

Lane, and extending thence first southward and then south westward along the middle of Water Lane for a distance of $16\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to the point where it reaches the northern side of the stream which flows from Whitchurch through West Town and Brislington into the River Avon, and extending thence first southward to and then first south westward and then southward along the middle of the said stream for a distance of 17 chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries West Town Lane across such stream, and extending thence first south westward and then westward along the middle of West Town Lane for a distance of 18 chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the Bristol and North Somerset Line of the Great Western Railway across West Town Lane, and extending thence southward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of $44\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said Parish of Brislington from the said Parish of Whitchurch.

"2. And also all those contiguous portions of the said New Parish of Saint Anne, Brislington, and of the said New Parish of the Holy Nativity, Knowle, which taken together, are bounded upon the north west by the New Parish of Saint Silas, Bristol, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the north east, upon the south, and upon the south west, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Silas, Bristol, from the said New Parish of Saint Anne, Brislington, at the centre of the bridge which carries the said Bristol and North Somerset Line of the Great Western Railway across the River Avon, and extending thence south eastward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of $25\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries Sandy Park Road across such line of railway, and extending thence westward along the middle of Sandy Park Road (thereby following the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Anne, Brislington, from the said Parish of Brislington) for a distance of 11 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Bath Road, and extending thence first north westward and then westward along the middle of Bath Road (thereby following in part the last mentioned boundary and crossing the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Anne, Brislington, from the said New Parish of the Holy Nativity, Knowle) for a distance of $32\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the place where the boundary which divides the said New Parish of the Holy Nativity, Knowle, from the said New Parish of Saint Anne, Brislington, diverges northward from following the northern side of Bath Road, and extending thence northward to and along the last mentioned boundary for a distance in all of $3\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to the point in the middle of the River Avon where the boundaries of the said New Parish of the Holy Nativity, Knowle, of the said New Parish of Saint Anne, Brislington, and of the said New Parish of Saint Silas, Bristol, all meet."

And whereas the said Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Representation, and

to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Bristol.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme bearing date the 28th day of July, 1932, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for appropriating the Church of Saint James the Less, situate within the Parish of the Benefice of Bristol, Saint James, in the City of Bristol, and in the Diocese of Bristol, for such purposes as are set forth in the 24th Section of the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923:

"Whereas the said Church of Saint James the Less, Bristol, was consecrated on the 17th day of April, 1873, and is now a Chapel of Ease to the Parish Church of the said Benefice of Bristol, Saint James:

"And whereas the said Church of Saint James the Less, Bristol, has ceased to be used and is no longer required for the purposes of Divine Service:

"Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, with the consent of the Right Reverend George, Bishop of Bristol (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme), do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:—

"1. That as from the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme the said Church of Saint James the Less, Bristol, and the site thereof together with any other ground belonging thereto (not being a graveyard or burial ground) shall be appropriated for any educational or charitable purpose or purposes in connection with the Church of England having in view the spiritual, intellectual, moral or social welfare of the parishioners of the said Parish of Bristol, Saint James, and others, and shall be held in accordance with the provisions of the 24th Section of the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, upon such trusts and subject to such conditions, regulations and provisions as, in accordance with the same Section, the Bishop of Bristol shall by Deed declare and appoint.
