

become effective upon the vacation of the said Benefice of Clerkenwell, Saint Philip, by the said Henry Derwent Hinde, if the said Frederick Edward Palmer Langton with the approval of the Bishop of London shall consent to become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice:

"And whereas it has been represented to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and it appears to us to be expedient that provision should be made for accelerating the said union and that to that end provision should be made for compensating the said Henry Derwent Hinde in the event of his vacating the said Benefice of Clerkenwell, Saint Philip, in order to accelerate the union:

"Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Arthur Foley, Bishop of London (who has signed this Scheme in token thereof and also in token of his approval of the said Frederick Edward Palmer Langton as the first Incumbent of the United Benefice), and with the consent of the said Frederick Edward Palmer Langton (who has signed this Scheme in token thereof and also in token of his consent to become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice), do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:—

"1. That the union provided for by the Original Order shall take effect immediately upon the vacation of the said Benefice of Clerkenwell, Saint Philip, by the said Henry Derwent Hinde, and the said Frederick Edward Palmer Langton if he is then Incumbent of the said Benefice of Clerkenwell, The Holy Redeemer, shall become and be the first Incumbent of the United Benefice.

"2. That if within the period of three calendar months immediately following the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme the said Henry Derwent Hinde shall by institution to another Benefice vacate the said Benefice of Clerkenwell, Saint Philip, in order that the union provided for in the Original Order may thereupon take effect there shall be paid to him by the Incumbent of the United Benefice out of the revenues thereof so long as he, the said Henry Derwent Hinde, shall continue to hold such other Benefice, an annual sum of £40 if in our opinion the annual income of such other Benefice amounts to not more than £410 but if in our opinion the annual income of such other Benefice exceeds £410 then the annual sum to be paid by the Incumbent of the United Benefice as aforesaid shall be the amount necessary to raise the annual income of such other Benefice to £450 and for the recovery of the said annual sum the said Henry Derwent Hinde shall have the same remedies and powers as if the same were a pension awarded to him under the provisions of the Incumbents' Resignation Acts, 1871 and 1887.

"Provided always that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Measure, or of any other Measure of the National Assembly of the Church of England, or of any Act of Parliament."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have been duly published in accordance with the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, and Notices have been transmitted to the persons or bodies entitled under the same Measure to receive Notice requiring any objections to such draft Scheme to be stated or transmitted in writing to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the Statutory Rules applicable to proceedings under the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923:

And whereas the prescribed time has elapsed and no such objections have been so stated or transmitted to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners:

And whereas public notice of the certification to His Majesty in Council of the said Scheme and the consent thereto in writing of the Bishop of London has been duly given in the manner and within the time prescribed in the Statutory Rules aforesaid:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order and direct that the said Scheme and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the date when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Measure.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of London.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 37, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme bearing date the 2nd day of April, 1936, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 37, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for authorising the sale and disposal of certain property situate in the County of Middlesex now vested in us:

"Whereas the property particulars whereof are set forth in the Schedule hereunder written is now vested in us not subject to any outstanding beneficial lease or grant but in possession and we are desirous of selling the same or some portion thereof for the improvement of our Common Fund:

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty that we may be authorised and empowered to sell or dispose of and duly to transfer or convey from time to time all or part of the said property described in the said Schedule for such consideration as shall appear to us to be just and reasonable.
