Road to its junction with Scrubbs Lane footpath, thence in an easterly direction along the centre of Scrubbs Lane footpath to its junction with Bower Mount Road, thence southwards along the centre of Bower Mount Road to its junction with Tonbridge Road, thence westwards along the centre of Tonbridge Road to its junction with St. Michael's Road, thence southwards along the centre of St. Michael's Road to its junction with Upper Fant Road, thence in a south-westerly direction along the centre of Upper Fant Road to its junction with Unicum's Lane, thence in a south-easterly direction along the centre of Unicum's Lane and continuing in a straight line to the centre of the channel of the River Medway, thence in a north-easterly and northerly direction along the centre of the channel of the said River following the western boundaries of Stone Street Ward and High Street Ward as hereinbefore defined to the point of commencement aforesaid.

" Heath Ward.

"A line commencing at the junction of the Borough boundary with the northern and western boundaries of Bridge Ward, thence in a north-westerly, southerly and easterly direction following the Borough boundary to its junction with the western boundary of Stone Street Ward, thence in a generally northerly direction following the western boundaries of Stone Street Ward and Bridge Ward as hereinbefore defined to the point of commencement aforesaid.

"Plan Delineating Boundaries.

"The Boundaries of the Wards as above defined are delineated on the Plan annexed hereto which forms part of the Scheme.

"In case of any discrepancy between the Wards as delineated on the Plan and the textual description of the Wards as above set out, the textual description shall prevail.

"II.-Apportionment of Councillors.

"The three Councillors in office for each Ward as existing at the date of this Scheme shall be the Councillors for the Ward of the same name as altered by this Scheme."

And whereas the said Scheme has been submitted to His Majesty in Council for approval:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth hereby approve of the said Scheme of the said Commissioner, and doth order the same to be published in the London Gazette accordingly.

WHEREAS by Part II of the Administration of Justice Act, 1920, provision has been made for the reciprocal enforcement of judgments in the United Kingdom and in other parts of His Majesty's dominions:

And whereas by the said Act it is, amongst other things, provided that where His Majesty

is satisfied that reciprocal provisions have been made by the Legislature of any part of His Majesty's dominions outside the United Kingdom for the enforcement within that part of His dominions of judgments obtained in the High Court in England, the Court of Session in Scotland, and the High Court in Ireland, His Majesty may by Order in Council declare that the said part of that Act shall extend to that part of His dominions and that on any such Order being made the said part of that Act shall extend accordingly:

And whereas on the 6th day of December, 1922, the Irish Free State was established under the provisions of an Act of Parliament shortly entitled the Irish Free State Constitution Act.

1922 (Session 2):

And whereas His Majesty is satisfied that the Legislature of the part of His Majesty's dominions outside the United Kingdom hereinafter mentioned has made reciprocal provisions for the enforcement within that part of judgments obtained in the High Court in England, the Court of Session in Scotland, and the High Court in Ireland:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers by the above-recited Act in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. Part II of the Administration of Justice Act, 1920, shall extend to Malta.

2. Nothing in this Order shall affect the registration or enforcement in the Irish Free State of any judgment in pursuance of Part II of the said Act.

And the Right Honourable Lord Passfield, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.
