Firell, not any of them being observed to have left their companies, but all of them marching with extraordinary cheerfulnefs into the fervice.

Hague, Febr. 7. On Monday Morning last arrived here the Portugal Ambssfadour Don Francesco de Melo, but remains as yet incognito; the next Week 'tis belived he may make his Publick Eutry, and be admitted to his Publick Audience. He was yesterday entertained and liberally feasted (though privately) by the Spanith Ambassfadour.

Part of the Baggage belonging to Monfieur de Pompone arrived here yelterday, and himfelf this Week expected from Paris.

The Heer Adelaer the Danish Admiral, sent hither for the concluding Bules for the true measuring of such thips as fhall trade for the Coalts of Normay, is gone for Amsterdam, to treat with the Bourgomaster Valkenier, to whom is commit the care of that affair.

The H-et Broffacet the Secretary fome time fince returned home foi from Embaffadour in the Ottoman Court, is defigned to be fent as Relident for Legorn, and is accordingly preparing for his Voyage thither.

Frequent Conferences a e here held in order to the conclution of the Marine Treaty, which 'tis hoped may in little time be effected with mutual fatisfaction.

Several Deputies are appointed to be fent to the Conflable of *Caffille*, the Dukes of *Luneubourgh*, and Bifhop of *Multiter*, but ris not belived any of them will be difpatched hence till the Affembly of the States of Holland, which are appointed to meet the 12th in ft-nt.

An Agent is lately arrived from the Bifhop of Munfier, but the purport of his bufmels no: yet known. From Weftphales we have advices of the arrival of some French forces in the Bishoprick of Munfter, to whom the Bishop has ordered convenient Quarters to be affigned ; and that he has given Order for the making of Five thouland pai of Pistols, and as many, or a greater number of Bandeliers : That he is dai'y raifing forces, having already 3000 Foot, and 700 good Officers to command them ; as also that he has ordered feveral Flat-bottomed Boats to be prepared for Transportation of Soldiers, and has demanded of the States of his Countrey a fupply of Two hundred and forty thousand Rixdollers, for the defraying of his Expences. Tis farther faid that he is giving new Liveries to his Train, which he intends to increase to the number of 140 perfons; with which tis supposed he may have a Design to visit the French Courrupon fome Negotiation of importance.

Upon the application made by the Councels of Bonthem to the States, they have taken herecondition into their confiderati a, and have th ught fit to allow her a Penlion of Four thouland Livres a year for her maintenance, till the differences with the Count her Husband can be reconciled a which they are endeavouring by all convertient wayes to effect. The faid Count de Bonthem lately applied himfelf to the Confiftories of Overriffel and Groningue, propoling to t'em fome general Queflions concerning Clandeftine Marriages, and deceiful and fraudulent Defertions; defiring their Opinions upon the Cafes propounded : but they exeufed themfelves from giving their Determinations, till the Cafes were made more special, and the Perfons concerned mominated.

Report being made to the States of a Controversie depending between the Province of Guelderland and the Blector of Brandenbourgh, about their Pretentions to several places in the Countrey of Cleves, they have ordered a Civil Letter to be sent to the said Elector, in order to the Composing of that Affair.

Arasterdam Feb 8. The 30th paft arrived at the Texel, the Pofillion one of the States men of Warr; the J.J. Inftant came in there the St. John from Malaga, the Prophet Moses from Norway, and the Hope from Bourdeaux. The 2. arrived 16 other thips from leverall parts, and amongs them the Justice from Guadaloup, fince that divers other thips are also come in, and there are mow riding before the Coafts the Captain Van Gelder and de Wilde with 8. or 9. merchants-ships under their conduct from Cadl?.

From Port St. Mary we are advited by fetters of December 31. that two dayes before, the Commander Van der Zaer was with 5. men of Warr under his command in chace of 7. Corfairs of Barbary, of whom 'twss beleived he might be able to give a good account, the Wind being then high, which hindred them from carrying out all their failes, and confequently would much dilable them in their flight.

Paris, Feb 13. We have lately received advice from Lorraine, informing us that upon intelligence that feveral of the Troops lately difmiffed by the Duke of Lorraine had been entertained upon the borders by the Sr. de Lounigny an old Commander of the Spanish Cavalry a and were under his command marching into the Netherlands for the Spanish fervice, contrary to the agreement made with the Duke of Lorraine; The Marshall de Crequy immediately ordered his forces to advance towards Pont-a-Maussian, which he entred with his sword in his hand, and took possible of the faits of the King a by affi ming that the faid Toops entred into the Spanish fervice, without first acquainting him with their intentions.

The Courier lately arrived from Candia, gives us an account of about 60 French Gentlemen who were killed at their fally made upon the Turks; and that the Duke de Roannez feems much diffatisted with the affairs of that plac-, and ha forre intentions of reimbarking himfelf about the midft of January, and to return home. Fron Lille we a e told, that our Commissioners have not

Fron Lille we a e told, that our Commissioners have nor yet atrived at any good issue after their long Conference and Negotia ion there, but that they are yet perswaded to continue there for some longer time, to expect the e ent of what may be proposed by the Deputies expected at Bruffells from the Hague, about a project of an Exchange to be presented to the view of His Most Christian Majesty, to prevent for the future all farther Caules of Disputs between the Two Crowns, upon the Point of Dependencies.

Tarmouth, F. br. 5. On Tuckiey laft came into this Road two fhips, one from Gallipolis laden with Oyls belonging to this place; the other belonging to Hull, laden homewards from Bourdeaux with Wines. That Night happened a Violent Storm, in which feveral fhips were forced from their Anchor, of which we hear not yet any farther News. Yefterday came in here a Veffel of this place, having with 20 other fhips been forced out of the Downs by the feverity of the weather.

This day put to lea four Vessels of this Town for the Fishing Trade in the North Seas. Here are now at Anchor in these Roads about 17 sail of ships bound for several Ports
