

operation on the appointed day, and that the appointed day shall be such day as His Majesty may by Order in Council appoint, and that different days may be appointed for different purposes and for different provisions of the Act:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The first day of October, nineteen hundred and thirty-three shall be the appointed day for the provisions of the Act specified in the first column of Part I of the Schedule hereto for the purposes specified in the second column thereof.

2. The thirty-first day of December, nineteen hundred and thirty-three shall be the appointed day for the provisions of the Act specified in the first column of Part II of the Schedule hereto for the purposes specified in the second column thereof.

3. The Interpretation Act, 1889, applies for the purpose of the interpretation of this Order as it applies for the purpose of the interpretation of an Act of Parliament.

4. This Order may be cited as the Pharmacy and Poisons Act, 1933 (Date of Commencement) Order (No. 1), 1933.

WHEREAS His Majesty, by virtue of the authority conferred upon Him by the Copyright Act, 1911, 1-2 Geo. 5, c. 46, was pleased to make an Order in Council dated the 3rd day of February, 1915 (hereinafter referred to as the Copyright (United States of America) Order, 1915, S.R. & O. 1915, No. 130), extending in certain of His Majesty's Dominions, Colonies and Possessions the protection of the said Act to the unpublished works of citizens of or residents in the United States of America:

And whereas His Majesty is satisfied that the Government of the United States of America has made or has undertaken to make such provision as it appears to His Majesty expedient to require for the protection of works entitled to copyright under the provisions of Part I of the said Act in Palestine (excluding Trans-Jordan):
