Kensington, Febr. 13. The following Address from the Borough of Lymington, was presented to His Majesty by John Burrard, and Thomas Dors, Esquires, their Representatives in Parliament, and Roger Mosse, Esq; their Steward, introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Macclesfield.

May it please the King of Great-Britain, France, and Ireland, &c.

WE the Mayor and Burgesses of Your Majesties Corporation and Borough of Lymington, without being guided by the Flattery of former, or the Rhetorick of latter Addressers, presume to approach Your Royal Presence, to Assure Your Majesty, That we always were, and ever will be heartily and sincerely to our Rightful and Lawful King William, most Dutiful and Obedient Subjects.

The humble Address of the Custos Rotularum, Justices of the Peace, Gentlemen, Grand Jury, and other Freeholders at the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace holden for the County of Northampton, was presented to His Majesty by Sir St. Andrew St. John, and Thomas Cartwright Esq; Knights of the Shire for the said County.

The humble Address of the Gentry, Freeholders, and other Protestant Inhabitants of the King's County in the Kingdom of Ireland, was likewise presented to His Majesty.

Which Addresses His Majesty received very Graciously.

Warsaw, Jan. 30. N. S. The Proposals made by the Primate for assembling the Rokortz (or Gentlemen of his Party) at Lowitz some time the next month, have been accepted by the King of Poland, and there is good reason to believe this meeting will have the desired Success, for settling the Affairs of the Kingdom on such a foot as may restore a perfect Peace and Union among ourselves, and leave us at liberty to apply our whole Force as well as Care to the prosecuting the War against the Turks. The King continues his Resolution to begin very speedily his Progress to Prussia, and 'tis said he intends to part hence the 3d or 4th of the next month, and to receive the Primate, who is to come in Person to make his Submission to his Majesty at Thorne, a City about 30 Leagues distant from this Place; and from thence the King will go to Marienbourg; and so to Dantzick, where it is thought he will meet his Queen, who is expected from Dresden. In the mean while all possible Endeavours are used by fair Means to compose the Differences in Lithuania, and if they do not succeed, the King will interpose his Royal Authority, and make use of such other Methods as shall be found necessary to put an end to them. The Queen Dowager has taken her Leave of the King, designing to go to her House in Russland.

Dantzick, Febr. 8. Upon the Account we received from Warsaw, that the King would very soon set out on his Journey hither, we have been very busie for these several days last past, in making all the preparations this City is capable of for his Majesties Reception; but by fresher Letters come in this day we understand, that the Primate desiring rather to attend the King at Warsaw than at Thorne as was designed, his Majesties Journey is again put off, and it is believed he will now defer the same till Matters are fully adjusted with the Cardinal, and the Troubles in Lithuania are composed:

Vienna, Febr. 5. The Thanksgiving for the Peace, which has been hitherto put off for several Considerations, will be celebrated here to morrow with a great deal of Solemnity. Our Advices from Hungary say, the Imperial Troops about *Carlestadt* had made an Inroad as far as *Bihatz*, and destroyed the Turkish Magazines they found in several places, especially of Hay, which they had laid up in great quantities in those parts, so that this is looked upon as a considerable Advantage, the Enemy being hereby deprived of the Means to subsist their Horse till they have Grass to feed on.

Frankfort, Febr. 12. We have had this Winter a great deal of Snow in these parts, and the Thaw at this time has occasioned great falls of Water, which have so swelled the *Rhine*, that it is impossible to go on, for the present, with the demolishing of the Fort on the *Rhine* at *Philipsbourg*, and this renders the time uncertain when that City will be restored, which however we hope will be in the beginning of *March* at the latest. Several Protestant Families are removing hither from *Strasbourg*. According to our Advices from *Triers* the French are at work to demolish *Montroyal*.

Brussels, Febr. 16. The French have evacuated the Cities of *Chimay* and *Beaumont*, of which Places the *Chevalier de Berges* has taken possession, and has put Spanish Garisons in them. The Elector of *Bavaria* will shortly make a turn along the Frontiers to visit the Places which have been restored to the Crown of *Spain* pursuant to the late Treaty of Peace. The Elector of *Cologne* went hence last Thursday for *Bonn*, the Place of his Residence.

Hague, Febr. 18. Most of the Deputies of the States of *Holland* and *Westfrizeland* are come to Town, intending to begin their Sessions to morrow, as are also those of the Admiralties, to finish the Matters under their Consideration. Part of Monsieur *Odykes* Baggage is gone away for *France*, and himself with Monsieur *Heemskirke* will shortly follow. We hear from *Dunkirke*, that several Ships are fitting out there to be commanded by the *Sieur de Bart*.

Paris, Febr. 18. N. S. The Duke and Dutchess of *Orleans*, and the Duke and Dutchess of *Chartres*, have been in Town this week, at the Palace Royal, where the Earl of *Portland* went to wait upon them; Yesterday morning his Excellency went again to *Versailles*. Preparations are making for Mademoiselle's Marriage with the Duke of *Lorraine*, which is fully concluded. The Cardinal of *Furstemberg* intends in the Spring to go and visit his Diocese of *Strasbourg*, where he has not been since he was made Bishop of that See. Count *d'Avaux*, the French Ambassador in *Sweden*, has desired leave to return home, and there is a Discourse that he will be succeeded by the Marquis or Count *de Feuquieres*, Sons to the late Marquis of that Name, who was several years in the same Post. We hear the *Chevalier des Augiers* is sailed from *Port-Louis* with 4 Men of War for the *East Indies*; and that 4 Ships are fitting at *Rocheport* for the *Carybee* Islands.

Plymouth, Febr. 8. Yesterday came into this Port the *Joanna* of and for *London*, *Thomas Read* Master, from *Lubon*; and the *William and Francis* of *Hull*, *Thomas Wallis* Master, from *O-Porto*, both laden with Wine.

Deal, Febr. 10. This morning sailed hence the *Martha, Ann*, and *Fame*, being 3 outward-bound *East-India* Ships.

HIS Majesty having given Order for Disbanding several Regiments of Foot, Has, by His Instructions to the General Officers appointed for that purpose, directed them among other things, to take Care that the following Particulars be duly observed.

1. That an Account be stated of what is owing for the Quarters of each Regiment, according to the Act of Parliament, and that the same be forthwith satisfied so far as the Subsistence has been issued to the Regiment, and the remainder certified to the Pay-Master-General of the Forces for Payment thereof.

2. That the Commission Officers of the said Regiments, upon their Disbanding, be continued in half Pay.

3. That the Non-Commission Officers and Soldiers be pay'd what is owing them by their Officers, who are to produce Acquittances from such Non-Commission Officers and Soldiers, for the Money they have received for them, and a Stated Account of what remains due from His Majesty, which is to be pay'd before the Disbanding.

4. That the Sea-Pay and Short Allowance Money that shall appear to be due to any of the Non-Commission Officers and Soldiers now to be disbanded, be likewise satisfied before their Discharge, or an Account of it stated in order to speedy Payment.

5. That the Non-Commission Officers and Soldiers be permitted to carry away with them their Cloaks, Belt and Snapsack, and the Sergeants likewise their Sword; and that each Private Soldier, Corporal and Drummer be allowed 3 s. for his Sword, which is to be delivered with the other Arms into the Office of the Ordnance.

6. That there be pay'd to each Non-Commission Officer and Soldier, 14 days full Subsistence, from the day of their Discharge, to carry them home, over and above what shall be due to them, and Passes given them to the Places of their former Residence, and that they be strictly enjoined not to Travel with any Arms, nor more than 3 in Company together.
