

At the Court at *Buckingham Palace*, the 24th day of *July*, 1933.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Minister of Health, after giving 10 days' previous notice of his intention in that behalf, has, under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by subsequent enactments, made a Representation to His Majesty in Council that for the protection of the Public Health, the opening of any new burial ground in the City of Birmingham, in the County of Warwick, save with the previous approval of the Minister of Health, should be prohibited, and that burials should be discontinued therein as hereinafter directed:

And whereas by an Order in Council of the 25th May, 1933, Notice of such Representation was given, and it was ordered that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 6th day of July next, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that no new burial ground shall be opened in the said City of Birmingham save with the previous approval of the Minister of Health, and that burials shall be discontinued therein as follows, viz.:-

BIRMINGHAM.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Handsworth St. Mary, in the said City, and in the Churchyard attached thereto.

Provided that—

(a) In any vault or walled grave now existing in the said Churchyard, burial may be allowed subject to there being room and to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b) In any earthen grave now existing in the said Churchyard, the burial may be allowed of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than four feet six inches below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave, and to the approval of the Medical Officer of Health for the City of Birmingham.

THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS ACT, 1868.

THE GOVERNING BODY OF RUGBY SCHOOL having, on the 11th day of July, 1933, in virtue of the powers conferred upon them by the above-named Act, made a Statute in the terms appended hereto amending the existing Statutes of the said School, the said Statute is hereby published in the London Gazette in accordance with the provisions in that behalf contained in the said Act.

And Notice is hereby given, that any person, body of persons, or body corporate, authorized in that behalf by the said Act, may, within two months after the publication of this notification, petition His Majesty in Council to withhold His approval from the whole or any part of the said Statute.

STATUTE made by the Governing Body of Rugby School on the eleventh day of July, one thousand nine hundred and thirty-three.

That the following alterations be made to the Statutes, namely:—

Statute XI.—That in Statute XI, for the words "the number of Major Foundationalers shall be limited to 12, and of Minor Foundationalers to 24", there be substituted "the number of Major Foundationalers shall be limited to 14, and of Minor Foundationalers to 22".

Statute XVI.—That after the words "the boy's Record at the Lower School of Lawrence Sheriff" there be added the words "the length of residence of the parents, and their connection with Rugby School."

TENDERS FOR TREASURY BILLS.
