

THE LONDON TRAFFIC ACT, 1924.

SECTION 7.

Notice is hereby given that the Minister of Transport by virtue and in exercise of the powers given to him by Section 7 of the London Traffic Act, 1924, and the Regulations from time to time made by him thereunder, after consulting the London and Home Counties Advisory Committee, has relaxed the restrictions and limitations imposed by the said Regulations upon the occasion of the Fete to be held at Dr. Barnardo's Home, Barkingside, on Saturday, the 28th day of June, 1930, so that nothing in the said Regulations shall:—

(a) prevent any person who is maintaining at the date of this Notice a regular service in accordance with Section 6 of the London Traffic Act, 1924, upon the approved route numbered 26C from making on that day after 11 a.m. in any of the streets or parts thereof between Cranbrook Park and Barkingside declared to be "restricted streets" by any Order made by the Minister of Transport under the aforesaid Section of the London Traffic Act, 1924, and forming part of the approved route numbered 26, six journeys per hour in each direction with his omnibuses plying for hire on that approved route in excess of the number of journeys which he may make in those streets or parts thereof under the said Regulations;

(b) prevent any person who is maintaining at the date of this Notice a regular service in accordance with Section 6 of the London Traffic Act, 1924, upon the approved route numbered 26E from using, on that day, after 11 a.m. in any of the streets or parts thereof declared to be "restricted streets" by any Order made by the Minister of Transport under the aforesaid Section of the London Traffic Act, 1924, and forming part of the approved route numbered 26E, for the purpose of plying for hire on that approved route one omnibus in addition to those now used in the maintenance by him of a regular service on that approved route;

provided that nothing herein contained shall be deemed to affect or derogate from the powers of the Commissioner of Police of the Metropolis under the provisions of Section 52 of the Metropolitan Police Act, 1839, to give directions to constables for keeping order and for preventing any obstruction of the thoroughfares.

LAND DRAINAGE ACTS, 1861 AND 1918.

HELPRINGHAM DRAINAGE DISTRICT (KESTEVEN, LINCS.).

Notice is hereby given that the Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries has prepared a draft Order under the Land Drainage Act, 1918, constituting certain lands lying within the limits of the area under the jurisdiction of the Black

Sluice Drainage and Navigation Commissioners, in the Parish of Helpringham (Kesteven, Lincs.), a separate Drainage District under the Land Drainage Acts, 1861 and 1918.

A copy of the draft Order and a 6 inch scale map showing the proposed drainage district have been deposited at the office of Mr. P. Bird, Grocer, Helpringham, for public inspection for a period of one calendar month from the date hereof. For telephonic communication between any place in the first British zone (including Bedford, Berkshire, Buckingham, Cambridge, Dorset, Essex, Gloucester, Hampshire, Hertford, Huntingdon, Kent, Leicester, Lincoln, London, Middlesex, Norfolk, Northampton, Nottingham, Oxford, Rutland, Somerset, Suffolk, Surrey, Sussex, Warwick, Wiltshire and Worcester) and any place in:—

For the purposes of the Anglo-Latvian service, Latvia is divided into two zones as follows:—

Zone 1.—The districts of Aizpute, Kuldīga, Liepāja (Libau), Talsi, Tukums and Ventpils (Windau).

Zone 2.—Rest of Latvia (including Riga).

Estonia comprises one zone only.
