Messina, April 7. N. S.

Three days ago sailed hence the *Vine Pink*, bound for London, with Oils from Gallipoli, having left that place in Company of the *Great Russell*, Captain Elton, and the *Alexander* Galley, Captain Winter Commander, who are gone directly for England.

Leghorne, April 28. On the 21th instant Sir Lambert Blackwell His Majesty of Great Britain's Envoy Extraordinary, set out from hence, and arrived the next evening at Florence, being met 5 miles out of Town by the Great Duke's Treasurer, and other Persons of Quality, in their Coaches, with 6 Horses each, who conducted him into the City. The *Concord* Merchant Ship is lately sailed hence for England, as is likewise the *Neptune*, Captain Wilson Commander for Newfoundland.

Venice, May 2. A great Council of War has lately been held here, in which, among other things, a new Proposal was made by Major General Richards, for fortifying the Isthmus of Corinth, which met with great Approbation from the rest of the Council. Our Fleet will consist this Summer in about 30 Men of War from 60 to 80 Guns, and our Land Forces in about 16000 men; and every thing is preparing with all possible Expedition for an early Campaign, both at Sea and Land. We have Advice from Constantinople, That the Turkish Fleet for this Summer Service in the Archipelago, will not consist in above 22 Men of War, the Moscovites being so strong in the Black Sea, that they will have occasion to employ a great part of their Fleet on that side. An Express is arrived here from the Ambassador of this State at Vienna, upon which it is said a Power will be sent him, to Treat of a Peace with the Ottoman Port, jointly with the Ministers of the Emperor and the King of Poland. Our last Advice from Rome say, The Pope had been ill of the Gout, but was now well Recovered; And that the Cardinal Primate of Poland does very much sollicite that Court that they would interpose their Offices in his behalf to procure him a Reimbursement from France of the Charge he has been at for Maintaining the Prince of Conti's Interest.

Warsaw, May 3. The General Dyet which met here the 16th of the last Month, broke up on Monday last, by reason the Deputies of Lithuania could not be prevailed with to withdraw their Protest; and besides, many other Members were absent. But before they separated, several of the Deputies protested against holding a Dyet on Horseback, which was so much insisted on by those of Lithuania, and desired the King and his Ministers would continue their good Offices towards appeasing the troubles in that Dutchy. We expect to hear by our next Letters from Lowitz, that the Gentlemen of the Rokotz met at the appointed time, which was the 5th Instant, and from the Disposition most of that Party seem to be in at present, there is good reason to hope, they will at last submit to the King. The Palatine of Kalisch, who has hitherto appeared the most violent of them, is in nomination for a considerable

Office that is become vacant, and the Primate finding he is like to be left the last to make his Accommodation, begins to shew more inclination to accept of the Offers made him by this Court. Signior Pauluzzi, Extraordinary Nuncio from the Pope, had last Monday his Publick Audience of the King, with the usual Ceremonies. Yesterday the Bishop of Raab, and the Margrave of Bareith having taken their leaves of the King, left this place and are gone for Dresden. There is much discourse that some Dispatches are lately arrived here from the Imperial Court, relating to Proposals of Peace made by the Grand Signior, and that Ministers will be appointed to go and Treat about the same on the part of this Crown. In the mean while the King causes preparations to be made for carrying on the War against the Turks; his Forces that are in Prussia will soon begin to march towards Ruytemberg, and he intends to be going shortly thither, to make the Campaign in Person. Our last Account from Lithuania say, the Heats of the two Parties in that Dutchy begin somewhat to abate, so that there is hopes those differences may be adjusted.

Dantzick, May 7. Mr. Stepney Envoy Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great Britain, arrived here the 5th instant, and will proceed in a day or two to Warsaw, being in the Name of the King his Master to Congratulate the King of Poland on his Accession to the Crown. We hear, The Elector of Brandenburg arrived the 4th instant at Coningsberg.

Vienna, May 3. The Garrison of Leopoldstade in Hungary, who lately mutined against their Officers, have not yet submitted, but so soon as their Provisions are spent, of which they have only enough for a few days, they will be necessitated to surrender, in case they be not forced to it sooner, by the two Regiments that are ordered thither for this purpose. The Turks at Belgrade and Temeswaer are very apprehensive of being besieged the next Summer, and at Belgrade they are making several new Fortifications, and for the more speedy finishing of the same, have summoned all the Villages thereabouts to send each a certain number of Men to be employed in this work. The Letters from Bosnia give an Account that the Bassa of that Province having drawn together a Body of several thousand Men, they went towards

Bihatz, in order to make an incursion into the German Territories on that side, but understanding that the Imperialists had possessed themselves of the Passes through which they were to march, the Enemy retired very hastily, and in their retreat were fallen upon by a Party of Germans who took several prisoners. Prince Francis youngest Brother to the Duke of Lorraine, left this place last Monday on his journey towards Lorraine.

Frankfort, May 11. Our last Advices from Strasbourg say, Several Persons of Quality were lately arrived there from Lorraine, to wait for the arrival of the Duke of Lorraine, who is shortly expected at that place. We hear from Cassell, That the Landgrave of that place was returned thither, and had given Audience to the Count de Bennebourg, who was sent from the Court at Vienna to press the Restitution of the Town of Rbinsfeldt, to the Landgrave of Hesse Rbinsfeldt, the French delaying to evacuate the Places on the Rhine till that be done. Our Letters from Ratisbonne bring an Account, That the Sieur de Charmos, Envoy from the French Court, has notified his arrival to the Diet, and delivered his Credentials. The Baron of Hagen, Minister of the Houses of Saxe Cobourg and Saxe Gotha has done the like.

Cologne, May 13. The Electoral Prince of Bavaria arrived here yesterday in his way to Flanders, and was received with much Respect, being Saluted with the Cannon of the City. The Demolishing of Dinant is forwarding with all possible Expedition, and the French intend to add some new Fortifications to the Town of Givet. We hear the Elector Palatine left Aix la Chapelle yesterday, and that his Electoral Highness intends to remain a few days at Dusseldorp, and thence to take a Journey into the Palatinat.

Brussels, May 14. The great Council of this City has lately agreed to a Subsidy of 50000 Florins for the Service of his Catholick Majesty, to be raised on the Beer spent within the Districts of the same, besides their part of the 120000 Florins which the States of Brabant have consented to give, and are at their next Meeting to consider of the means to raise their Share of this last Sum. The Elector of Bavaria continues at Marimont. We hear from the French Conquests, That a Regiment of Suisses had lately passed through Lisse, going from Valenciennes to Menin, to Supply the Place of the Regiment of Rouillon, which was marched to Spres, in lieu of another that was gone into Languedoc. They add, That the French will make in few days a farther Reform of their Troops on that Frontier.

Hague, May 16. The Sieur Nieuport, Commissioner from this State for Adjusting Matters of Trade at the French Court, is expecting his Dispatches, which as soon as he has received he will return to Paris. The Deputies of the Admiralties have been in Conference with those of the States of Holland and Westfrizeland, who, 'tis said, are to separate to-morrow, and will not assemble again for a month or six weeks. We hear the Moscovite Embassy will set forward next Monday from Amsterdam for Vienna, and Monsieur Hassels is appointed to conduct them to the Frontiers of this State. Orders have been sent to the Governors of all the Places belonging to the States General through which they are to pass, to pay them all due Respect. Monsieur de Bonrepos, the French Ambassador, went yesterday for Aix la Chapelle. We hear, the Baron de Bosni, who left this place some days ago in order to return to Poland, met with an Express, that brought him Directions from the King his Master, to remain here till farther Orders, and that he is accordingly returning thither.

Paris, May 17. N. S. The 11th instant the Earl of Manchester, Ambassador Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great Britain to the Republick of Venice, arrived here in his return to England. The 15th, The Earl of Portland went to St. Cloud, to visit the Duke of Orleans; and in the Evening to Versailles, to wait on the Most Christian King; My Lord Manchester went with him, and was received at both Places with great Civility and Respect. On Tuesday next My Lord Portland is to have his Audience of Leave. The Sieur d'Obrecht, being appointed by this Court to Confer with the Baron de Wiser, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector Palatin, concerning the Dutchess of Orleans Pretensions on the Palatinat, they have had several Conferences together for this purpose. The City of Danzigke have Writ a Respectful Letter to the French King, to Excuse their not being able to receive

the Prince of Conti in a manner more suitable to his Quality; when he was there; and upon this it's believed their Ships that were taken by the Sieur du Bart will be restored. They write from *Marseilles*, That the Prince de Vaudemont was gone thence in a Galley to Final; and from this last mentioned place would continue his Journey to Milan by Land. Four French Men of War are ordered to Sail about the latter end of this month from Toulon; 4 from Brest and 2 from Port Louis, to Cruise as is said against the Corsairs of Barbary. Our last Letters from Madrid are of the 24th past, when the King of Spain was much better, and held his Resolution of going with the Queen to Toledo.

Plymouth, May 6. This day His Majesty's Ships the *Loo*; and the *Lyme*, came into this Port with the homeward bound Canary Fleet.

Whitehall, May 7. His Majesty being Graciously Pleas'd to bestow a Mark of His Royal Favour upon John Rogers Sen. of *Wisdom* in the County of *Devon*, Esquire, has Conferred upon him the Dignity of a Baronet of this Kingdom.
