

perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the Church and Cure (hereinafter called 'the said Benefice') of Hawnbly with Old Byland, in the County of York and in the Diocese of York:

"Whereas the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Hawnbly with Old Byland as to two one-third parts or shares is now limited and settled upon trusts under which the Right Honourable Charles William Slingsby, Earl of Feversham, is tenant for life thereof free from incumbrances, and as to the remaining one-third part or share, is now limited and settled upon trusts under which Victor Malcolm Wombwell, of Newburgh Priory in the said County of York, a Captain (retired) in Your Majesty's Army is tenant for life thereof free from incumbrances:

"And whereas the said Charles William Slingsby, Earl of Feversham, and the said Victor Malcolm Wombwell are therefore the Patrons or persons successively entitled to present or nominate to the said Benefice upon the same becoming vacant:

"And whereas the said Charles William Slingsby, Earl of Feversham, and the said Victor Malcolm Wombwell are desirous that the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Hawnbly with Old Byland should be transferred in the manner which is hereinafter recommended and proposed:

"And whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William, Archbishop of York, has executed this Scheme as hereinafter mentioned in token of his willingness to accept jointly with the other persons hereinafter mentioned the transfer of the parts or shares of the said Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage hereinafter recommended and proposed and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the Diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary:

"And whereas the transfer of the Patronage of the said Benefice of Hawnbly with Old Byland which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will render the same Benefice more eligible for augmentation out of funds under our control, and this circumstance will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the Cure of Souls in the Parish or District in or in respect of which the right of Patronage or Advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the Parishes of Hawnbly and Old Byland:

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Charles William Slingsby, Earl of Feversham, and of the said Victor Malcolm Wombwell, being the persons whose consents as Patrons are required by the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts and of the Act of the 1st and 2nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 106 (in testimony of which consent they have signed and sealed this Scheme), with the consent of the said William, Archbishop of York (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme and sealed the same with his Archiepiscopal Seal), and with the consent of the persons to whom together with the said Charles William Slingsby, Earl of Feversham, and Victor Malcolm Wombwell, and the said

William, Archbishop of York, it is hereinafter recommended and proposed that the said Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage should be transferred, that is to say, as to two one-third parts or shares, with the consent of the Venerable Thomas Enraght Lindsay, Clerk in Holy Orders and Archdeacon of Cleveland, of Charles William Ernest Duncombe, C.B.E., of Rievaulx, Helmsley, in the said County of York, a Lieutenant Colonel (retired) in Your Majesty's Yeomanry, and of Ronald D'Arcy Fife, C.M.G., D.S.O., of Nunnington Hall in the County of York a Lieutenant Colonel (retired) in Your Majesty's Army (in testimony whereof they have signed and sealed this Scheme), and, as to the remaining one-third part or share with the consent of the said Venerable Thomas Enraght Lindsay, Archdeacon of Cleveland, of William Neil Graham Menzies of Magdalen College Oxford and of the said Ronald D'Arcy Fife (in testimony whereof they have signed and sealed this Scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Hawnbly with Old Byland shall be transferred as to two one-third parts or shares, to the said Charles William Slingsby, Earl of Feversham; William, Archbishop of York; Thomas Enraght Lindsay; Charles William Ernest Duncombe; and Ronald D'Arcy Fife; and, as to the remaining one-third part or share, to the said Victor Malcolm Wombwell; William, Archbishop of York; Thomas Enraght Lindsay; William Neil Graham Menzies; and Ronald D'Arcy Fife and shall thereupon and thenceforth, as to two one-third parts or shares, become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Charles William Slingsby, Earl of Feversham; William, Archbishop of York; Thomas Enraght Lindsay; Charles William Ernest Duncombe; and Ronald D'Arcy Fife, their heirs and assigns for ever, and, as to the remaining one-third part or share, by the said Victor Malcolm Wombwell; William, Archbishop of York; Thomas Enraght Lindsay; William Neil Graham Menzies, and Ronald D'Arcy Fife their heirs and assigns for ever, as Trustees upon the trusts declared, as to two one-third parts or shares, by a certain Indenture already prepared and intended to be executed by the said Charles William Slingsby, Earl of Feversham; William, Archbishop of York; Thomas Enraght Lindsay; Charles William Ernest Duncombe; and Ronald D'Arcy Fife; and, as to the remaining one-third part or share, by another Indenture already prepared and intended to be executed by the said Victor Malcolm Wombwell; William, Archbishop of York; Thomas Enraght Lindsay; William Neil Graham Menzies; and Ronald D'Arcy Fife.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."
