

District Chapelry to the consecrated Church of Saint Peter, Whitstable, situate in the Parish of Whitstable, in the County of Kent and in the Diocese of Canterbury:

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a District Chapelry should be assigned to the said Church of Saint Peter, Whitstable, situate as aforesaid:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Cosmo Gordon, Archbishop of Canterbury (testified by his having signed and sealed this Representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said Parish of Whitstable which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a District Chapelry to the said Church of Saint Peter, Whitstable, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Peter, Whitstable'.

"And with the like consent of the said Cosmo Gordon, Archbishop of Canterbury (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said Church of Saint Peter, Whitstable, situate as aforesaid, and that the fees or dues to be received in respect of the publication of banns and of the solemnization or performance of marriages, churchings and burials should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being. Provided always that so long as the Reverend Geoffrey Hillyard, the present Vicar or Incumbent of the Vicarage of the said Parish of Whitstable, shall continue to be such Vicar or Incumbent, all the fees or dues which may be received in respect of such publication, solemnization or performance at the said Church of Saint Peter, Whitstable, shall be paid over by the Minister thereof to the said Geoffrey Hillyard.

"THE SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Peter, Whitstable, being:—

"All that part of the Parish of Whitstable, in the County of Kent and in the Diocese of Canterbury, which is bounded upon the north-west by the sea, upon the south-west by the Parish of Seasalter, in the said County and Diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the south, upon the east, and upon the north-east by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said Parish of Seasalter from the said Parish of Whitstable crosses the middle of the roadway behind the houses situate on the northern side of Cromwell Road South, and extending thence eastward along the middle of such roadway for a distance of 2½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Regent Street, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Regent Street for a distance of 2½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Cromwell Road South, and extending

thence eastward along the middle of Cromwell Road South for a distance of 4 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Stream Walk, and extending thence southward along the middle of Stream Walk for a distance of 2½ chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the Faversham to Ramsgate Line of the Southern Railway across Stream Walk, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of 24 chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the Whitstable Harbour Branch Line of the Southern Railway across the above mentioned line of railway, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said Whitstable Harbour Branch Line of railway (thereby following in part the north-eastern side of Whitstable Harbour) for a distance of 55 chains or thereabouts to its northern end, and extending thence in a straight line due north to the sea."

And whereas the said Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Canterbury.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 113, of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 37, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 104, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 13th day of December, 1934, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 113, of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her said late Majesty Chapter 37, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 104, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for constituting a separate District for spiritual purposes to be taken partly out of the New Parish (sometime Chapelry District) of Saint Paul, Foleshill, partly out of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of
