

And whereas by virtue of the Coinage Act, 1870, it is lawful for Us with the advice of Our Privy Council, by proclamation to revoke or alter any proclamation previously made under that Act:

And whereas it is expedient that the silver coins which under section four of the Coinage Act, 1870 as set out in the Proclamation and amended by the Coinage Act, 1920, are legal tender should no longer be legal tender in Our Bahama Islands for a payment of an amount exceeding forty shillings:

Now, therefore, We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, in pursuance of the said recited provisions and of all other powers enabling Us in this behalf do hereby proclaim, direct and ordain as follows:—

1. As from the 1st day of November, 1936, the silver coins which, under section four of the Coinage Act, 1870 as set out in the Proclamation and amended by the Coinage Act, 1920, are legal tender shall in our Bahama Islands be legal tender for a payment of an amount not exceeding forty shillings, but for no greater amount, and accordingly so much of the Proclamation as provides that the said silver coins shall be legal tender for a payment of an unlimited amount shall, as from that date, cease to have effect as respects Our Bahama Islands.

2. This Proclamation may be cited as the Bahama Islands (Silver Coinage) Proclamation, 1936.

Given at Our Court at Buckingham Palace, this Twenty-seventh day of October, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and thirty-six, and in the First year of Our Reign.
