towards which a grant of 50 per cent. has been promised by Your Majesty's Government from the Road Fund.

We desire to tender to Her Majesty the Queen our humble and grateful thanks for Her gracious presence here to-day, and for the encouragement which that affords us in our public work. We earnestly pray that Your Majesties may long be spared in good health to reign over Your loyal and devoted subjects. May it please Your Majesty to declare the new Lambeth Bridge open to the public.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return the following gracious Answer:—

I thank you for the loyal and dutiful Address which you have presented to me on behalf of the London County Council.

The pleasure that the Queen and I feel at taking part in to-day's ceremony is increased by the recollection that, fifty-three years ago, my beloved Parents declared the former Lambeth Bridge open to the public.

The intervening period has seen great alterations in the social conditions of London. The population of the vast area called "Greater London" has increased by three millions, and this expansion has been accompanied by other momentous changes. Among the most notable has been the wonderful transformation of the means of transport brought about by the invention of the motor vehicle, and affecting so vitally the habits of the people of this as of other countries.

These changes have created great problems in the Central Area under the administration of the London County Council, and have placed upon that Body heavy responsibilities. guide and control the development of London, to improve the housing of its population and its means of communication, and to raise the standard of the ever-growing amenities of daily life, are tasks of paramount importance and complexity. You have provided London with a new Bridge, worthy to be compared with those already spanning the river. I am glad to have this opportunity of evincing my personal interest in the traffic problems of London and in any scheme that may promote the continued progress of the two important districts which this bridge will connect.

The new Lambeth Bridge will ever stand a monument to the skill and energy of the engineers, architects, foremen, craftsmen and workers of all grades, and I offer my hearty congratulations to the Chairman and Members of the London County Council upon the successful completion of this great enterprise.
