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Warsaw, Sept. 5. N. S.

Our last Letters from *Lemberg* give an account, That the King of *Poland* has appointed the *Sieur Marachowsky*, Palatine of *Posen*, to be his Ambassador and Plenipotentiary for the Treaty of Peace with the *Turks*, who is accordingly preparing for his Journey. The King intends to go in few days to *Halitz*, the General Rendezvous of his Army, to which Place the Forces are marching in the mean time; and the Train of heavy Artillery, with several Mortars, and a great quantity of Bombs and Carcasses, is sent thither from *Lemberg*; which gives occasion to think, that the King intends to bombard *Caminiec*, in case the Weather will not admit of a formal Siege. It is much discourfured, that the Army will take their Winter-Quarters in *Moldavia* and *Valachia*, at once to ease the Kingdom of *Poland*, and to defend those Provinces; which, were they secured from the Ravages they are threatned with by the *Turks* and *Tartars*, in case they quit their Subjection to them, would soon put themselves under the Protection of this Crown: And 'tis said the Crown-Treasurer will be sent to the Princes of *Moldavia* and *Valachia*, to adjust this Affair with them: And if this Project goes on, 'tis talk'd that the King will continue during the Winter in *Rusland*, and will call a Diet at *Lemberg*. They write from the Frontiers, That a strong Party of the Garison of *Caminiec*, came lately by night, and took away some Cartel near *Trinity-Fort*. The Garison whereof was drawn up in order to pursue them; but it was not thought convenient to do it in the night-time, for fear of a Surprize; so the Enemy had the leisure to get away with their Booty.

We have an account from *Lithuania*, That pursuant to the Agreement made here in *July* last, between *Pr. Sapieha* and his Adherents on the one part, and the *Sieur Oginsky's* Deputies, in behalf of himself and the discontented Gentlemen of *Lithuania*, on the other, the Lesser Diers of that Dutchy met, and chose their Representatives, who had a General Meeting at *Wilda*, where it was expected they would have approved and confirmed the said Agreement, as tending to secure the future Peace and Quiet of that Country; but, on the contrary, the first thing they did was to protest unanimously against the same, as prejudicial to their Rights and Liberties; declaring, That the Deputies of *Oginsky* had acted contrary to their Powers and Instructions. And, That a particular Party sending their Deputies to accommodate a private Quarrel, had no Right to give them Power to make a Treaty, the Contents of which concern the whole Dutchy. After which, they agreed on a Sum of Money to be raised in the several *Weywoodships* for the Subsistence of the Army of *Lithuania*; and resolved to meet again in a General Diet at *Grodno*, on the 15th of *October* next, to make a full Settlement of the Affairs of that Coun-

try. In the mean time, the discontented Party continue in Arms, under the Command of one *Zaranska*, whom they have chosen to be their Leader, in the room of the *Sieur Oginsky*.

Vienna, Sept 10. The Imperial Court is gone to *Ebersdorf*, to pass a few Days there. The Conferences between the Emperor's Ministers and those of *Poland*, *Venice*, and *Muscovy*, touching the Negotiations of Peace, are continued, and a great Progress has been made in this Affair. The Emperor's Plenipotentiaries will set out in few days for the Place of Treaty, where they expect to meet one from the King of *Poland*, who will go thither by the way of *Transilvania*. The Heer *Hop*, Envoy Extraordinary from the States-General, arrived here the 6th instant, and has had Audience of his Imperial Majesty. Admiral *Assenberg* will go hence in two or three days, to Command the Fleet on the *Danube*. Some new-raisd Companies are sent from hence by Water to *Hungary*, to be incorporated into the Regiment of *Thierheim*. Our last Advices from the Army, which are of the 2d of this Month, say, That on the 31st past they left *Kobila*, and passing over the Morafs of *Willowar*, encamped near *Titul*; the next day was employed in making a Bridge over the *Theysse*: And the day these Letters came away, they designed to have passed that River; but there fell a great quantity of Rain in the night, which so swell'd the same, that their Bridge proved by much too short, and this delayed their farther march. General *Palfi*, who went some days before with a Party of 1400 Horse, to make an Incurfion towards *Temeswaer*, was not yet returned. But a Party of *Hussats* had brought in a Captain of the Artillery, and some other *Turks* belonging to the Garrison of that Place, whom they had made Prisoners near *Banzona*; the said Captain was dispatched to *Belgrade* by the Governor of *Temeswaer*, to desire a Supply of Money and Provisions. He said the Garison was 12000 Men strong, under the Command of 7 *Bassas*, and had about 72 Pieces of Cannon; and that the late great Rains had filled the Ditches of that Place with Water. We have no fresher advice of the motions of the *Turkish* Army, than what you had an account of in our last. They write from *Transilvania*, That a Conspiracy has been discover'd of some Soldiers quartered in that Country, who had agreed to kill their Officers: But the execution of their Design being timely prevented, the principal Authors thereof were seized, and had suffered exemplary Punishment.

Frankfort, September 17. The *Sieur Obrecht* is expected here towards the beginning of the next Month, being appointed by the French King to confer with the Heer *Zachman*, the Elector Palatine's Minister, touching the Pretensions of the Dutches of *Orleans*. Several Recruits were sent from hence some days ago, to the Imperial Army in *Hungary*. We hear from *Strasbourg*, That the French have taken another Review of that Garison, and have disbanded Four Men

mors out of each Company. We expect daily an account of the Evacuation of *Brissac*.

Brussels, Sept. 21. The Elector of *Bavaria* has been present at several Meetings of the General Officers and Principal Magistrates of this City, wherein they have agreed upon the Regulation of the Forces designed to be kept on foot for the defence of the Spanish Netherlands, which is sent to *Madrid*, for the King of *Spain's* Approbation. His Electoral Highness went this day to Hunt at *Marimont*. Mr. Hill, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of *England*, is gone to wait upon his Majesty at *Loz*. The Prince of *Serclas Tilly*, Master de Camp General, and the Duke of *Bracciano*, General of the Artillery, will go from hence in a few days for *Holland*, to finish the Business about the Ammunition and Provisions which the States-General have engaged to furnish for our Frontier Garisons.

Loz, Sept. 23. On Saturday the 20th instant His Majesty Hunted the Stag, and lay that Night at *Dieren*, and the next Day returned to this Place. The same Day the Prisoner of *Holland* came hither from the *Hague* to wait on His Majesty. The King continues his Resolution of setting out this day fevnight for *Cell*, and has sent Monsieur *Pofern*, Lieutenant Colonel of the Horse-Guards, with a Compliment to the Bishop of *Munster*, on the occasion of His Majesty's passing through his Country. Sir *Joseph Williamson*, His Majesty's Ambassador at the *Hague*, is hourly expected here from thence.

Hague, Sept. 23. The States of *Holland* and *West-frize* are adjourned for some time. The States-General have resolved to borrow a considerable Sum of Money for the Payment of the Arrears due on account of the Expences of the late War. The Electors of *Bavaria* came lately hither from *Brussels*; and having staid at this Place 2 or 3 days, went to see *Leyden*, *Amsterdam*, and the other Principal Cities of this Country: After which, she intends to return to *Brussels*.

Paris, Sept. 24. N. S. The Court having been diverted at *Compeigne* with several Entertainments, and among others with the Representation of a formal Battel, and several Attacks and Skirmishes, the Forces began to decamp the 22d, in order to march back to their respective Quarters. The King left the Camp the same day, and lay that night at *Chantilly*, where he remained the day following, and is expected this evening at *Versailles*. His Journey to *Fontainbleau* holds for the 3d of the next Month. Preparations are making for the Marriage of Mademoiselle and the Duke of *Lorraine*, which will be celebrated in a short time.
