

and 7th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 37, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for assigning the right of Patronage of the District of Airedale with Fryston, in the County of York and in the Diocese of Wakefield:

"Whereas by an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the 15th day of May, 1930, and published in the London Gazette on the 27th day of the same month, the said District of Airedale with Fryston was, under the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Act, constituted partly out of the Parish of Ferry Fryston, partly out of the District Parish of All Saints, Pontefract, and partly out of the New Parish (sometime District) of Saint Paul, Glass Houghton, all in the said County of York and said Diocese of Wakefield:

"And whereas no assignment of the Patronage of the said District of Airedale with Fryston was made by the said Order and no such assignment has since been made:

"And whereas there has been contributed and paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England a capital sum of £2,000 towards the cost of erecting a permanent Church for the said District of Airedale with Fryston:

"And whereas the said capital sum of £2,000 has been so contributed as aforesaid upon the understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of Patronage of the said District of Airedale with Fryston, and, when such District shall have become a New Parish, then of the said New Parish, and of the nomination of the Minister or Incumbent thereto should be assigned in the manner which is hereinafter recommended and proposed:

"And whereas the principal Contributors of the said capital sum of £2,000 have nominated to us the Bishop for the time being of the said Diocese of Wakefield as the person to whom they desire that the Patronage and right of nomination and presentation of and to the said District or New Parish of Airedale with Fryston should be assigned, and we are satisfied that the said assignment may properly be effected:

"Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that the whole right of Patronage of the said District of Airedale with Fryston, and, when such District shall have become a New Parish as aforesaid, then of the said New Parish, and of the nomination of the Minister or Incumbent thereto shall without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this Scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette be assigned to and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the Right Reverend James Buchanan, now Bishop of Wakefield, and by his successors in the same Bishopric for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions

of the hereinbefore mentioned Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Wakefield.

**WHEREAS** the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme bearing date the 23rd day of June, 1932, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting the union of the Benefice (being a Rectory) of Copgrove and the Benefice (being a Rectory) of Staveley, both of which Benefices are situate in the County of York and in the Diocese of Ripon:

"Whereas Commissioners appointed at our request by the Right Reverend Arthur, Bishop of Ripon, pursuant to the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, to hold Inquiries concerning (inter alia) the said two Benefices of Copgrove and Staveley and the Benefice of Brearton, in the same County and Diocese, duly made their Reports to the said Bishop of Ripon and therein recommended the union of the said two Benefices of Copgrove and Staveley and the terms for effecting the union including alterations of boundaries affecting the Parishes of the said Benefices of Copgrove and Brearton and the Parish of the Benefice of Ripley in the same County and Diocese, and the said Bishop of Ripon signified in writing his approval of the said Reports:

"And whereas we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have prepared this Scheme for the said union of Benefices based upon the terms recommended in the said Reports:

"And whereas both of the said two Benefices of Copgrove and Staveley are now full, the Reverend Canon Isaac Albert Smith being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Copgrove and the Reverend Albert Victor
