

thereabouts to the point where the last mentioned wall or fence reaches the eastern side of Nover's Hill and extending thence westward in a straight line for a distance of 20 yards or thereabouts to a point in the middle of Nover's Hill upon the boundary which divides the said Parish of Bedminster from the said District Chapelry of Saint Dunstan, Bedminster.

"2. And also all that contiguous portion of the said New Parish of Saint Martin, Knowle, which is bounded upon all sides as follows, that is to say, upon part of the east and upon the south by the said Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Christopher, Brislington, upon the west by the above described portion of the said Parish of Bedminster, and upon the remaining part of the east by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said Parish of Bedminster from the said New Parish of Saint Martin, Knowle, crosses the middle of Axbridge Road, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Axbridge Road for a distance of 5½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Salcombe Road, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Salcombe Road for a distance of 32 chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Martin, Knowle, from the said Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Christopher, Brislington."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the Patron and to the Incumbents of the Cures out of which it is intended that the District recommended in such Scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such Patron and Incumbents have respectively signified their assent to such Scheme:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Bristol.

WHEREAS the Minister of Health, after giving ten days' previous notice of his intention in that behalf, has, under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by subsequent enactments, made a Representation to His Majesty in Council that for the protection of the Public Health, the opening of any new burial ground in the Civil Parish of Cranbrook, in the County of Kent, save with the previous approval of the Minister of Health, should be prohibited and that burials

should be discontinued therein as hereinafter directed:

And whereas by an Order in Council of the 3rd October, 1935, Notice of such Representation was given, and it was ordered that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 14th day of November next, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that no new burial ground shall be opened in the said Civil Parish of Cranbrook save with the previous approval of the Minister of Health, and that burials shall be discontinued therein as follows, viz.:—

CRANBROOK.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Saint Dunstons', in the said Parish, and in the Churchyard attached thereto.

Provided that—

(a) in the walled grave now existing in the said Churchyard and belonging or reputed to belong to the Atkin-Roberts family, the burial may be allowed of the body of Malcolm Roberts Atkin-Roberts at his decease subject to the condition that the coffin buried in such grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented;

(b) in earthen graves now existing in the said Churchyard the burials may be allowed at their decease of the following relations of those already interred therein—Catherine Anne Horsley, Anne Potten, Isabella Sutherland, William Evenden, Kate Mackenzie, Emily Jessie Huntley, Harry Seward Baker, Louisa Elizabeth Dell, Emma Sarah Bartholomew Grieg, Amelia Gertrude Hardy, John Jones, Katherine Alice Wood, Jemima Jenner, Esther Jane Dobell, Walter Moore, Mary Beech, Horace Walter French, Elizabeth Taylor, Harriet Annie Horn, Sarah Ann Towner, Frederick Wright Neve and Florence Jane Neve, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall in any case be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.
