw the 5th of March. There passes ar present nothing of moment in Hungary, the bad Weather hindring the Forces from making Excursions, as they usually do at other times. And many of the Officers are come hither to receive Directions about making their Recruits. The Moscovite Prince Szerement has made a pre-feat to the King of the Romans of a very fine Horse, with Rich Furniture; He intends to go hence in few days for Italy, where several Gentlemen of that Nation are now Traveling, not so much to satisfie their curiosity, as to be instructed in several Count Harach the Emperor's Amuleful Sciences. bassador to Spain has orders to hasten his departure, and he will accordingly fet out the next Week.

Cologne, Jan. 17. The Letters from give an Account, that French at Philipsburgh had begun to demolish the Fort on the other side the Rhine, but the hard Frost gives at present a stop to this Work; We are told that the German Garison which is to enter into Philipsburgh when the French leave it, is to be one third of the Emperor's Forces, and the rest of the Troops of Suabia and Franconia, and that the Emperor is to nominate the Governor. The Count de St. Maurits Governor of Bon, passed through this place 2 days ago, to wait upon the Elector of Cologne, who is now in Flanders.

Falmouth, Jan. 17. Yesterday failed out of this Port the Spanish Aliyance for the Groyne. The same day came in the James and Elizabeth of Weymouth, laden with Salt from Rochelle; And the Unity of and from Kindsale bound to France.
