THE King of Poland has put off for some days his Journey to *Warsaw*, intending first to meet the Elector of *Brandenburg*, who will arrive at *Cöningsberg* in *Prussia* towards the middle of this month. The opening of the general Diet will in all appearance be put off till the 15th of *May*; some of the Lesser Diets, which, according to the Custom are to precede, being adjourned to the 9th instant: Others, which have been held with good Success; and that of *Opatow* has resolved to send a Deputation to His Majesty to Assure him of their Loyalty, and to make some Requests to him; one of which is, that he would not hearken to the Desires of those who insist on a Diet at *Horseback*. In the mean while, his Majesty is providing all things for the Security of the Coast, and went last Wednesday to view the Fortifications of *Termunde* and *Putzk*, in order to direct the making such Additions and Reparations as might be necessary to render those Places of good Defence against any Force that may Attack by Sea.

Vienne, April 2. Besides the Auxiliary Troops which the Duke of *Saxe Gotha*, and the Bishop of *Würzburg*, are to send into *Hungary*, which amount to between 6 and 7000 men, the Circle of *Brandenburg* has agreed to furnish 2000 more, and the Archbishop of *Salzburg* about 1000, which are to march thither. The Gallies on the *Rhine* are fitting out with all possible diligence, and the 5 which are yet on the Stocks, will be launched in a few days, being to fall down that River without their Guns and Rigging, by reason of the Shallowness of the Water. The Duke of *Lotharing* has put off his Journey to *Nancy* till towards the end of this month. The *Danube* being now free from Ice, Recruits arrive daily from the several Parts of the Empire, which are sent hence by Water to *Hungary*. The Count de *Metternich* is lately here, who was General of the Artillery, Governor of *Great Glogan* in *Silesia*, and Colonel of a Regiment of Foot. Our Letters from the Frontiers say, A Seraskier being lately come to *Belgrade*, with a Reinforcement of fresh Forces, and a considerable Sum of Money for paying off that Garrison, was gone into *Bosnia* to give the necessary Orders for the security of that Frontier: And that the Turks were making Preparations for the Line they design along the *Sava*, intend-

ing likewise to Rebuild their small Forts along the *Danube*, which our Forces have Ruinated in the last Campaignes.

Berlin, April 5. The Elector of *Brandenburg* having been these 6 days at his Seat called *Oranienbourg*, about 4 miles distant from this place, returned hither this morning, and is now preparing for his Journey to *Prussia*, which he intends to begin the 9th instant, and to arrive the 17th at *Cöningsberg*. Count *Alfeld* is shortly expected here as Envoy from the King of *Denmark*; as is likewise Monsieur *Desalleurs*, with the same Character from *France*. Monsieur *Werpoop* arrived here lately in his way to *Warsaw*, whither he is going to Reside as Envoy Extraordinary from the Courts of *Hannover* and *Zell*, in the room of Monsieur *Hugo*, who is recalled home.

Strasbourg, April 7. The Cities of *Fribourg* and *Brissack* will now shortly be Evacuated, and the Marquis d'*Uxelles* intends to go thither in a few days, to be present at the delivering up of those Places. The four Forts between this City and the Bridge upon the *Rhine*, are quite Rased, as is likewise that at the end of the Bridge. No time is yet fixt set for the Evacuation of *Philipsburg* and the Fort of *Kiel*.

Hamburg, April 11. Our Burghers were assembled yesterday to make choice of a Senator in the Room of the Sieur *Krull*, lately deceased, and adjourned till Tuesday next. We have Advice from *Copenhagen*, That the King of *Denmark* has agreed to send his Troops that are in *Hungary*, into the King of *Poland's* Service, together with 1800 more from these Parts, which will go by Sea to *Rostock*, and thence will march into *Saxony*.

Brussels, April 13. The Elector of *Bavaria* made on the 8th instant his Entry at *Mons*, where he was received by the Governor and Magistracy of that place with much Civility and Respect. His Electoral Highness will thence go to *Marimont* and *Charleroy*, and is expected back next Tuesday. The King of *Spain* has conferred the Government of the Cittadel of *Antwerp*, vacant by the Promotion of Count *Grajales* to the Viceroyalty of *Navarre*, on the Count de *Pimentel*, who was Governor of *Charleroy*. Our last Letters from *Madrid* which are of the 27th of *March* say, His Catholic Majesty is perfectly Recovered of his Indisposition.

Hague, April 15. N. S. Monsieur *Hop*, who is appointed to Reside on the part of the States General at *Vienna*, is expected here this evening from *Amsterdam* to receive his Instructions in order to his

his Journey thither. Monsieur de Bonrepos, the French Ambassador, is preparing all things for his publick Entry. The Abbot of Polignac, late Envoy in Poland from the Court of France, having continued here some days, intends to morrow to set out for Paris. All our Letters from Spain confirm the Recovery of his Catholick Majesty's Health.

Paris, April 16. N. S. The Prince of Monaco, who has been some time at this Court, set out last week on his return home. The Sieur Rousseau de Chamois, went hence some days ago for Ratisbonne, with the Character of his Most Christian Majesty's Plenipotentiary to the Imperial Diet. The Sieur d'Obrecht, who is appointed to assist as Commissary on the part of France, at the Conferences to be held at Aix la Chapelle, for adjusting the Dutcheffs of Orleans's Pretensions on the Palatinate, is shortly to go for Strasbourg, being to remain there till the day is fixed when the said Conferences shall begin; as will likewise Monsieur du Hautois, who is sent thither on that Princess's behalf. The French King comes to Meudon this Evening, and intends to remain there the rest of the week, after which, the Court will remove to Marly. By the Letters from Madrid of the 25th of March, we have an account, That his Catholick Majesty is so well recovered of his late Indisposition, as to Dispatch Business, and that on the 21th he went abroad in his Coach, which is confirmed by our Letters of the 28th from the same place, which came in yesterday. Our Advices from Strasbourg of the 9th instant, say, The Administrator of the Bishoprick of Spire had taken Possession of Philipsbourg, and had Sworn the Officers of that City in the Name of the Elector of Triers, tho' our Troops had not Evacuated that place, for the doing of which no days is yet fixed.

Falmouth, April 4. Yesterday sailed hence the Spanish Alliance with one Mail for the Groyne, as did likewise several outward bound Merchant Ships for their respective Ports.

Plymouth, April 5. His Majesty's Ship the Bedford sailed hence this day for the Isle of May, as did likewise about 24 sail of outward bound Merchant-men for the Barbadoes, Virginia, and other Places.

Chester, April 6. The Remainder of Col. Roffe's Regiment of Dragons and Lieut. General Bellasis's Regiment of Foot sailed out of Highlake yesterday, but the Wind having changed the same night, it is feared they will be forced back.

Deale, April 9. His Majesty's Ship the Portland came in here last Thursday. Yesterday came down the River His Majesty's Ship the Rupert Prize and the Vukure Fire-ship.
