DEAN AND CANONS OF ST. GEORGE'S CHAPEL, WINDSOR.

To His Most Excellent Majesty King Edward the Eighth,

May it please Your Majesty,-

WE your Majesty's loyal and devoted Servants, the Dean and Canons of your Free Chapel of Saint George within your Castle of Windsor, present our humble duty. We beg to offer to Your Majesty our respectful and sincere condolences on the lamented death of Your Majesty's beloved Father, our late most gracious Sovereign King George the Fifth. In common with all other His subjects throughout His Empire we shall ever keep in grateful

remembrance His unfaltering devotion to duty and His unfailing care for all sorts and conditions of His people. But we of the Chapel of Saint George have also especial cause for inscribing His honoured Name on our Roll of Benefactors, inasmuch as the Restoration of our ancient House of God was powerfully aided alike by His personal munificence and by His interest and solicitude which encouraged the liberality of others.

WE beg likewise to present our dutiful homage and respectful congratulations to Your Majesty on Your Accession to the Throne. The Name borne by Your Majesty has deep significance for us. It was by King Edward the Third that the Most Noble Order of the Garter was founded; it was by command of King Edward the Fourth that the building of St. George's Chapel was begun. Your Majesty's Presence in Your Garter Stall on an early day in Your Reign assured us anew of Your Own high regard for the Shrine in which Your Majesty's Predecessors have joined with our College in the worship of Almighty God. To Him our prayers will be made daily that Your Reign may be long and prosperous, bringing peace among the nations, happiness to Your own subjects throughout the Empire, and the continuance of His Divine Blessing to strengthen and support You in the discharge of Your manifold responsibilities.
