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HE Gentlemen of the Roketz furnmoned by the Cardinal Primate to meet at Lowitz, are most of them arrived there, and the Great Mareschal of the Crown, the Great Treasser of Lithuania, and some other Persons of the chiefest Quality, are gone to assist at this Assembly, the happy Success whereof will very much contribute to the Restablishing of the publick Pence and Tranquillity; and of this they have at this Court so good a Prospect, that the King thinks to set out the next week for Prossis, and has already sent part of his Houshold to Dantzick. The Troubles in Litiums continue to a great height, the Party of Oginky declaring, they will not lav down their Arms till they have such Assimances as may satisfie them, that the Nobility of that Province shall for the future be equal to that of Poland, and enjoy the same Rank and Priv ledges: In the mean while they continue to Ravage the Estate of the Great General Sapieba, who marches with all the hasse he can to the Relief of his Vassals. We hear likewise, That the Under-General of Lithuania, who was fin as his Majisty's Commissioner to Negociate an Agree, ment between the two differing Parties, has, instead of acquiting himself of that Commission, joyned with that of Ozinsky. The King has ordered the Senate to meer to consider of the most proper means to put a stop to these Disorders; as also what Answer to return to some of the Dollity, who desire they may have a Diet on Horseback; and to the Deputies of the Lithuanian Army, who press for the Payment of their Arrears. We have received from Rome the welcom News, That the Pope has acknowledged the King of Poland, and is ready to employ his Osices for procuring the Union of this Kingdom, which we hope will not be inestectual. Our Advices from the Frontiers inform us, That a great Body of Tarties are marched towards Caminiec, with a design to Revictual that place, and then make an Incursion into the Couetry about Lemberg.

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Dantzick, Fibruary 22. According to our Letters from Warfaw, the King of Poland would fer out on his Journey hither the 26th of this month, and part of his Guards are already arrived. This City has made great Preparations for his Majesty's Reception. By the Circular Letters which his Majesty has issued out for the Assembling of the General Diet on the 16th of April, he has also Cemmanded, that the particular ones, which must precede it, shall meet by the 5th of March. The Sieur a'Obrecke, one of the Magistrates of Strasbourg, is appointed to meet at Aix la Chapelle, as Commillioner from this Court, with those which the Emperor will likewise send thirher, for adjusting Matters concerning the Dutchess of Orleans's Preorder to it's making Head against that of the Turks, so as to hinder any Succours being brought to that place by Water. Count Bonde, Ambassador of Sweden, is detained at Rosterdam, the Yacht which is to carry his Excellency to England norbeing able to get out of the Maeje by reason of the Ice. Yesterday Baron Zeylorne, the third of the Imperial Ministers at the Treaty of Peace, left this Place, and is gone to Ratisbonne. 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

For Preventing and Punishing Immorality and Prophaneness.

og, a tion, with late, the eing late, yol nds, may you d if pereas The cannot but be deeply Senfible of the great Goodnels and Dercy of Almighty God, in putting an End to a Long, Bloody and Expensive Mar, by the Conclusion of an Honourable Peace, so The are not less touched with a Resentment, that notwithstanding this and many other great Blettings and Deliverances, Impiety, Prophaneness and Immorality do kill abound in this our Kingdom: And whereas nothing can probe a greater Disponour to a Well ordered Government, Where the Christian Faith is professed, nor is likelier to provoke God to withdraw his Wercy and Blettings from us, and intead thereof, to instit heavy and severe Judgments upon this Kingdom, than the open and aboved Pratice of Aice, Immorality and Prophaneness, which amongst many Hen has to much prevailed in this Dur Kingdom of late Pears, to the high Displeasure of Almighty God, the great Scandal of Christianity, and the illand statl Example of the rest of Dur Loving Subjects, who have vein Soverly Educated, and Whose Inclinations would lead them to the Exercise of Piety and Airtue, did they not daily find such frequent and repeated Instances of Dissource Living, Prophaneness and Impiety, which has in a great Beasure vein occasioned by the Reglect of the Pagistrates not putting in Execution those

And for the more Effectual Proceedings herein, We do hereby Direct and Command Dur Judges of ACI3es and Judices of Peace, to give Arict Charges at the respective Asizes and Sessions, for the due Prosecution and Punishment of all Persons that Hall presume to Diffend in any the Kinds aforesaid, and also of all Persons that, contrary to their Duty, shall be Remils or Regligent in Putting the said Laws in Execution, and that they do at their respective Assizes and Quarter Sessions of the Peace, cause this Our Proclamation to be publickly Read in Open Court immediately before the Charge is given. And The do hereby further Charge and Command every Minister in his respective Parish or Chapel, to Read or cause to be Read this Dur Proclamation, at least Four times in every Pear, immediately after Divine Service, and to incite and Air up their respective Auditozies to the Practice of Piety and Clirtue, and the Aboiding of all Immorality and Prophanenels. And to the end that all Clice and Debauchery may be prevented, and Religion and Airtue Pracised by all Officers, Private Soldiers, Pariners or others, Who are Imployed in Dur Service, either by Sea or Land, The do hereby strictly Charge and Command all Dur Commanders and Officers Whatsoever, That they do take Care to Aboid all Prophanenels, Debauchery and other Immoralities, and that by the Picty and Uirtue of their own Lives and Conversations they do set good Examples to all such as are under their Authority, and likewise to take Care and Inspect the Behaviour and Manners of all such as are under them, and to Punish all those who shall be Guilty of any the Offences afozesaid. And whereas several Wicked and Prophane Persons have presumed to Print and Publish several Pernicious Boks and Pamphlets, which contain in them Impious Doctrines against the Holy Arinity and other Fundamental Articles of Dur Faith, tending to the Subversion of the Chistian Religion, therefore for the Punishing the Authors and Publishers thereof, and for the Preventing such Impious Boks and Pamphlets being Published or Princed for the future, We do hereby strictly Charge and Prohibit all Persons that they do not presume to Write, Print or Publish any such Pernicious Boks or Pamphlets under the Pain of Incurring Durhigh Displeasure, and of being Punished according to the utmost Severity of the Law. And The do hereby strictly Charge and Require all Dur Loving Subjects to Discover and Apprehend such Person and Persons whom they hall know to be the Authors or Publishers of any such Woks or Pamphlets, and to bring them vefore some Justice of Peace or Chief Pagistrate, in order that they may be Proceeded against according to Law.
