Venice, June 14. N. S.

Courier is lately arrived here from Victina, with Letters relating to the Negociation for a Peace with the Turks, and will be dispatched back to morrow; and in all likelihood there will be a Treaty begun this Summer in Hungary; but at the same time, the Preparations for the War are not neglected; The Senate have encreased both their Fleet and Army, and they are in so good condition as gives us very reasonable Hopes of their obtaining further Advantages upon the Enemy this Campagne. Another Con-voy is prepared for the Levant, which, besides, a confiderable quantity of Provisions and Ammunition, will carry thither above 1000 new raised Soldiers. A rich Armenian has offered to Lend the Senate 25000 Ducats at Interest, and the same has been accepted of, as likewise that of Signior Radet:i, who proposes to give 100000 Ducats on Condition he may be made a Nobleman of Venice. We have Letters from Adrianople of the 20th past, which say, The Sultan had given Orders to his Forces that were encamped near that place, to be ready by the beginning of this month to march towards Sophia, intending to keep there the Bairan, and expect the coming up of the Troops from Asia. These Letters add, That the Sultan has resolved to send an Ambasfador to Persia, and had pitched upon Mehemet Bey for this Embassy, and ordered a Present of 12 size Horses to be sent by him to the Sophy of Persia. We have from Delimetric. That the Foresce We hear from Dalmatia, That the Forces which the Turks had drawn together near that Frontier, are marched to Hungary.

Warsaw, June 17. The Differences in Lithuanis give the Ministers of this Court a great deal of Employment, and as yet there appears but little hopes of compoling them, by any mild Methods, and 'tis therefore thought, that the King of Poland will refolve to go thither in Person, and to take some Troops with him; To this end, several Regiments that lay encamped near this City, and were ordered to march towards the Frontier, are Commanded to stay here till farther Orders. The last Letters from thence say, The generality of the People of that Dutchy grow very uneasie at the long Continuance of these Disorders, and that several of the Palatinates have resolved to send Deputies hither to represent their Condition to the King. An Envoy is arrived here from the Prince of Moldavia, who will shortly have his Audience; and it is much discoursed, that that Prince and the Hospodar of Walachia are defirous to wirhdraw themselves from their Subjection to the Turks, to whom they are Tributary, and put themselves under the Protection of the King of Poland. The Preparations for the War go on, and the King has fent Adjutant Rolant to Sancny, for a confiderable Sum of Money,

up Provisions for his Magazines. The German Troops which he deligns to employ this Summer against the Turks and Tartars, will consist in 20000 Foot and 10000 Hotse and Dragoons; and it is believed the Army will shortly take the Field. The King was this day in Conference with some of his General Officers, and had before him the Plan of all the Fortified Places on the Frontier, as likewise those in Ukrania, Moldavia, and Walachia, and in a day or two will be held a great Council of War.

Vienna, June 18. Preparations are making at this Court for the Reception and Entertainment of the Czar of Mafcovy, who is shortly expected here, being already come to Prague; It's believed this Prince will likewife appoint Ambassadors for the Treaty of Peace which the Turks shew a great Disposition to set on foot, before the Actions of this Campagne do alter the present posture of Affairs. In the mean time the necessary Provision is made for carrying on the War; divers Vessels with Saldiana Provision and American are with Soldiers, Provisions, and Ammunition, are daily passing down the Danube to Peter Waradin, and other Places; and the Imperial Forces are marching from their Winter-quarters to their General Rendezvous at Verismarion. We hear from the Frontiers, That the over-flowing of the Dsnubs, and the Drave, occasioned by the late great Rains, has made it very difficult to Transport Provisions from one Town to another for Supplying the Magazines. Our Letters from Peter Was radin, say, Some Recruits are lately arrived there. for that Garison, and that there came with them an Ingenier, who pretended to ferve there as a Voluntier, and soon after attempted by night to Defert, and go to Belgrade, but was feized by our advanced Guards between Semlin and Salankemen, and brought back to Peter-Waradin. These Advices confirm, That the Turkish Fleet on the Danube are got together near Belgrade, and that several Saicks were sent towards Titul on some Enterprise against that Place, but that the Garison

Francfort, June 25. The French are preparing for the Evacuation of Philipsbourg, and the other Places on the Rhine, which Monsieur Desberdes, who Commands there, has promifed shall be performed in a few days; whereupon the German Forces designed to Garison these Places, are moving that way, in order to be ready to take posfession of them. The Elector Palatine's Ministers and Officers of Justice, who, during the War, resided in this Ciry, are preparing to go to VVeynbeym, where his Electoral Highness is shortly expected. The Heer Persius is on his departure for Madrid, to reside there as Minister from the Prince of Hesse Darmstadt. The Fortifications of Eberenbourg, (according to the Treaty of Peace) are now quite demolished. We have Advice from Strasbourg, That Quarters were appointed in that City and the Neighbouring Parts, for the French Gato pay the Arrears due to his Eprees, and to Buy | risons of Friburg, Brifack, and the Fort of Keyl,

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who, it's faid, will quit those places by the 7th of July at farthest; And that the Records and other publick Papers of the Palatinate, which were taken by the French from Heydelberg, at the Burning of that Town, and kept at Strasbourg, were restored to the Heer Fuchs, who was fent by the Elector Palatine to Demand the same.

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Hambourg, June 27. Our last Advices from Dresdan, which are of the 22th instant, say, The Saxon Forces ordered to Poland, which make up about 6000 men, had passed in Review before General Rosin, and were forthwith to begin their march towards that Kingdom, that a confiderable quantity of Ammunition, and 12 Field Pieces would be fent along with them, and that the great :Train of heavy Artillery which was getting ready there, with a great quantity of Shovels, and other Instruments proper for making Trenches, or for-tifying a Camp, is to follow in a formight. We hear from Scockbolme, That the King of Sweden has named the Count of Mellin to be Governor of Pamerania; and that Sentence is shortly to be pronounced against Count Bielke. The Letters from Coningsberg say, The States of Lesser Prussia, (which belongs to the Elector of Brandenbourg) are there assembled; That the Elector intended to leave that place on the 12th of the next month in his return to Berlin.

Paris, June 27. The Baron of Plettemberg, En-voy Extraordinary from the Bishop of Munster, had last Friday his first Audience of the King at Verfailles, being introduced in the usual manner by the Sieur Saintior, Introductor of Ambassadors. The King has given a House at Versailles, called the Menagerie, with the Gardens belonging to it to the Dutchess of Burgundy. The Duke de Croy, the Dutchess of Burgundy. The Duke de Croy, who has Commanded the Emperor's Forces in Hungary, is lately arrived here from Brabant, and has waited on the King feveral times, by whom

he was very well received.

Brussels, June 29. The Burghers of this City met last Monday, and agreed to pay their share of the Sublidies granted to the King of Spain by the States of Brabant, and are now confidering of the Ways to raise the same. We hear from Liste, That the Commissioners for Regulating the Limits, arrived there last Monday, and were visited the next morning by the French Commissioners, with whom they will shortly begin their Conferences.

Hague, July 1. N. S. General Cochorne will be going again in a few days to Bergenopzoom, to give further Directions for the new Fortifications which are to be added to that place; and a Regiment of Foot is ordered to march for Reinforcing that Garison. Yesterday Monsieur Jordan, the King of Poland's Envoy to the Crown of France, passed by this place in his way to Paris. The same day, the Sieur Bosen, Minister from that King, arrived from England. They write from Paris, That the Commissioners of this State had renewed their Conference with the French Commissioners upon the Matter of the Tariff.
