## PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 8th and 9th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 70, of the Act of the 14th and 15th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 97, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 55, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Representation, bearing date the 4th day of May, 1933, in the words and figures following, that is to

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 8th and 9th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 70, of the Act of the 14th and 15th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 97, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 55, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Representation as to the assignment of a Consolidated Chapelry to the consecrated Church of Saint Philip, Weston Mill, situate within the Parish of Saint Budeaux, in the County of Devon and in the Diocese of Exeter:

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said Parish of Saint Budeaux, of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint Boniface, Devonport, and of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint Thomas, North Keyham, both in the said County and Diocese, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the Schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such Parish and New Parishes:

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said Parish of Saint Budeaux, of the said New Parish of Saint Boniface, Devonport, and of the said New Parish of Saint Thomas, North Keyham, should be formed into a Consolidated Chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said Church of Saint Philip, Weston Mill, situate as aforesaid:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Lord William Gascoyne Cecil, Bishop of Exeter, as such Bishop and also as the Patron, in right of his See, as well of the Vicarage of the said New Parish of Saint Boniface, Devonport, as of the Vicarage of the said New Parish of Saint Thomas, North Keyham, and with the consent of the Venerable Francis Whitfield Daukes, Clerk in Holy Orders, Archdeacon of Plymouth and Vicar or Incumbent of the Vicarage of the Parish of Saint Andrew, Plymouth in the said County and Diocese, and as such Vicar or Incumbent the Patron of the Vicarage of the said Parish of Saint Budeaux (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this Representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous

portions of the said Parish of Saint Budeaux. of the said New Parish of Saint Boniface, Devonport, and of the said New Parish of Saint Thomas, North Keyham, which are described in the Schedule hereunder written. all which portions, together with boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed. should be united and formed into one Consolidated Chapelry for the said Church of Saint Philip, Weston Mill, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Philip, Weston

"THE SCHEDULE to which the foregoing-Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Philip, Weston Mill, in the County of Devon and in the Diocese of Exeter, comprising:-

"I. All that portion of the Parish of Saint Budeaux, in the said County and Diocese, which is bounded upon the east by the Parish of Pennycross, upon the south partly by the New Parish of Saint Mark, Ford, Devonport, and partly by the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint Thomas, North Keyham, upon the west and upon the north west by the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint Boniface, Devonport, all in the said County and Diocese, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the north, by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Boniface, Devonport, from the said Parish of Saint Budeaux, reaches the middle of the road called Westonmill Hill, and extending thence eastward along the middle of Westonmill Hill for a distance of 23½ chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the south western end of the fence forming the south eastern boundary of the close numbered 155 upon the Ordnance Survey Map of the Civil Parish of Saint Budeaux published in the year 1914 on the scale of 25 inches to a mile and also upon the map or plan annexed to this Representation, and extending thence north eastward to and along the said fence for a distance of 1 chain or thereabouts to the point where it reaches the western side of the stream which flows past the eastern side of the said close into Ham Brook, and extending thence first eastward to and then first northward and then in various directions along the middle of the said stream for a distance in all of 21 chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said Parish of Saint Budeaux from the said Parish of Pennycross.

"II. And also all that contiguous portion of the said New Parish of Saint Boniface, Devonport, which is bounded upon the south, upon the south east, upon the east, and upon the north east by the said Parish of Saint Budeaux and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the north west and upon the south west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said Parish of Saint Budeaux from the said New Parish of Saint Boniface, Devonport, at a point in the middle of Peter's Park Lane opposite to the northern end of the fence forming the western boundary of the close numbered 112 upon the above mentioned maps, and extending thence first southward to and then first southward
