Rome, August 16. N. S. HE Pope has Abolished the Office of Cardinal Protector of Lorette, and has ordered that for the future, the three Cardinals of the Palace, with Signior Jacometti Auditor, and Signior Filippuci Under-Datary, hall manage the Affairs which relate to that Church. The Cardinal de Bouillon, having on the 10th instant received an Express from France, had Audience the next day of the Pope, and afterwards was a long time in Conference with Cardinal Spada. It is said, his Chief Business was to press this Court to come to a Conclusion in the Affair relating to the Archbishop of Cambray, and that the Pope has accordingly ordered, that the Congregation appointed to consider of the sime, which met but once a week, shall for the fuure hold their Conferences 3 times a week; however, it is much doubted whether this Matter will be so soon Decided as the French Desire, the Clergy here being divided in their Opinions

from Milan, That the Prince of Vandemont Governor of that Dutchy has given Orders to the Forces belonging to that State, to be ready to march in a few days to the Rendezvous which shall be assigned them, intending to Review them rowards the latter end of this month. Our Letters from Turin say, The Duke of Savoy's Forces continue encamped near Mondoui, and have been lately joined by Detachments from the feveral Garisons of Savoy and Piedmont; and it is hid, the Duke designs to go thither in a few days. They are at work in Repairing the City and Castle of Nice, and several pieces of Cannon, with a considerable quantity of Ammunition, have been sent thither from Savoy. We have received Advice, by a Felucca, which came hither some days ago from Marseilles, That the 14 French Gallies that have larely been upon the Spanish Coast, are re-

turned there, and are laid up; and that one of their Men of War, which is Cruifing against the Moors of Sally, has sent into that Port a Prize he had taken from them.

Legherne, Aug. 20. By Letters from Algiers dated the 7th of the last month, we have received an Account of the Death of Hadg Achmet their Dey, and that they had chosen Babba Hassan to be his! Succeffor, who fo foon as he was entred upon the Government, confirmed the Articles of Peace with

the English.

Dantzick, Aug. 26. Our last Letters from Ruslied, which are dated the 16th instant, bring an Account, That the King of Poland is arrived at Lemberg, having had an Enterview with the Czar of Mylocy at Rawa, near that place, who viewed his German Forces encamped in that Neighbourhood, with a great deal of Satisfaction, and having had several Conferences with the King, continued his Journey to Moscow. that every thing should be ready in 8 days for his Armies taking the Field, the German Forces which are marching thither from Hungary, being expected in that time. It is uncertain whether he will undertake the Siege of Caminiet, or march into the Province of Meldavia; the Inhabitants of which are in great Consternation upon the Advices they have received, that the Port has ordered the Tartars to Plunder and Ravage the Country, because of the Inclination they have shewed to quit their Subjection to the Turks, and to put themselves under the Protection of Poland.

Strasburg, Aug. 28. The Marquis d'Uxelles and the Sieur de Vauban, Chief Ingenier of France, having Visited the several Fortified Places that belong to the French in Lower Alface, and having given Directions for the necessary Repairs to be made there, they returned hither this week, and are fince gone to Brifac to halten the Demolishing of the Bridge, and other Works near that place, in order to it's being delivered up to the Germans. They talk of Building a new Fort over-against Brisac, as likewise several other little Forts along the Rhine, of which a Draught having been senc to the French Court, and approved, it is be-lieved this Work will be begun in a short time. We hear from Nancy, That the French have Evacuated that place, having according to the Treaty of Ryswick, demolished all the Fortifications of the new City, but the Bastions and Ramparts of the old City are left standing; and the Duke of Lorraine has the liberty to enclose the new City with a Wall. He designs shortly to Establish his Residence there, as did his Predecessors; and great Preparations are making for his Reception.

Hamburg, Sept. 2. The Senate and Burghers of this City continue hitherto in the same Oppofition one to the other. The feveral Meetings they have had of late, in which it was hoped they would have entred upon such Measures as might have given an end to these Differences, have had a contrary Effect, and the Resolutions that were taken in them were rather such as served to foment the Animosities between them, than tended any way to a Reconciliation. They were severally assembled on the 29th past, and Sate till the next day at Noon, but all their time was spent in fruitless Debates, and they adjourned to Thursday the 11th instant. There is no Talk of Renewing the Conferences which were held some time ago at Pinnemberg, for Settling the Matters in Difference between the King of Dmmark and the Duke of Holstein Gostorp; And in the mean time, 'tis said, that Endeavours are used at the Court of Sweden, between the Ministers of that Crown, and the Baron Juel, Ambassador from the King of Denmark, to Adjust this Affair. They write from Stockholme, The Duke of Halftein is gone from thence with his Princess on their Journey to Helstein; And that the Count d'Avaux was preparing for his return home, Count Guiscard, who is to succeed him, being expected in a short time. Our Letters from Berlin say, The Baron of Lottum is made Governor-General of the Country of Gleve, since his arrival at Lemberg, has given Orders, and Count Dmo, Great Marshal of the Court in
