Now therefore, in pursuance of the powers conferred on me by Regulation 6 of the Raw

Opium Regulations, 1921, as extended by the Coca Leaves and Indian Hemp Regulations, 1928, and by Regulation 7 of the Dangerous Drugs (Consolidation) Regulations, 1928, I hereby give notice that I withdraw, as from to-day's date, from the said Faustin Marcel Boclet, the authority granted by the said Regulations to duly qualified medical practitioners to be in possession of and supply raw opium, coca leaves and Indian Hemp and the drugs and preparations to which Part 111 of the Dangerous Drugs Act, 1920, applies:

And I also direct, as from the same date, that it shall not be lawful for the said Faustin Marcel Boclet to give prescriptions for the purposes of the Dangerous Drugs (Consolidation) Regulations, 1928.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE ACTS, 1920-1930.

Decisions of the High Court of Justice on References by the Minister of Labour under Section 10 (1) proviso (ii) of the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920.

On the 15th April, 1930, the Minister referred to the High Court for decision the questions whether persons employed in the following circumstances were or were not employed persons within the meaning of the Act of 1920:---

(a) Stoker employed at a hospital in stoking steam boilers used for heating the premises, driving the laundry machinery and providing steam for steriliser and disinfector.

(b) Stoker employed at a hospital in stoking hot water boilers.

(c) Head stoker employed at a hospital in stoking hot water and steam boilers used for heating, hot water supply and supplying steam to steriliser and disinfector, in executing minor repairs, and in supervising three other stokers.
