**U**Pon the Advices we received some time since, that the Galeons had been obliged, by reason some of them proved leaky, to return to the *Havana*, the Commerce of *Seville* have taken care to fit out two Ships and a *Patache* laden with all manner of Stores and Provisions for their use, which will forthwith be sent away, tho' we hope the said Galeons will find in the *Indies* the necessaries they stand in need of, and will be able to refit without waiting for this Supply, so as that they may be expected here by the month of *May*. The Advice-Boat which was dispatched by the Commander of the said Galeons, with an Account of their Condition, is ready to return thither, and stays only for the Dispatches from *Madrid*. The Fleet bound hence for *Buenos Aires*, will set sail in the beginning of *February*. We hear from *Centa*, That the Moors continue the Siege of that place, and are in hopes of some fresh Troops being sent to their assistance, which encourages them to go on, notwithstanding the great difficulties they meet with, and the losses they suffer daily from the Besieged, who having a free passage by Sea, are often supplied with Succours and Provisions, and are thereby enabled to make a very vigorous defence.

*Rome*, Febr. 1. Last Monday was held a Consistory, and the Pope acquainted them with the Letters he had received from the King of *Poland*, and the Answer he had made to them; and that he had acknowledged that Prince, in order to procure the Peace and Union of that Kingdom, and the better to enable them to prosecute the War against the *Turks*.

*Venice*, Febr. 8. Our Senate is now very much taken up in giving the necessary Orders for hastening the Preparations for the next Campaign; The repeated Ad-

vices we have from the *Levant* of the Alarm the Port is in, and the ill posture of their Affairs, encouraging us to provide for some considerable attempt to be made upon them the next Spring, it is designed to take some of the German disbanded Forces into the Service of this Republick, and to that effect, a Negotiation is begun with some of the Princes of the Empire. Several Officers arrive daily and are entertained in the Service of this State. Several Ships and Gallies are fitting to reinforce our Fleet, that it may equal at least that of the *Turks*, which we hear is designed to be more numerous the next Summer than 'twas the last.

*Vienna*, Febr. 18. The Ministers of this Court are daily consulting about the means to raise Money for the Service of the War against the *Turks*; the Emperor intending to have a great Army in the Field next Summer. New Orders have been sent to the Inhabitants of the Hereditary Countries, to pay forthwith the Supplies that are demanded of them for remounting our Horse and raising Recruits; And the like are sent to the Provinces in *Hungary*; to raise the Money they are to furnish for the Subsistence of the Forces in their Winter-Quarters.

*Hamburg*, Febr. 14. There appears at present little Disposition to renew the Conferences at *Pynenburg*, for accommodating the Differences between the King of *Denmark* and Duke of *Holstein Gottorp*, each Party insisting on his Pretensions. Those which seem to that Duke the hardest to be complied with, are, That the King of *Denmark* would oblige him not to raise any Soldiers, nor take any Foreign Troops into his Service, which are Rights that belong to him as a Sovereign Prince. We hear from *Dresden*, That the Duke of *Saxe Weissenfelds* has Married the Princess *Frederica* of *Saxe-Eysenach*. Our last Advices from *Moscow*, say, Their Forces on the Frontiers make frequent Incurfions upon the *Tartars*, and that

*Paris, Febr. 28. N. S.* His Excellency the Earl of *Portland* went yesterday to *Versailles*, whither the Court is returned from *Marli*. Count *Tallard* sets out to day or to morrow on his Embassy to *England*. Monsieur *du Harlay* and Count *Crecy*, late Ambassadors Extraordinary and Plenipotentiaries from this Court at the Treaty of Peace, have received Pensions from the King, as a Reward for their Services in that Negotiation; and Monsieur *Calliere*, their Collegue, is made Secretary of the Closet to the King. On the 6th of the next Month the King is to Review his French and Swiss Guards, who are then to be all new Cloathed.

*Falmouth, Febr. 19.* On the 17th failed hence the *Spanish Alliance*, with one Mail for the *Groyne*. This morning the Wind changing to the West, the Dutch Ships here, from *Bourdeaux*, bound home, and others bound up the Channel are preparing to sail.

*Plymouth, Febr. 20.* Yesterday came in two French Vessels from *Rouen*, bound for *Rochelle*. This day came in the *Biscay-Merchant* of and for *London*, from *Bilboa*, *Edward Rutter* Commander.

*Weymouth, Febr. 21.* Yesterday came into this Port the *Mary Yacht*, Captain *William Moses*, bound for *Southampton*. And this day the *Traversier* of the Isle of *Rhé*, *Daniel Monier* Master, from *Rocheford*, with 100 Barrels of French Brass Money for *Hvre de Grace*, on the French King's account.

*Bristol, Febr. 19.* Yesterday Brigadier *Ingolsby's* Regiment embarked here for *Ireland*, and set sail this morning.

*Chester, Febr. 21.* Part of the Regiments commanded by Colonel *Stanley* and Colonel *Brudenel*, marched hence last Friday and Saturday to *Higblake*, where they are to Embark for *Ireland*; and the rest will follow in few days.

*Kensington, Febr. 23.* The humble Address of the High Sheriff, Justices of the Peace, Gentlemen, and Grand Jury of the County of *Salop* at the Quarter-Sessions held for the said County, was presented to His Majesty by the Right Honourable the Lord *Newport*, Knight of the Shire, and several other Gentlemen of the said County.
