The following Address from the Town of *Cardiffe*, was Presented to His Majesty by Sir *Charles Kemys* Bar. Mayor of the said Town, and Comtable of the Cattle, being introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Privy Seal.

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty.

The Humble Address of the Mayor, Bailiffs, Steward, Aldermen, Common Council, Burgesses and Inhabitants of the Antient Borough of *Cardiffe* in the County of *Glazorgan*.

Dread Sovereign!

Since in Your great Condescension You are graciously pleased to Delight Your Self in the Dutiful Tender of the Affections, as well as in the General Welfare of Your People, it would be an unpardonable Oblivion and Ingratitude, if any of Your Subjects should fail to testify the Sense they have of Your Royal Care and Inclination.

We therefore Your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, do with all Humility, Congratulate Your Majesty's happy Return to Your Kingdoms, the great and comprehensive Blessing which comforts and confirms to us the Happiness, You, with Successful Councils, apparent Dangers, had fought out for us, that of an Honourable Peace.

Thereby Re-establishing that Faith which was so early planted amongst us, and so lately like to have suffered Shipwrack, a Delinquency which calls for our highest Acknowledgements, and sincerest Joy.

You, Great SIR, have been much more than a Titular Defender of the Faith; 'Tis You who have secured our Liberties, and Legall Rights, all our present Felicities, under GOD, are Concentrated in You: So that Self-Interest (if not better Motives) must constrain us and all Your Subjects, unanimously to Pray, That God would Reward Your Heroick Achievements with a long ease and prosperous Reign for us, That Your Majesty may ever be Blessed with the Hearts of all Your People, and they with the continuance of Your Royal Favour; And that the Glorious Example of Your Affection to them, may remain as a Pattern to all succeeding Monarchs; and a perpetual Injunction to their Subjects to Love, Serve, and Obey, their King, till all Anarchy and Confusion be utterly Extirpated.

These are the Hopes and Supplications of all Your People, and of none more than of (Great SIR) Your Majesty's most Dutiful Subject, who had sooner Addressed themselves to You, had not the Right Honourable the Earl of Pembroke, who is the Lord of this Town, been then absent in Holland, in Negotiating that Peace which Your Majesty has so Honourably brought to pass, under the Banner of that Omnipotency, that is the God of Peace and God of War.

The humble Address of the Bishop and Clergy of the Diocese of *Bangor*; And

The humble Address of the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of *Bangor*, were likewise Presented to His Majesty.

The humble Address of the Sovereign, Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Recorder, Burgesses, Freemen, and Protestant Inhabitants of the Corporation of *Kinsale* in the Kingdom of *Ireland*; with the Commission Officers of the Garrison there, the Officers of His Majesty's Ships then in the said Port, and the Officers of His Majesty's Yard and Customs, was presented to His Majesty by the Right Honourable the Earl of *Inchiquin* and *Edward Southwall* Esq; Which Addresses His Majesty received very Graciously.

Mina, Jan. 29. The *Delavall* Galley is come in here from *Leban*, being bound to *Constantinople*; as is also the *Blackham*, Captain *Newman* Commander, from *Smirna*, bound for *England*. This morning arrived in our Harbour, the *Degrave*, Capt. *William Trog* from *Scanderoun*, going to *Leghorne*, and thence to *England*.

Leghorne, Feb. 17. A Dutch Man of War, of about 50 Guns, being Conveyed to several Merchant-Men bound hither from *Catiz*, was five days ago cast away in a Storm, about 4 Leagues to the West-

ward of this place, and the Captain, with all the Men, except 15; were drowned.

Venice, Feb. 19. Several Ships are fitting out here with all Expedition, who are to sail to the *Levant*; and the two Men of War lately built, called the *Red Cross* and the *Eagle*, will go with them: Part of the Equipage of the *Moscovite* Prince *Szeremet*, is arrived here, and himself is shortly expected. We hear from the *Levant*, That the Turkish Fleet was returned to *Constantinople* to refit, and that the Grand Signior and his Ministers had daily Consultations concerning the Measures to be taken against the next Campaign, and had sent for several of the principal Bassa's to have their Advice, who were daily expected at *Adrianople*.

Warsaw, Feb. 22. The Gentlemen of the *Rokorz* according to the Summons they received from the Cardinal Primate, met on the 18th Instant at *Lowitz*; The Assembly was very numerous, and began with much heat, and great Complaints against those of their Party, who they said, contrary to their Oath, were gone over to the King's Interest; several Articles were proposed to be presented to the King, and to be signed by his Majesty, for asserting their Rights and Privileges; some of which are drawn up in such terms that the King cannot in Honour comply with them; The Commissioners the King sent thither, endeavour all they can to bring them to a better Temper, and a few days more will let us see how this meeting will end. In the meantime the King defers his Journey to *Prussia*. The Tartars, after having carried a Convoy of Provisions to *Gaminiec*, made an Incurtion into the Country about *Lembergh*, and threaten further mischief.

Vienna, Feb. 26. Count *Stirum* is on his Departure for *Poland*, being to command the German Forces in that Kingdom. All hands are at work to get ready the new Vessels designed to join our Fleet on the *Danube*. It is said we shall have two Armies in the Field, and that while one besieges some considerable Town, the other will make head against the Turks. The Enemy seem very much to apprehend a Siege, and are preparing against it, at *Belgrade* and *Temeswar*. We hear also that they are fortifying *Vypalanka*.

Frankfort, March 5. The French give out, that they will Evacuate *Philipsbourg* the 15th Instant, at which time it is thought they will also spring the Mines for demolishing the Fortifications at *Eberembourg*. The Deputies of the Circle of the *Upper Rhine* are to assemble here, to consider of the Supplies demanded of them, towards maintaining the Garrison of *Philipsbourg*. The Dean of *Spiers* is gone with General *Thungen* to *Kihrweyer* to see if that place is convenient for the Residence of the Chamber of *Spiers* till the City of *Spiers* be repaired. The Elector Palatine desirous to come and reside at *Weynheim*, the Castle of that place is fitting up for his Reception.

Cologne, March 7. We hear from *Strasbourg*, that about 800 Protestant Families are removing from thence. From *Lorain* they write, that the French Forces which are at *Nancy* have begun to Demolish the Fortifications of that Place.

Hambourg, March 7. Our Letters from *Stockholme* tell us, That the Baron *Van Heckeren*, who resides at that Court on the part of the States General, has renewed the Alliance between *Sueden* and *Holland*; That the Treaty was signed on the 24th of the last month, and he designed to leave that place as yesterday, and return to the *Hague*. The Duke of *Holslein* is come hither, and his Equipages are preparing for his going about a fortnight hence to *Stockholme*, in order to his Marriage with the Princess *Hedwig Sophia*, Sister to the present King of *Sweden*. The Treaty of *Pimmenburg*, for adjusting the Differences between the King of *Denmark* and Duke of *Holslein*, touching the Duchy of *Holslein*, seems to be quite broke of. Mr. *Stepney* is arrived here, and intends in 3 or 4 days to proceed on his Journey to *Berlin*. Monsieur *Bidal*, who has formerly resided here on the part of the Crown of *France*, is returned hither with the same Character.

Brussels.

Brussels, March 9. It is said, the Elector of *Bavaria* will go in a Fortnight to view the Towns restored by the late Treaty of Peace to the Crown of *Spain*; and that he intends to take his way by *Ghent*, to *Courtray*, thence to *Oudenarde*, and *Aeth*, and so to *Mons*, where his Electoral Highness will tarry some few days, and will return hither by *Charleroy*; not intending to visit the City of *Luxembourg* before Summer. The Commissioners, which, according to the Treaty, are to meet at *Lisse* about the Limits of these Places, will not begin their Conferences so soon as was expected, the French Commissioners having Orders to repair to Court to receive new Instructions. The *Marquis de Conflans* is gone hence to take Possession of his Government of *Aeth*. We hear from the Frontiers, That the French Inspectors are taking a Review of all their Forces, in order to the Reform which was said to be intended in the beginning of this month; but is hitherto delayed. The Baron *Simeoni* has left this place in order to go to *England*, with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary from His Electoral Highness of *Bavaria*.

Hague, March 11. N. S. The Dutch Ambassadors to *France* have taken their Leave, and are on their departure for that Court. Most of the Deputies of the States of *Holland* and *Westfrizeland* are arrived here in order to begin their Assembly to-morrow; and this week those of the Admiralty are also expected.

Falmouth, Feb. 28. This morning sailed hence about 20 Dutch Ships and Doggers, bound home from *Bourdeaux*. The rest of the Ships bound to the Eastward are preparing to sail as soon as the Wind will permit.

Plymouth, March 1. This day came in His Majesty's Ships the *Nonfuch* and *Litchfield*, from the Eastward.

Portsmouth, March 3. Last Tuesday His Majesty's Ship the *Rye* came to *Spithead*, and failed again yesterday. Two Dutch Men of War that were there, are under sail, being bound home.

Deal, March 4. Yesterday in the Afternoon failed hence to the Westward His Majesty's Ships, the *Swan*, *Flamborough*, and *Deal-Castle*; and about the same time passed by here His Majesty's Ship the *Swiftsure*, going for the River.

Whitehall, March 4. Yesterday the Count *de Platten*, Chamberlain to his Electoral Highness of *Brunswick*, and his Envoy Extraordinary, had Audience of their Royal Highnesses the Princess and Prince of *Denmark*.

Whitehall, March 6. This Evening came in the Letters from *Holland* of Friday last; and bring an Account, That the Ambassadors from the States to the Court of *France*, would begin their Journey the Monday following; That the Dutch Commissioners in *France* not being able to adjust the Matters of Trade they were sent about, were preparing for their return home; or at least would defer all further Conferences till the arrival of the said Ambassadors. The Advices from *Poland* of the 28th of Feb. *N. S.* say. The Meeting at *Lowitz* had not had the good Effect, that was hoped for, and was earnestly labored by those the King had sent thither; for after having spent several days in very warm and fruitless Disputes, the Assembly broke up the 26th in great Disorder, and not without a strong Suspicion, that these Heats and Animositities are fomented from abroad.

Letters from *Paris* (by the way of *Dover*) of the 3d of this month *O. S.* give an Account, That the Earl of *Portland*, His Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary, made his publick Entry on the 27th past in the afternoon, with great Magnificence, being received by the *Marschal de Boufflers*; and on the first of this month had his publick Audience at *Verfailles*. The Particulars must be referred to the next Gazette.
