A "Report Charge" of 10s. (12s. in the case of a call from the Isle of Man or Northern Ireland) is payable, in place of the normal charge, when for any reason beyond the control of the Post Office the person asked for cannot be found and connected with the caller. The hours during which calls may be made vary somewhat with the position of the ship, the service continuing each day for about 10 hours within the period 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. (British Time).

Calls may be booked only for a specified person, and the caller should give the name of the vessel and the name of the passenger with

whom conversation is desired, together with such further particulars as will enable him to be traced, as well as his own telephone number and the name associated with that number in the telephone directory.

Note.—Communication is at present limited to calls to and from the following ships:—

URBAN DISTRICT OF BOURNE.

Public Health Acts Amendment Act, 1907, and Public Health Act, 1925.

Order, 1903.

NOTICE is hereby given that the Urban District Council of Barking Town intend, under the provisions of the above Order, to execute a Lease to the Ilford Corporation of the following Light Railways within the Urban District of Barking Town, viz.:—
