Esterday sailed out of this Road three Vessels, whereof two for sunder and, and the other; for scotland. Three ships belonging to London came resterday out of Harwich, and about 9 of the clock the last night passed through this Road intending for Newcasse, but before they could get a mile or two to the Northward of Winterton, the wind coming to the E. N. E. and blowing with much violence, but them all on shoars one of them a Flyboat of 240 Luns, having on brard 19 men and boys, was broken to pieces, of the whole Company, onely the Master, the the Carpenter and his boy escaping; one of the so-ther two was also lost, the third as yet continues whole, but with little probability of being got off, many of their men being also cast away; about the same time was lost a laden Gollier belonging to Scarborough, f all her men only one escaping; the violence of this storm forced seven sinp in these roads two miles with their Anchors after them; one Piuk had hermain Must brought by the board, and had the storm continued, the might all of them have run much hazard.

Genoua, Feb. 6. The second instant, the Marquis spinolareceived his Patent from the Regency of spain to be Governour of the State of Milan for the present, till the Council of spain shall farther dispose of that important charge, after which see give a visit to the Duke at his Pawlace, which Civility was restretably returned him by eight of the Nobility sent to compliment him from the Senate; about the end of this week he intends to depart hence to his Government.

Some days fince arrived here the Captain of the Aquadron, of the Duke di Turfi, who having been with leveral other Gallies of his Company conducting the Count di Santo, Germano to his Viceroyalty of Sardigna, was in his return leparated from the rest by a violent tempet, and in some diorder forced to put in here.

The Holland Convoy of 12 ships have been by force of ill resther constrained to take the way of Legarn; some of them laden upon the account of leveral Merchants of this place, may be in few days expected here.

Exom Turin we are tol., that the Court has been there diverted in the great place of the Casile with extraordinary Couries made with Sledges upon the snow, wherein the Dutchels and three other Ladies clad like Amazons, representing the four Cardinal vertues, each followed by trains of other Ladies, and conducted by the Duke and three other personages of the Court, with the Lance, Datt. Pistol and sword, took their several Couries and Charged some Statues which were placed to represent the contrary Vices: the Court having since renewed their diversions in testimony of the joy lately received by the news of the birth of a young Princes of Portugal.

Milan, Feb. 6. On Friday last arrived here a Couries, extraordinary from the Court of Spain with the news that it had pleased the Queen Regent to conferre thep esent vacancy of the Government of this State upon D. Paola Spinola Doria Marquis de las Balbaces, for which he had brought dispatches which were delivered into the hands of the Privy Council, and received with much larisastion not only by them, but the whole City: care was immediately taken to communicate the news with all possible speed to the Marquis himself, by Don Tultio Legnani one of his Captains of Horse, who was immediately dispatched to

him for Genous, whither are also repairing many persons of honour and the shief Officers of the Army to compliment him, upon his emploiment, and to receive his Orders.

Yesterday the Marquis sent an express to the Council, to thank them for the care they had taken in hattening away his dispatches, but as yet he had not appointed a time for his coming hither.

Venice, Keb 9. Segnior Morofini having all things in readiness for his Voyage, and received the summ of 200000 Ducats for the use and payment to four forces, intends this stay to embarque himselse for Candia, and the winde being savorable may immediately set sayle; several ships are also prepared for the transportation of the Lunenbourgh succours, which are dayly expected, their General being some dayes since arrived, and was yesterday employed to have quarters assigned them during the small time of their intended stay here.

Letters of the 12. past from Maltha tell us, that on the 3 of the same moneth arrived there a ship from Marseilles, which was in the beginning of Movember last employed with f ccors to Candia, and on her returne by Smirna was forced to leave that port fooner then the intended, for fear of an Embargo and being preffed for the Convoy of ageo men which lay there to be transported for the recruite of the Visiers army, but were all of them poor dispirited peop e forced into the service: at her departure from Candia, the Turks had much preffed that place, and had left the Sahionera, but were verylclosely advanced to the bulwark St. Andre: That about that time the Venetian Commanders had drawn together about & ships, which was supposed to be with a designe to have received the belieged in case the Tutks should prevaile upon the place : but fince this arrived a Tartan belonging to the same Convoy with letters of several dates; but the last of the 17, of December, informing that the succors fent from Maltha arrived the 28, of November at Standia, and the 28th entred into Candia upon feveral Barks without any damage, although the Turks continually ply'd them with their shot from their Batteries, and that at their entry they were received with much tonderness by the Generaliisimo and the Marquis de St. Andre Montbrung whom they found well recovered of his hurs; but that the Duke de Roanner was more cool in their Reception, as being disappointed in his expectation to command them.

They farther tell us, that's party of 350 French Volunteers had made a fally upon the enemy, and with them about 50 others of the Garrison with some difficulty permitted by the General, who seems willing to preserve his people from all unadoessay hazards, in which sally the French lost 13.05 their number, and the others three, but brought in with them some heads of the Thacks, since which, the General sound it necessary to make another sally with 60 choice men, who cleated the Enemies Trench, killing 50 of them upon the place, and bringing off one of their Ensigns, with the loss only of one man; that upon the arrival of the Malathes they had undertaken the guard at the St. Andee, where the Turks had made a large breach able to hold 60 men in front, but that the besieged had filled it with several mitterials; but that upon the whole matter, the place was reducted to such a condition, that we have the arrival of so considerable a success as could be able to force the Turks from their posts, it could not be able to hold out above four

moneths longer.

Bru Jelt, Feb, 22. The French under the command of. the Marquis de Urequy having upon pretence of tome dillatisfaction leited on Lont. a-Mouffor, Noments and Loquey, have upon the addresses of the Duke of Lorrain, restored Nomeny, 35 ni believed they will a so the other places.

A confiderable part of the forces lately disbanded from the service of the Duke of Lerrain, entred into Eurgundy, but without any invitation; nor are they entertained in any fervice. The Prince de Aremberg having received feveral complaints of divers infolencies and exactrions used by them in-the Country, has ordered his Officers to attend them, and if occasion require, to orce them out of the Province

Monsieur de Louvigny having taken care for the entertainment of 2000 Foot, and 1000 Horse of the forces dismisled from the Hervice of the Duke of Lorrain's is upon his roturn, and may be luddefily expected here. Seven hundred Horse which came lately into Luxembourg are cridered to be quartered in the Province of Frabant.

Letters even now artived from Midrid bearing date the Sthinftart inform us, that Don Juan was on his way from Parcellona, intending either for Consuegra or Guadalasard, but has not yet permittion to come neerer to Madrid, but that all differences feem to be fully composed.

The 20th instant strived here the Baron d' Ifola, and kad yeste day a conference with the constable of Castille. This evening is expected Monfieur de Pompono, Amballador f om His most Christian Majesty to the States of the United Provinces, who have fent a Yatcht to attend him at Antwerp tor his transportation t with him is also expected I on Hieronimo Quinones, who has been some time in the Erench Court under the Character of Envoye extraordinary from the Court of Spain.

The Confiable continues his care for the government and slefenceof the'e Provinces, and for the eltablishment of the Militia in fuch a posture as may be least burdensome to the people, and has ordered ferong Garrisons to be drawn into all those places which lie most exposed to dangers and at-

gempte.

Hague; Feb. 12. We have daily fresh Reports of the private Levies made by the Bishop of Muniter, but nothing of his intentions and delign for their emploiment. Upon confideration of a Letter sent from the Governour of Loeverden, and the Remonstrance of those of Groeningue who have fancied some grounds of jealouse from those Military preparations of the faid Bishop, all Officers are orde ed to repair to their respective postsupon the Frontiers, and to be coreful for the security of their icharges. The States have fauther resolved, and ordered their forces to be recruited with an addition of ky men to each Company.

The Council of State having taken notice of the great decay of the fortifications willeveral of our Garrilons, by reason of the arrears or money due from divers of the Provinces, and charged on chemif r that employment, have resolved to m ve the desective Provinces to furnish and pay in their Quota's, thatabis necessary work may not be

any longentreraided.

From Zeiland we are told, that the inhabitants of Zirick 7se having found shatche Scares of that Province in retenument of their late proceedings, in opposing the decrees of their Assembly, had sent some Companies to block them up, and by that means to reduce them to reason, have upon second thoughts consented to submit their differences to a friendly debate; whereupon the States remanding their Soldiers, the Town immediately dispatcht their Deputies to Middlebourg, where 'tis believed; an agreement will be

made to fatisfaction.

The Admiralties are all here affembled, where they are confulting about the charge and expences of the Fleet, and are confidering the best way and method of managing them to the best advantage, and are particularly taking an account of all paymen s which are made for the maintenance of the N.vy.

The Earl of Carlile, Ambassador from His Majesty of Great Britain to the Crown of Swedeland, having passed some few days here, departed this morning for Amflordam, where he may continue till Monday next.

The States being till earnest for the delivery into their hands of the person larely seised in the Spanish Quarters as one of the accomplices in the scandalous Riot formerly committed upon the Congregation at Oudeman, the Spanish Ambassador has lately grven in a Memorial, offering Tome reasons why it may not be judged fit to deliver him up to receive his punishment from them.

Bruges, Feb. 23. The French are builly emploied at Bunkirk in enlarging and failing new fortifications about that place, upon which they have many hundred men cafly employ'd, and have lately bought leveral Billanders Both here and at Often l, which they make use of for the convey-

ance of their ft res from Calico to Dankirk.

S me Holland It ips having been lauen for this place and stoppe ! at Oftend, upon pretence of a priviledge; that to ftrangers fills frall be permitted to pals offend without unlading and paying their Customs there, and the goods to. unladen to be fent in other vessels for this place; a dispute is hereupoh rilen between both places, which having been communicated to the Constable of Castille, he has been pleased to Order that the ships be at present permitted to pass, without prejudice to the pretentions or right of priviledge of these of Oftend, and will take the business in dispute into his farther consideration, to the end it may rece: ve a speedy and equivable determination.

Paris, Feb. 27. His Majesty has ordered 300 light horsemen of his Army to be joyned with the other fuccors defigned by him for the relief of Candia, who are to embark with their horses to form a squadron to be commanded by the Marquis de Francieres, an ancient Collonel. His Majofly has farther ordered 200 reformed Foot-Officers to embark for this service in the room of a many of his Guards'

of the body who are countermanded.

The Sieurde Biet, an ancient Mareshal de Camp is to be fent in the I me quality for Candia with the Sieur Carbert, Captain Lieutenant of His Majetties Musqueteers, who we made also a Mareshal de Camp, and both of them to jet ve under the command of the Duke de Navaille. The Mareshal de Crequy is in this expedition to command the Gallies, of which he is the Ger eral.

By a ship lately arrived from America we are told, that a French man of War having in those seas met with a Spanifn thip rich'y laden to the value of three hundred thoulard Crowns, after a long and therp fight, wherein the French Commander the Sieur du Plessis with many of his men was killed, the Spanish ship was so:ced to yield, and has been by the French Governour of our Plantations there adjudged go d Prize, having been taken beyond the Line.
