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Yarmouth, Feb. 27.

Yesterday sailed out of this Road three Vessels, whereof two for *Sunderland*, and the other for *Scotland*. Three ships belonging to *London* came yesterday out of *Harwich*, and about 9 of the clock the last night passed through this Road intending for *Newcastle*, but before they could get a mile or two to the Northward of *Winterton*, the wind coming to the *E. N. E.* and blowing with much violence, put them all on shore, one of them a Flyboat of 240 Tuns, having on board 19 men and boys, was broken to pieces, of the whole Company, onely the Master, the the Carpenter and his boy escaping; one of the other two was also lost, the third as yet continues whole, but with little probability of being got off; many of their men being also cast away; about the same time was lost a laden Collier belonging to *Scarborough*, & all her men only one escaping: the violence of this storm forced seven ship. in these roads two miles with their Anchors after them; one Pink had her main Mast brought by the board, and had the storm continued, the might all of them have run much hazard.

Genova, Feb. 6. The second instant, the Marquis *Spinola* received his Patent from the Regency of *Spain* to be Governour of the State of *Milan* for the present, till the Council of *Spain* shall farther dispose of that important charge, after which he gave a visit to the Duke at his Palace, which Civility yesterday returned him by eight of the Nobility sent to compliment him from the Senate; about the end of this week he intends to depart hence to his Government.

Some days since arrived here the Captain of the Squadron of the *Duke di Turky*, who having been with several other Gallies of his Company conducting the Count *di Sano Germano* to his Viceroialty of *Sardigna*, was in his return separated from the rest by a violent tempest, and in some disorder forced to put in here.

The Holland Convoy of 12 ships have been by force of ill weather constrained to take the way of *Legorn*; some of them laden upon the account of several Merchants of this Place, may be in few days expected here.

From *Turin* we are told, that the Court has been there diverted in the great place of the Castle with extraordinary Courses made with Sledges upon the snow, wherein the Duchesses and three other Ladies clad like Amazons, representing the four Cardinal virtues, each followed by trains of other Ladies, and conducted by the Duke and three other personages of the Court, with the Lance, Dart, Pistol and Sword, took their several Courses and Charged some Statues which were placed to represent the contrary Vices: the Court having since renewed their diversions in testimony of the joy lately received by the news of the birth of a young Princess of *Portugal*.

Milan, Feb. 6. On Friday last arrived here a Courier extraordinary from the Court of *Spain* with the news that it had pleased the Queen Regent to confer the present vacancy of the Government of this State upon *D. Paolo Spinola Doria* Marquis *de los Balbaces*, for which he had brought dispatches which were delivered into the hands of the Privy Council, and received with much satisfaction, not only by them, but the whole City: care was immediately taken to communicate the news with all possible speed to the Marquis himself, by *Don Tullio Legnani* one of his Captains of Horse, who was immediately dispatched

him for *Genova*, whither are also repairing many persons of honour and the chief Officers of the Army to compliment him upon his employment, and to receive his Orders.

Yesterday the Marquis sent an express to the Council to thank them for the care they had taken in hastening away his dispatches, but as yet he had not appointed a time for his coming hither.

Venice, Feb 9. Signior *Morofini* having all things in readiness for his Voyage, and received the sum of 200000 Ducats for the use and payment to four forces, intends this day to embark himself for *Candia*, and the wind being favorable may immediately set saile; several ships are also prepared for the transportation of the Lunenburg succours, which are daily expected, their General being some dayes since arrived, and was yesterday employed to have quarters assigned them during the small time of their intended stay here.

Letters of the 12. past from *Malta* tell us, that on the 3. of the same moneth arrived there a ship from *Marseilles*, which was in the beginning of *November* last employed with succors to *Candia*, and on her returne by *Smirna* was forced to leave that port sooner then she intended, for fear of an Embargo and being pressed for the Convoy of 4000 men which lay there to be transported for the requite of the Vissiers army, but were all of them poor dispirited people forced into the service: at her departure from *Candia*, the Turks had much pressed that place, and had left the *Sabionera*, but were very closely advanced to the bulwark *St. Andre*: That about that time the Venetian Commanders had drawn together about 80 ships, which was supposed to be with a designe to have received the besieged in case the Turks should prevail upon the place: but since this arrived a Tartan belonging to the same Convoy with letters of several dates; but the last of the 17. of *December*, informing that the succors sent from *Malta* arrived the 28. of *November* at *Standia*, and the 28th entred into *Candia* upon several Barks without any damage, although the Turks continually ply'd them with their shot from their Batteries, and that at their entry they were received with much tenderness by the Generalissimo and the Marquis *de St. Andre Montbrun*, whom they found well recovered of his hurt; but that the Duke *de Rohan* was more cool in their Reception, as being disappointed in his expectation to command them.

They farther tell us, that a party of 350 French Volunteers had made a sally upon the enemy, and with them about 50 others of the Garrison with some difficulty permitted by the General, who seems willing to preserve his people from all unnecessary hazards, in which sally the French lost 13. of their number, and the others three, but brought in with them four heads of the Turks, since which, the General found it necessary to make another sally with 60 choice men, who cleared the Enemies Trench, killing 50 of them upon the place, and bringing off one of their Ensigns, with the loss only of one man; that upon the arrival of the *Maltheses* they had undertaken the guard at the *St. Andre*, where the Turks had made a large breach able to hold 60 men in front, but that the besieged had filled it with several materials; but that upon the whole matter, the place was reduced to such a condition, that without the arrival of so considerable a succour, as could be able to force the Turks from their posts, it could not be able to hold out above four months longer.

Brussels, Feb. 22. The French under the command of the *Marquis de Crequy* having upon pretence of some dissatisfaction leited on *Kont-a-Mouffors, Nomeny,* and *Logny,* have upon the addresses of the Duke of Lorraine, restored *Almany,* as 'tis believed they will a lo the other places.

A considerable part of the forces lately disbanded from the service of the Duke of Lorraine, entred into *Burgundy,* but without any invitations; nor are they entertained in any service. The Prince de *Aremberg* having received several complaints of divers insolencies and exactions used by them in the Country, has ordered his Officers to attend them, and if occasion require, to force them out of the Province.

Monsieur de *Louigny* having taken care for the entertainment of 8000 Foot, and 1000 Horse of the forces dismissed from the Service of the Duke of Lorraine is upon his return, and may be suddenly expected here. Seven hundred Horse which came lately into *Luxembourg* are ordered to be quartered in the Province of *Frabant.*

The States of the *United Provinces* have by a late Letter to the Constable of *Castille* desired to entertain 350 Officers which can be best spared out of these Provinces, on whom they promise to confer employments equal to what they enjoyed here.

The Bishop of *Munster* is said to have lately received a Million of French Money, and has privately revied about 4000 men, and endeavours to draw several eminent Officers into his service.

Upon intelligence brought hither, that a considerable party of the French were drawing together in the Country near *Yglantiennes,* the General de *Bataille, Carolo Campi,* was sent away with a party of Horse and Foot to secure our concerns in that parts.

Letters even now arrived from *Madrid* bearing date the 6th instanc infor us, that *Don Juan* was on his way from *Parcellons,* intending either to *Consuegra* or *Guadaluara,* but has not yet permission to come neerer to *Madrid,* but that all differences seem to be fully composed.

The 20th instanc arrived here the Baron d' *Isola,* and yesterday day a conference with the Constable of *Castille.* This evening is expected Monsieur de *Pompono,* Ambassador from His most Christian Majesty to the States of the *United Provinces,* who have sent a Yacht to attend him at *Antwerp* for his transportation; with him is also expected *Ion Hieronimo Quinones,* who has been some time in the French Court under the Character of Envoy extraordinary from the Court of *Spain.*

The Constable continues his care for the government and assistance of the Provinces, and for the establishment of the Militia in such a posture as may be least burdencome to the people, and has ordered strong Garrisons to be drawn into all those places which lie most exposed to dangers and attempt.

Hague, Feb. 12. We have daily fresh Reports of the private Levies made by the Bishop of *Munster,* but nothing of his intentions and design for their employment. Upon consideration of a Letter sent from the Governour of *Coeverden,* and the Remonstrance of the of *Groeningue* who have fancied some grounds of jealousy from those Military preparations of the said Bishop, all Officers are ordered to repair to their respective posts upon the Frontiers, and to be careful for the security of their charges. The States have farther resolved, and ordered their forces to be recruited with an addition of 25 men to each Company.

The Council of State having taken notice of the great decay of the fortifications of several of our Garrisons, by reason of the arrears of money due from divers of the Provinces, and charged on themselves that employment, have resolved that the defective Provinces to furnish and pay in their Quota's, that this necessary work may not be any longer retarded.

From *Zeland* we are told, that the inhabitants of *Zirichse* having found that the States of that Province in resentment of their late proceedings, in opposing the decrees of their Assembly, had sent some Companies to block them up, and by that means to reduce them to reason, have upon

second thoughts consented to submit their differences to a friendly debate; whereupon the States remanding their Soldiers, the Town immediately dispatch their Deputies to *Middlebourg,* where 'tis believed, an agreement will be made to satisfaction.

The Admiralties are all here assembled, where they are consulting about the charge and expences of the Fleet, and are considering the best way and method of managing them to the best advantage, and are particularly taking an account of all payments which are made for the maintenance of the Navy.

The Earl of *Carlisle,* Ambassador from His Majesty of *Great Britain* to the Crown of *Sweden,* having passed some few days here, departed this morning for *Amsterdam,* where he may continue till Monday next.

The States being still earnest for the delivery into their hands of the person lately seized in the Spanish Quarters as one of the accomplices in the scandalous Riot formerly committed upon the Congregation at *Oudeman,* the Spanish Ambassador has lately given in a Memorial, offering some reasons why it may not be judged fit to deliver him up to receive his punishment from them.

Bruges, Feb. 23. The French are busily employed at *Dunkirk* in enlarging and raising new fortifications about that place, upon which they have many hundred men busily employ'd, and have lately bought several Billanders both here and at *Ostend,* which they make use of for the conveyance of their stores from *Calice* to *Dunkirk.*

Some Holland ships having been laden for this place and stoppe'd at *Ostend,* upon pretence of a priviledges that no strangers ships shall be permitted to pass *Ostend* without unlading and paying their Customs there, and the goods so unladen to be sent in other vessels for this place; a dispute is hereupon risen between both places, which having been communicated to the Constable of *Castille,* he has been pleased to Order that the ships be at present permitted to pass, without prejudice to the pretensions or right of priviledge of those of *Ostend,* and will take the business in dispute into his farther consideration, to the end it may receive a speedy and equitable determination.

Paris, Feb. 27. His Majesty has ordered 300 light horsemen of his Army to be joyned with the other succors designed by him for the relief of *Candia,* who are to embark with their horses to form a Squadron to be commanded by the Marquis de *Francieres,* an ancient Colonel. His Majesty has farther ordered 200 reformed Foot-Officers to embark for this service in the room of a many of his Guards of the body who are countermanded.

The Sieur de *Beet,* an ancient Mareschal de *Camp* is to be sent in the same quality for *Candia* with the Sieur *Cybert,* Captain Lieutenant of His Majesties Musqueteers, who has made also a Mareschal de *Camp,* and both of them to leave under the command of the Duke de *Navaille.* The Mareschal de *Crequy* is in this expedition to command the Gallies, of which he is the General.

By a ship lately arrived from *America* we are told, that a French man of War having in those seas met with a Spanish ship richly laden to the value of three hundred thousand Crowns, after a long and sharp fight, wherein the French Commander the Sieur du *Plessis* with many of his men was killed, the Spanish ship was forced to yield, and has been by the French Governour of our Plantations there adjudged good Prize, having been taken beyond the Line.
