Warsaw, Aug. 6. N. S.

We expect by the next Letters from *Leimborg*, to receive an account of the King of *Poland's* arrival at that Place. We hear some Disorder happened lately among his German Forces, which obliged them to Halt for a day or two; but the Authors of it having been punished, and the Tumult being appeased, they continued their march to the General Rendezvous, where it's believed they will arrive about the middle of this month. The Envoys of *Moldavia* and *Wallachia* are returned home, and will take their way through the Province of *Transylvania*, to avoid falling into the Hands of the *Tartars*, whom they already look upon as their Enemies, those Provinces having resolved to withdraw themselves from their Subjection to the Ottoman Port, and to put themselves under the Protection of this Crown. Our Advices from *Lithuania* say, The late Engagement between General *Sapieha's* Son, and the *Sieur Ozinsky*, was not so Bloody as it was at first reported, the latter, with a great number of his Followers, being fled into the Territories of the Elector of *Brandenburg* in *Prussia*; where, when the Forces of *Sapieha* would have pursued them, they were met by some of the Elector's Officers, who desired their Commander to forbear committing any Hostilities within his Electoral Highness's Dominions; upon which they retreated without doing any farther Damage. An Order from the King of *Poland* has been published in *Lithuania*, setting forth, That since all occasions of Complaint are taken away, by the Agreement lately made at *Warsaw*, and by the Grant stipulated therein of several Priviledges to the Inhabitants of that Dutchy, they are, (as soon as the Forces under the Command of General *Sapieha* are marched out of *Lithuania*) to lay down their Arms, and to return to their respective Dwellings, and for the future to forbear all Acts of Hostility against each other, and not to assemble under any pretence whatsoever, in such a manner as may endanger the publick Peace: And we hear, the Gentlemen of that Country shew a good Disposition to Obey these Orders, and that several of them are already returned home, so that we hope shortly to see a final end of the Divisions which have of late given so much Disturbance to this Kingdom.

Vienna, Aug. 9. My Lord *Paget's* Secretary is come hither the 3d time from *Adrianople*, and the Emperor's Ministers have been several times in Conference upon the Business he was sent hither about. He brings an Account, That the Grand Signior is willing the Treaty for a Peace be forthwith set on foot, and to that end, Proposes the Plenipotentiaries on both sides may meet at some convenient place on the Frontiers; which it's believed, will be agreed to by the Emperor and his Allies, and in all probability a Peace will be concluded between them this Summer. An Envoy is lately arrived here from the King of *Poland*, who has had Audience of their Imperial Majesties. The Marquis of *Villars*, Envoy from

France, is likewise arrived, and is preparing for his Publick Entry and Audience; And the young Count of *Waldstern* intends in a few days to set out for *Paris*, being sent with the same Character from his Imperial Majesty to that Court. Several Muscovites of the Czar's Retinue are gone after him towards *Muscow*. The last Advices from *Hungary* say, Prince *Eugene* of *Savoy* is arrived at the Camp near *Verismarton*, where all the Emperor's Forces are now assembled, the Hosts being encamped at *Caloush*, the Foot about a League farther, and the Artillery being arrived, they will shortly march to *Peter Waradin*.

Francfort, Aug. 17. The Elector *Palatine* parted from *Dusseldorp* on the 12th instant, on his Journey to the *Palatinate*; and we hear he will pass the *Rhine* this day at *Cobtheim*, and to morrow will arrive at *Weytheim*, where he designs to make his Residence, and great Preparations are making at that place for his Reception. Great quantities of Provisions and Ammunition have lately been carried to *Philipsburg*, and the other Places lately Evacuated by the French, for the Service of those Garisons, They write from *Landau*, That the Marquis *d'Uxelles* and the *Sieur de Vauban*, first Ingenier of *France*, came lately to that Town, and having visited the Fortifications and the Ground which lies round it, are gone to do the like at several other Places in *Alsace*.

Hamburg, Aug. 19. The Burghers of this City have lately had several Meetings to consider of some Miscarriages that have happened in the Administration of the Publick Revenues, and particularly in the Forest belonging to this City, which having been visited by some Commissioners appointed for that purpose, they found that above 300 great Timber-Trees were wanting, of which having made their Report, the Burghers ordered the Overseers of the said Forest to be Summoned before them, who not being able to give any Account how these Trees were disposed of, they laid considerable Fines upon them. Count *Bond*, Ambassador of *Sweden*, arrived here from *England*, the 9th instant, on Board the *Lyme* Frigate, Commanded by Captain *Nicholas Tavagnan*, and in a day or two his Excellency will pursue his Journey to *Sueden*. They write from *Copenhagen*, That the King of *Denmark* is much Indisposed.

Brussels, Aug. 21. Several Conferences have been held at this Court about Regulating the Forces which are designed to be kept on foot in time of Peace for the Defence of the Spanish Netherlands; and it is much talked, that the Payment of them will be left to the States of the several Provinces, who will oblige themselves each to maintain their own Quota. We have lately had very unseasonable weather, and they write from *Luxembourg*, that a great quantity of Snow fell there on the 12th instant.

Loo, August 21. Prince *Gaston*, Second Son to the Great Duke of *Tuscany*, who Travels incognito, under the Name of Count of *Sienne*, came last Tuesday from *Germany* to *Appledorne*, a small Village within a Mile of this place. Yesterday he waited upon His Majesty, one of His Majesty's Coaches being sent to bring him to Court, where he was introduced into His Majesty's Presence by the Earl of *Portland*; and this morning he went for *Holland*. The Prince of *Nassau Saarluck*, and the Count *d'Auvergne* continue still at this place. Yesterday the Earl of *Selkirke* having a Power from the Dutchess of *Hamilton*, surrendered to His Majesty her Grace's Honour and Title to the

Dutchy of Hamilton, and all her other Honours and Titles, in favour of the Earl of Arran her Eldest Son, upon which His Majesty has signed a Patent Creating him Duke of Hamilton, with all the other Titles that were in the Person of the said Dutchess, and with Precedency in the same manner, as if he had Succeeded thereto by her Decease.

Hague, August 21. This day Monsieur de Bonrepos, the French Ambassador, had his public Audience of the States General with all the Ceremonies that are usual on the like occasions. The Count de Brize, who came lately from England, is gone to Loo to wait upon His Majesty. The Prince of Nassau Saarbruck, Marechal de Camp to the States General is expected here in a few days; as is also Count Tallard the French Ambassador, who came yesterday to Loo to Utrecht. Our Letters from Paris say, That several Points of the Ceremonial which were in Dispute between that Court and the Ambassadors of this Republick being now adjusted, they intend to make their Entry on the 24th instant, and that the French King has named the Count d'Entraigues to receive them and conduct them to their Audience. We hear the Sieur Hop, who is going as Envoy from this State to the Imperial Court, arrived the 17th instant at Cologne, and on the 19th continued his Journey to Vienna.

Paris, Aug. 23. The King's Journey to Compiègne holds for the 28th instant: He intends to go that day to Chantilly, and to be at Compiègne on the 2d of the next month. He has given the Archbishoprick of Besancon to the Sieur de Grammont, Bishop of Philadelphia, and Nephew to the late Archbishop. The Marquis of St. Maurice, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Cologne, had Audience on the 19th instant of the King, the Duke and Dutchess of Burgundy, the Duke of Anjou, and the Duke of Berry. On the 15th, the Baron of Plettemberg had his Audience of Leave of the Duke and Dutchess of Orleans, the Duke de Chartres, and Mademoiselle his Sister, and will shortly return home.

Dublin, Aug. 10. The Lords-Justices of this Kingdom having on the 1st instant Reviewed the two Regiments of Foot Commanded by Brigadier Tiffin and Brigadier Ingoldesby, which lay at Limerick, and visited the Works about that place, and the Stores in the Town, came from thence the 2d, and Dined with Sir Donagh O'Brien at Six-Mile-Bridge, and lay that night at Mr. Hickman's House near Fennis, having been attended by the Sheriff and Principal Gentlemen of the County of Clare, in like manner as in all other Counties through which they passed. They passed from thence the next day, and were met on the Borders of the County of Galway by Sir George St. George Bar. Governor of the said County, with the Sheriff, and divers other Gentlemen, who attended their Lordships to the City of Galway, at the Gates of which they were received by the Mayor and Magistrates in their Formalities, 12 Companies of Colonel Brewer's Regiment in Garison there Lining the Streets to the House where they Lodged, and the Cannon being discharged. On the 4th their Lordships Reviewed the said 12 Companies, Dined with the Mayor, and viewed the Works about that City. And the 5th they came thence and lay at Dean Pearce's House near Loughrea, being attended thither by the Governor of the County of Galway, the Sheriff, and other Gentlemen, who waited on their Lordships the next day to the Confines of that County. That Evening they arrived at Athlone, where they were received by Mr. Attorney General Rochford, Governor of the Militia of the County of Westmeath, part of the said Militia, both Foot and Dragoons, being in Arms on this occasion, and the Cannon of that place being discharged. Their Lordships went to Church there on the 7th, and that Evening lay at Mr. Peyton's near Rallymore. The next morning they Review'd Colonel Webb's Regiment of Foot and Colonel Ross's Regiment of Dragoons which were encamped near that place. Their Lordships lay that night again at Mr. Peytons, and yesterday in the Evening came to Chapel-Isod, where their Lordships Supped; and the Earl of Galway returned the same night to Dublin. His Grace the Duke of Ormond arrived here this evening from Highlake.

Chester, Aug. 13. Sir Bevil Granville's Regiment marched hence on the 11th instant to Highlake, where they Embarked the same day for Ireland.
