THE SAFEGUARDING OF INDUSTRIES (EXEMPTION)
NO. 3 ORDER, 1931, DATED 30TH JUNE, 1931,
MADE BY THE TREASURY UNDER SECTION 10 OF
THE FINANCE ACT, 1926 (16 & 17 GEO. 5, c. 22).

Whereas it is provided by sub-section (5) of Section 10 of the Finance Act, 1926 (16 & 17 Geo. 5, c. 22) that the Treasury may by order exempt from the duty imposed by Section one of the Safeguarding of Industries Act, 1921 (11 & 12 Geo. 5, c. 47), as amended by the Finance Act, 1926, for such period as may be specified in the Order, any article in respect of which the Board of Trade are satisfied on a representation made by a consumer of that article that the article is not made in any part of His Majesty's Dominions in quantities which are substantial having regard to the consumption of that article for the time being in the United Kingdom, and that there is no reasonable probability that the article will within a reasonable period be made in His Majesty's Dominions in such substantial quantities:

And whereas the Board of Trade are satisfied on representations made by consumers of the

articles specified in the Schedule to this Order that those articles are not made in any part of His Majesty's Dominions in quantities which are substantial having regard to the consumption of those articles for the time being in the United Kingdom and that there is no reasonable probability that those articles will within a reasonable period be made in His Majesty's Dominions in such substantial quantities.

Now, therefore we, the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury in pursuance of the powers conferred on us by the said Section 10 of the Finance Act, 1926, and of all other powers enabling us in that behalf hereby order as follows:

1. Such of the articles mentioned in the Schedule to this Order as are not entered under the Customs Acts before the 6th day of July, 1931, or which have not been removed from a bonded warehouse before that date, shall be exempt from the duty imposed by Section one of the Safeguarding of Industries Act, 1921, as amended by the Finance Act, 1926, for a period ending on the 31st day of December, 1931.

2. This Order may be cited as the Safeguarding of Industries (Exemption) No. 3 Order, 1931.
