

Hambourg, Aug. 29. The Differences in this City between the Senate and the Burghers continue, both Parties seem much Animated against each other; and new Accidents happen frequently, which foment the Heats and Animosities between them. The Burghers having lately made great Complaints against some of the Senate for their Neglect in the Administration of the Publick Affairs, and particularly that a great number of Timber-Trees are missing in the Forest belonging to this City, of which they were Overseers, and could give no account, it has encouraged them to endeavour to make farther Discoveries of that Nature, which has been the chief Business of some of their late Meetings. The Observation of this day, which was appointed 12 years ago for an Anniversary Thanksgiving in this City, has been the occasion of a new Dispute. The Senate caused a Placact to be affixed, enjoying it's being observed; but the Burghers met yesterday, and ordered that this Custom should be wholly Abolished for the future. This morning they met again and continue still assembled. The King of *Denmark*, the Bishop of *Lubecke*, and the Duke of *Wolfembuttel*, being Commissioned by the Emperor for Adjusting the Differences between the Duke of *Sworin* and the Duke of *Strelitz*, about the Succession of the late Duke of *Mecklenberg-Gustraw*, which they both lay Claim to, their Ministers met here some days ago to enquire into their Pretensions; but the Duke of *Strelitz* having protested against the said Commission, no progress is yet made in that Affair. The Sieur *Leuthe*, who came hither lately from the *Hague*, where he has resided some time as Ambassador from the King of *Denmark*, is gone from hence to continue his Journey to *Copenhagen*.

Paris, Sept. 6. The French Court continues at *Compiègne*; some of the Forces were not yet arrived, but expected on the 4th, and the day following the King would take a General Review of the Army, which is said to consist in about 57000 men. Some Forts are built there, upon which they design to make a feigned Attack for the Entertainment of the Duke of *Burgundy*. The Earl of *Jersey*, Ambassador Extraordinary from the King of *England*, intends to morrow to give notice to the Introducer of Ambassadors of his arrival in the usual manner. The Sieur *Heemskirke*, and the Sieur *Orlyke*, Ambassadors Extraordinary from the *States General*, had Audience last week of the Duke and Dutchess of *Orleans*, the Duke de *Chartres*, and Madameoiselle d'*Orleans*, at *St. Cloud*. The 3d instant, the Envoy Extraordinary of *Cologne* had also Audience of the Duke and Dutchess of *Orleans*, and of Madameoiselle. Our Letters from *Turin* of the 30th past, say, The Duke of *Savoy* is returned there from the Baths at *St. Maurice*.

Newport in the Isle of Wight, Aug. 27. The Right Honorable the Lord *Cuts*, Governor of this Island, arrived here last night; And this Morning he was Complimented by the Mayor and Aldermen in their Formalities; after which, his Lordship went to *Carisbrooke-Castle*, where the Principal Gentlemen of the Island came to wait upon him.
