(1) The Proclamation so far as relates to Our Union of South Africa is hereby revoked and accordingly the said Act shall cease to apply to and to be in force in Our Union of South Africa.

(2) This Proclamation may be cited as the Union of South Africa (Coinage) Proclamation 1932.

Given at Our Court at *Buckingham Palace*, this tenth day of *November*, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and thirty-two, and in the twenty-third year of Our Reign.

WHEREAS in pursuance of the Bishops Resignation Act, 1869, a representation has been made to His Majesty by the Most Reverend and Right Honourable Cosmo Gordon, by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, Primate of All England and Metropolitan, at the instance of the Right Reverend William Shuckburgh, by Divine Permission Lord Bishop of Lincoln, and as such a Bishop of a Diocese within and of the Province of Canterbury that the said Bishop is desirous of resigning his Bishopric (such resignation to take formal effect upon the 14th day of November, 1932), by reason that he is incapacitated by permanent physical infirmity, from the due performance of his duties as Bishop:

And whereas His Majesty is satisfied of such incapacity and that the said Bishop has canonically resigned:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to declare, and it is hereby declared, that the said Bishopric of Lincoln shall become vacant on the 14th day of November, 1932, and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased

to direct, and it is hereby directed, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the Diocese of Lincoln.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme bearing date the 14th day of July, 1932, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting the union of the Benefice (being a Rectory) of Hopesay and the Benefice (being a Vicarage) of Edgton, both of which Benefices are situate in the County of Salop and in the Diocese of Hereford:

"Whereas Commissioners appointed at our request by the Right Reverend Lisle, Bishop of Hereford, pursuant to the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, to inquire into and report upon the union of the said two Benefices of Hopesay and Edgton duly made their Report to the said Bishop of Hereford and therein recommended the union of the said two Benefices and the terms for effecting the union, and the said Bishop of Hereford signified in writing his approval of the said Report:

"And whereas we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have prepared this Scheme for the union of the said two Benefices which Scheme is based upon the terms recommended in the said Report but with the assent of the said Bishop of Hereford embodies certain modifications thereof:

"And whereas the said Benefice of Hopesay is now full, the Reverend Arthur Clement Buss being the present Incumbent thereof and the said Benefice of Edgton is at present vacant:

"Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the consent of the said Lisle, Bishop of Hereford (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme), and with the consent of the said Arthur Clement Buss (testified by his signing this Scheme), do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:—

"1. That the said Benefice of Hopesay and the said Benefice of Edgton shall be permanently united together and form one Benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Hopesay with Edgton' and that such United Benefice shall be included in and form part of the Rural Deanery of Clun, but the Parishes of the said Benefices shall continue distinct in all respects.
