

of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Rattlesden shall be transferred to the said Walter Godfrey, Bishop of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich, and his successors in the same Bishopric, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Walter Godfrey, Bishop of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich, and by his successors in the same Bishopric for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 23rd and 24th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 142, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Supplemental Scheme bearing date the 14th day of July, 1932, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the 23rd and 24th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 142, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Supplemental Scheme under the 25th section of that Act with reference to the United Benefice and Rectory of Holy Trinity with Saint Jude, Upper Chelsea, in the County of Middlesex and in the Diocese of London:

"Whereas by an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the 9th day of May, 1892, and published in the London Gazette on the 13th day of the same month, uniting the Benefice of Upper Chelsea and the Benefice of Saint Jude, Upper Chelsea, it was directed that the Church of Saint Jude,

Upper Chelsea, should be left standing, and should be used as a Chapel of Ease to the Church of the said United Benefice, and for the performance therein of Divine Service, or for any purpose or purposes authorised by section 19 of the said Act, so long as the Bishop of the Diocese should by his licence permit:

"And whereas by the same Order it was directed that in the event of the Bishop of the Diocese refusing or withdrawing such licence the yearly sum or stipend of £166 which prior to the union of the above mentioned Benefices was payable by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, out of our Common Fund to the Incumbent of the Vicarage of Saint Jude, Upper Chelsea, should thereupon cease to be payable to the Rector or Incumbent of the said United Benefice, and should be transferred to some other Benefice in the metropolis or in the vicinity thereof:

"And whereas the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Arthur Foley, Bishop of London, has certified to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, by a certificate under his hand and Episcopal Seal dated the 26th day of January, 1932, that he has refused or withdrawn his licence or permission for the use of the said Church of Saint Jude, Upper Chelsea, as a Chapel of Ease to the Church of the said United Benefice, and for the performance therein of Divine Service or for any purpose or purposes authorized by section 19 of the said Act:

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be desirable that notwithstanding the fact that full services have ceased to be held in the said Church of Saint Jude, Upper Chelsea, the said yearly sum or stipend of £166 should continue to be paid by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, to the Rector or Incumbent of the said United Benefice:

"And whereas it appears to us to be desirable also that the provision contained in the said Order in Council that the proceeds of any sale or sales of the site and materials of the said Church of Saint Jude, Upper Chelsea, are to be applied towards the cost of building a new Church within the limits of the Metropolis should be amended so that the area within which such new Church may be built shall be extended to the vicinity of the Metropolis as defined by the Union of Benefices Act, 1898:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of London (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme and sealed the same with his Episcopal Seal), with the consent of the Right Honourable Gerald Oakley, Earl Cadogan, as the Patron of the said United Benefice (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme), and with the consent of the Parochial Church Council of the United Parish of Holy Trinity with Saint Jude, Upper Chelsea (in testimony of which consent this Scheme is signed by the Chairman presiding at a Meeting of the Parochial Church Council held for the purpose of giving such consent and by two other Members of the Council present at such Meeting), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that the provisions of the said Order in Council of the 9th day of May, 1892, shall be altered and varied so that (1) as from the 26th day of
