Venice, February 7. N. S.

HE 3d of this month being appointed for the publick Entry of the Earl of Manchester, Ambassador Extraordinary from his Majesty of Great-Britain, his Excellency, being accompanied by several English Noblemen, Gentlemen, and the English Consul and Merchants residing here, went, about Noon; to the Island of St. Spirite, 4 miles from hence, where he was received and conducted to an Apartment in the Monastery. Soon after Signior Venier with 60 Senators landed there, and having complimented my Lord Ambassador, accompanied his Excellency to his Gondola, and the Senators in order did the like to the Earl of Anglesey, the Lord North, and the other Gentlemen. In this manner they pussed through the great Canal in the middle of the Ciry, an hour before Sun-let, a great number of Boats with People of Quality attending out of Curiofity, and the Windows, Balconies, and fides of the Shore being crowded with Spectarors; Being come to my Lord Ambasladors Palace, Signior Venier and the Senators waited upon his Excellency into the State Room; and afterwards taking their Leave, were reconducted by his Excellency and the English Gentlemen to their Boats. His Excellency having excused himself from being Treated at the Publick Charge for 3 days, the Doge and Senators fent his Excellency during that time Presents of Wine and Provisions. On the 5th his Excellency had his publick Audience, to which he was conducted by Sinior Venier, and the 60 Senators before mentioned, with all the Solemnity and Honours that have been heretofore given to Persons of his Character; Being come to the Palace, and entring into the Room of Audience, the Doge and Councellors stood up, and after the usual Civilities, his Excellency presented his Credential Letters, and then fat down, covered, on the Doges Right Hand; His Excellency made a Speech, proper for the Occasion, and the Doge answered him, expressing the Veneration they have for his Majesty, and their great regard for his Majesti s Friendship, and withall declaring their Respect for his Excellencies Person, who is very acceptable to them; After this the Chevalier Venier, and Senators, waited upon his Excellency back to his Palace, and there took their Leave. His Excellencies Gondoles are very much admired for their Richness and Workmanship; and his Equi-

page is very numerous and fplendid.

with Arms was placed for the Envoy opposite to the Doge; B ing all Seated and Covered, Sir Lambert delivered his Letters of Credence, and made a Speech to the Doge, who answered in Terms till of Respect to his Majetty, and or Esteem and Consideration for his Majettes Subjects; After which Sir Lambert taking Leave, the Doge and Senators accompanied him to the middle of the Hall; The Four Deputies and Nibility brought him to his Litter; and the Gentlemen of the English Nation conducted him to his House in the same manner, as when he came to his Audience.

Warfaw, Febr. 8. The King having consented to the Cardinal Primate's desire, that the Rokotz may be assembled, in order to take such Measures as may most conduce to the fettling the Peace and Quiet of the Kingdom, they are accordingly fummoned to meet at Lowisz on the 18th Instanr, and the King has defetred his Journey to Prussia till this meeting be over; and that the Primate has been here to make his Submission to his Majesty. In the mean time the Refolution is taken for the meeting of the General Dyet on the 16th of April, for which purpole the Circular Letters are fent out; And that they may in the Dutchy of Lithuania quietly proceed to the choice of their Deputies to be fent to the faid Dyet, his, Majesty has appointed the General of Great-Poland; and the Under-General of Lithuania, as his Commissioners, to endeavour a Composure of the Quarrel between the Houses of Sapicha and Oginsky, which is grown to fuch a heigth, that they commit great Spoils on both sides. Thes Queen Dowager has put off her Journey to Rusland

Vienna, Febr. 18. Here is much Discourse at

The Sieur de Palm is sent by the Emperor to Italy, to receive the Arrears of Contributions due from the Italian Princes, which amount to about 300000 Livres, and to borrow a Sum of Money, by way of Advance, of the Republick of Genoua.
