

Extraordinary Supply of 1200000 Florins which the States of *Brabant* have lately granted to the King of *Spain*. The Prince of *Nassau*, Governor of *Guelderland*, is come hither upon some Difference between him and the States of that Province, touching certain Revenues which he Demands, as belonging to his Employment, and which were enjoyed by his Predecessor. We have Advice from *Furnes* and *Ipres*, That the French are making some Alterations in the Fortifications of those Places.

*Loo*, Sept. 15. The Dutch Troops are marching from their several Garisons to the General Review near *Arnhem*; They are all expected there by the 17th of this month, and the next day His Majesty intends to begin the Review, which may be over in 3 or 4 days, and then the said Troops will be sent back to their Garisons. The whole will consist in about 30 Battalions of Foot, and about as many Squadrons of Horse and Dragoons. Quarter-Master General *Dopff* has by the King's Order been to view the Ground where the Camp is to be, of which he has made his Report to His Majesty, and is returned thither with His Majesty's Directions thereupon. The Count *de Tallard*, came hither the 6th instant from *Utrecht*, to which place he returned again the 11th. The Earl of *Albemarle* is gone this morning from hence to *Arnhem*, with His Majesty's further Orders relating to the Review; his Lordship being to Command there as Colonel General of the Swiss. To morrow His Majesty goes for *Dieren*, to be nearer the Camp, that Place being within 6 or 7 miles of it. The Baron *Schutz*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of *Zell*, is gone for *Zell*, to acquaint His Master with His Majesty's Resolution to make him a visit towards the end of this month; And on Thursday next, the King's Horses are ordered to go hence to the *Gour*, the Duke of *Zell's* Hunting-House.

*Hague*, Sept. 16. The young Prince of *Nassau Saarbruck* is gone from hence to wait on His Majesty at *Arnhem*; and it is said, Count *Tallard* the French Ambassador will also go thither from *Utrecht*. The States of *Holland* and *Westfrize* assembled here last Wednesday, and have under their Consideration several Affairs relating to the Publick Revenues. The Project of making the Rivers of *Issell* and the *Lower Rhine* Navigable, goes on, and the Undertakers will begin this Work in a short time, according to what has been agreed on in the Conferences held lately between the Deputies of the *States General* and those of the Provinces of *Guelderland* and *Utrecht*.

*Paris*, Sept. 17. N. S. The Court continues at *Compiègne*, which place the King designs to leave the 22d instant, to lie that night at *Chantilly*, and to return the 24th to *Versailles*. The Count *d'Estres* is arrived at *Thoulon* with the Squadron of Ships under his Command, which sailed some time ago from *Brest*. Cardinal *de Bonzi* went from hence on Monday last to be present at the Assembly of the States of *Languedoc*, in which he is to Preside as Archbishop of *Narbonne*. Letters from *Madrid* of the 30th of the last month, give an account, That the day before the King of *Spain* had another of his fainting Fits, which lasted about half an hour; That the night following he slept very well, and the next day Dined with a good Appetite, and dispatched Business with the Secretary of State as at other times.

*Portsmouth*, Sept. 7. The Squadron of His Majesty's Ships designed for the *Mediterranean*, under the Command of Vice-Admiral *Aylmer*, lie ready to Sail with the first fair Wind.
