

Vienna, July 12. The *Czar of Moscow* continues at this Court; some of his Revenue are lately gone for *Venice*, and it is believed he will go thither himself in a short time. His Ambassadors have had several Conferences with the Imperial Ministers about their entering into the Negotiation of Peace which will be treated this Summer between his Imperial Majesty and his Allies, and the Ottoman Part. Several considerable Sums of Money have lately been paid out of the Emperor's Treasury for the Service of our Army in *Hungary*. The 6 Ships that are newly built on the *Danube* are not yet taken down to *Peter-Waradin*, where the whole Fleet is to Rendezvous, waiting for the coming of 200 Seimen who are daily expected from *Ilambourg*. We hear from *Hungary*, that most of the Imperial Forces are arrived at the General Rendezvous near *Verismarton*, and the rest are marching thither with all diligence; Our Army will be composed of about the same number of Troops it was the last year, the Auxiliary Forces which the Emperor has taken lately into his Service supplying the place of those of *Denmark*, *Brandenburg*, and *Saxony*, which are sent home. The Turks are likewise assembling their Forces near *Belgrade*, where the Grand Viher is shortly expected: They lately sent from that place a Convoy of Provisions under a considerable Guard of Soldiers to *Tmeswar*, and the *Bassa* of the *Arnautes* being appointed to Command there took this Opportunity to go thither; of which Count *Gockelsberg*, who went lately out of *Hermanstadt* with a strong Detachment to ruin the Works the Turks are making at *Banzowa* and *Vypalanka*, having Advice, he attempted to attack them in their Passage, but came a few hours too late, whereupon he posted himself so as that he may easily fall upon the Turkish Troops who attended the said Convoy, in their return from *Tmeswar*; after which he will go on with his intended Expedition. The Turkish Saicks which were gone up the *Theysse* towards *Titul* are passed by that place, and sailed towards *Beitsch*. We have Advice, that they intend to ruin all the German Forts along that River, upon which some Troops are ordered to march that way to prevent their Design, and to reinforce the Garrison of *Titul*. Letters from *Turkey* say, the Sultan marched with his Forces from *Adrianople* on the 21th of the last month, and would arrive on the 23d instant at *Philippopoli*, which is about half way between *Adrianople* and *Sophia*.

Frankfort, July 20. We have received Advice, that the French Garrison marched out of *Philipsbourg* on the 14th Instant, and General *Thunzen* who is appointed by the Emperor to be Governor of that City, took possession of the same, bringing in his Regiment and the other Forces appointed to be in Garrison there. *Eybourg* was evacuated the same day; and Orders are given for supplying these Places with Cannon and Ammunition. The Count *de Boinebourg*, Envoy from the Emperor, is come hither from *Mentz*. We hear from *Dusseldorp*, that the Elector *Palatine* has put off for some time his coming to *Weinheim*, intending to go first to *Juliers*.

Paris, July 24. The King went last Tuesday from *Marli* to *Mudon*, where he intends to continue the remaining part of this week. The Troops which are to encamp near *Compiagne* are now on their march; and the King intends to go thither about the 28th of the next month. On the 22th Instant were exchanged here the Ratifications of the Treaty concluded on the 21th of *June* last at *Calais* between *William Azlinby* Esq; and Monsieur *Leux Pajot* Comptroller and Farmer General of the French Posts, as Commissioners for Settling the Posts between *England* and *France*.

Brussels, July 24. The Count *de Tirimont*, and the *Baron Brouckhoven*, Commissioners on the part of *Spain* for Settling the Limits between the Dominions of that Crown and *France* in the *Netherlands*, are lately returned hither from *Liff*, the French Commissioners having refused to Treat with them because their Commissions were not in the Form they desired, upon which an Express was dispatched with an Account thereof to *Madrid*; and we hear the French Commissioners are in the mean while returned home.

Hague, July 25. N. S. The States of *Holland* and *Westfrizeland* continue assembled. The *Sieur de Bonrepos*, Ambassador from *France*, is preparing for his Public Entry, which he intends to make in a few days. The *Sieur Dankelman*, Minister from the Elector of *Brandenburg*, set out hence last Wednesday on his return to *Berlin*. The Countess Dowager of *Nassau*, with the Prince her Son who is Stadtholder of *Frise*, is shortly expected here from *Leewarden*. General *Cochorne* having given Directions at *Bergenopzom* for the new Fortifications that are to be made there, is gone on the like account to *Zurph*.

Dover, July . This day Sir *Bazill Dixwell*, and *Matthew Aymer* Esq; were chosen to serve as Members for this Place in the ensuing Parliament.

Whitehall, July 18. The Marquis *Giustiniani*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Republick of *Genoa*, had Audience from the King, being intro-

duced by Sir *Charles Cotterel* Master of the Ceremonies, and he presented to His Majesty the Marquis of *Durazzo* and the Marquis of *Balbi*.

Whitehall, July 20. The King went yesterday from *Kensington* between 3 and 4 a Clock in the Morning, and having Dined at *Sittingbourne*, arrived at *Margate* at 6 in the Evening; His Majesty went immediately on board the *William* and *Mary* Yacht, but the Weather being very calm His Majesty came ashore again about 8, and lay last Night at Capt *Ball's* near *Margate*; About Ten this Morning His Majesty Embarked again; and the Yachts and Men of War that attend His Majesty under the Command of Sir *Cloud* set Sail for *Holland* with a fair Wind.

The Posts between *England* and *France* being now settled, the Mails for *France* will set out by the way of *Dover*, on Mondays and Thursdays, at Twelve a Clock at Night as formerly, and will go for the first time this present Thursday.
