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Cadiz, Aug 12. N. S.

THE Galeons have begun to Unlade, tho' the Indulto which the Merchants are to pay the King is not yet agreed; and in the mean while, the Government keeps back near one third part in value of their Effects, till that Affair be fully settled between them and the Commissioners, who are sent hither from *Madrid* to Treat about it. The two Ships designed for *Carthage*, and the *Havana*, are sailed with two other Ships in their Company, who have Orders to bring home the Effects taken out of the Almirante of the last Flota, which was lost near the *Havana*, unless they are sent away before with the Fleet, which we expect shortly from the *West-Indies*. The *Sarah* Galley sailed from hence the first instant in Company of two Dutch Men of War, and about 14 Merchant Ships bound up the *Streights*. On the 11th, the Count *d'Etrees*, with 10 French Men of War, came to an Anchor in our Bay. This day the Centurion Man of War, Captain *Price* Commander, arrived here from *Genoa*, but last from *Malaga*, bound to *England*.

Madrid, August 20. The King of *Spain* is much better, having within this fortnight recovered his Strength very considerably: He does rest very well at Nights, Eats with a good Appetite, and is every day abroad to take the Air. He has made Don *Lewis d'Aroucha*, Maistre de Camp General of his Forces in *Catalonia*. The Duke of *Vraguas* is confirmed for 3 years in the Viceroyalty of *Sicily*. The Count *de Harrach*, Ambassador from the Emperor, intends in few days to take his Audience of Leave, and is to be succeeded by the young Count *de Harrach* his Son, who arrived here some time ago from *Vienna*. The Marquis *de Castel dos Rios* is not yet gone on his Embassy to *France*, and some think the Duke of *Moles* will be sent thither in his stead. The Marquis *de Harcourt*, Ambassador Extraordinary from that Crown, intends in a few days to make his publick Entry.

Rome, Aug. 12. The Difference between the Emperor and the Pope, concerning the Pretensions which his Imperial Majesty makes on the Principality of *Farnese*, and other Fiefs in the Ecclesiastical State, is not yet adjusted; and in the mean while the Court of *Rome* has forbid the Prince of *Chigi* to receive the Emperor's Investiture, or to own any other Sovereign than the Pope. The Bailly *de Noailles*, with a Squadron of 20 French Gallies came the 10th instant to *Civita Vecchia* from *Leghorne*, and intended to sail from thence in few days for *Naples*.

Milan, July 30. The Prince of *Vaudemont* (ouit Governor) went from hence on the 26th Instant, to meet the Duke of *Savoy* at *Turligo* near *Novarre*, on the Frontier of this Dutchy, where he entertained his Royal Highness very splendidly: And after having been sometime in Conference together the Duke of *Savoy* continued his Journey to the Baths at *St. Maurice*, and the Prince of *Vaudemont* returned hither.

Venice, Aug. 15. Signior *Aluizio Pizany* is appointed to go Ambassador from this Republick to the Court of *France*; and Signior *Elizzo* their present Ambassador at *Paris* has Orders to go with the like Character to *Rome*. Divers Ships with a Supply of Men, Money and Ammunition, sailed hence the last week for the *Levant*, under Convoy of two Men of War. By a Ship lately come in here, we have Advice, That the Pope's and the Maltese Gallies were seen the 10th of the last month off of *Corfou*, sailing towards the *Levant* to joyn the Venetian Fleet. The Letters from the *Morea* say, General *Cornaro* having received Advice, That the Ottoman Fleet was coming out of the *Dardanelles*, he sailed with the Ships and Gallies under his Command to meet them, upon which the Enemy retired, and the Venetians afterwards plundered the Island of *Lemnos*, and some other Islands in the *Archipelago*.

Dantzick, Aug. 20. We have an Account from *Lemberg*, That the King of *Poland* is arrived in the Neighbourhood of that place, and designed to make his Publick Entry there about the middle of this month; And that the Czar was also on his way thither to Confer with him, and intended from thence to continue his Journey to *Moscow*. In the mean while, all things are preparing for opening the Campagne; the Forces are marching to their Rendezvous, and Care is taken to supply the Magazines with the necessary Provisions and Ammunition. They write that the Tartars are assembling on the Frontiers, and make frequent Excursions, but for the most part with ill Success, falling frequently into the hands of some of our Forces that lie in those Parts, and particularly the Cossacks that are in Garrison at *Trinity Fort*, often surpris'd their Parties as they are returning home with their Booty. The Governor of the said Fort lately sent to the Crown General, a Prisoner they had taken, who was dispatched with Letters from the Commanding Bassa of *Caminice*, to the Visier, representing to him, that by reason the Garrison there is very numerous, he is very apprehensive their Provisions will fail, and desires, Care may be taken to Enable him to support a Siege, and that he may be timely relieved.

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Hambourg, Aug. 29. The Differences in this City between the Senate and the Burghers continue, both Parties seem much Animated against each other; and new Accidents happen frequently, which foment the Heats and Animositities between them. The Burghers having lately made great Complaints against some of the Senate for their Neglect in the Administration of the Publick Affairs, and particularly that a great number of Timber-Trees are missing in the Forest belonging to this City, of which they were Overseers, and could give no account, it has encouraged them to endeavour to make farther Discoveries of that Nature, which has been the chief Business of some of their late Meetings. The Observation of this day, which was appointed 12 years ago for an Anniversary Thanksgiving in this City, has been the occasion of a new Dispute. The Senate caused a Placact to be affixed, enjoying it's being observed; but the Burghers met yesterday, and ordered that this Custom should be wholly Abolished for the future. This morning they met again and continue still assembled. The King of *Denmark*, the Bishop of *Lubecke*, and the Duke of *Wolfembuttel*, being Commissioned by the Emperor for Adjusting the Differences between the Duke of *Sworin* and the Duke of *Strelitz*, about the Succession of the late Duke of *Mecklenberg-Gustraw*, which they both lay Claim to, their Ministers met here some days ago to enquire into their Pretensions; but the Duke of *Strelitz* having protested against the said Commission, no progress is yet made in that Affair. The Sieur *Leuthe*, who came hither lately from the *Hague*, where he has resided some time as Ambassador from the King of *Denmark*, is gone from hence to continue his Journey to *Copenhagen*.

Paris, Sept. 6. The French Court continues at *Compiègne*; some of the Forces were not yet arrived, but expected on the 4th, and the day following the King would take a General Review of the Army, which is said to consist in about 57000 men. Some Forts are built there, upon which they design to make a feigned Attack for the Entertainment of the Duke of *Burgundy*. The Earl of *Jersey*, Ambassador Extraordinary from the King of *England*, intends to morrow to give notice to the Introducer of Ambassadors of his arrival in the usual manner. The Sieur *Heemskirke*, and the Sieur *Orlyke*, Ambassadors Extraordinary from the *States General*, had Audience last week of the Duke and Dutchess of *Orleans*, the Duke de *Chartres*, and Madameoiselle d'*Orleans*, at *St. Cloud*. The 3d instant, the Envoy Extraordinary of *Cologne* had also Audience of the Duke and Dutchess of *Orleans*, and of Madameoiselle. Our Letters from *Turin* of the 30th past, say, The Duke of *Savoy* is returned there from the Baths at *St. Maurice*.

Newport in the Isle of Wight, Aug. 27. The Right Honorable the Lord *Cuts*, Governor of this Island, arrived here last night; And this Morning he was Complimented by the Mayor and Aldermen in their Formalities; after which, his Lordship went to *Carisbrooke-Castle*, where the Principal Gentlemen of the Island came to wait upon him.
