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Warsaw, Sept. 30. N. S.

OUR last Letters from the Army give an Account, That a Council of War being held, it was judged impracticable to execute any Enterprize of Moment this Campagne, the Season being so far advanced; and that the King had thereupon resolved to send his Troops into Winter-Quarters, and to post part of them about *Caminiec*, so as to block up that Place during the Winter, in order to lay Siege to it early the next Spring, in case a Peace with the Turks be not concluded before that time. The King designs to go in a short time to *Lithuania*, to settle the Affairs of that Duchy, and afterwards to call a General Diet to meet at *Warsaw*.

From the Imperial Camp near *Berzkerk*, Septemb. 22. Prince *Eugene* of *Savoy* marched some days ago from the Camp with part of the German Horse, to intercept a Convoy which he had Advise the Turks were sending to *Temiswar*, and advanced into the Neighbourhood of that Place, where having posted his Forces in a Wood, he sent out a Party of Hussars to get Intelligence of the Enemy's Motions; But one of this Party deserted, and gave notice of his Design to the Enemy, who thereupon sallied out of the Town with 2000 Horse, and fell upon our advanced Guards; Prince *Eugene* being informed thereof, sent several Squadrons of Horse to their Relief, who soon beat the Enemy back. In this Action divers of the Turks were killed and taken Prisoners, and the Germans likewise suffered some loss; and Count *Esterhazy*, a Captain in the Regiment of *Passy*, venturing too far among the Enemy, as our Forces were in pursuit of them, was taken Prisoner. Prince *Eugene* continued there some time, but hearing no News of the said Convoy, and judging that upon notice of his March 'twas countermand'd, he returned to the Camp the 20th instant. We have Advice from the Turkish Army, that they continue near *Belgrade*, that the Convoy designed for *Temiswar* halted on this side the *Danube*: expecting further orders, and that the Turks have left off building a Bridge over the *Sava*, which was only a feint to draw our Forces that way, to the end the said Convoy might march without any Disturbance to *Temiswar*.

Vienna, Octob. 1. My Lord *Paget's* Secretary set out from hence this day for *Belgrade* with an Answer to the Message he brought from thence, and to acquaint the Turkish Ministers, that the Ambassadors from the Emperor and the Republick of *Venice* are ready to depart for *Peter-Waradin*; whether they intend to begin their Journey in a day or two; And the Czar of *Muscovy's* Plenipotentiary is gone before. Signior *Loredano*, who is come to reside here as Ambassador from *Venice*, is preparing for his Publick Audience, which he will have in a few days. Signior *Paulucci*, who has resided in *Poland* with the Character of Nuncio Extraordinary from the Pope, is come hither to treat with this Court about the Fiefs in *Italy*, and as soon as that Affair is adjust'd, he will return to *Rome*. Some Recruits are pass'd by this place going to the Imperial Army in *Hungary*, which according to our last Advices from thence continues encamped near *Berzkerk*, and the Turks near *Belgrade*.

Strasbourg, Octob. 8. The French have removed all the Artillery and Ammunition that were a *Brisac* to *Strasbourg*, but have yett lined no day for the Evacuation of that Place. The Sieur *Obricht* is daily expected here from *Strasbourg*, to confer with the Elector Palatine's Ministers who are already arrived at this Place concerning the Pretensions of the Duke of *Orleans* on the Palatinate. The Diet of the Circle of the *Upper Rhine* is to meet shortly to consider of the Supplies to be given for maintaining the

Garison of *Philipsbourg*, and what Quota of Men each City shall furnish for Garisoning that Place, the Forces that are there at present being only lent by the Emperor and the Elector of *Mentz*.

Gour, Octob. 12. On Wednesday last, in the evening, the Elector of *Hanover* arrived here with his youngest Brother Prince *Ernest Augustus*, and they waited on the King, who received them with great Marks of Esteem and Affection. Last Friday my Lord *Lexington* came to this Place from *England*. Mr. *Steepley*, His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the Elector of *Brandenbourg*, who came hither some days ago from *Berlin*, and brought Letters to His Majesty from that Elector, is returned with a Compliment from His Majesty to His Electoral Highness. The King has received a Compliment from the Duke of *Wolfenbuttel* by General *Bernstorff*, and from the Landgrave of *Hesse-Cassel* by Monsieur *Terteau*. His Majesty intends to go from hence on Friday next to *Cell*, where His Majesty will continue 2 or 3 days, and then return to *Loo*.

Brussels, Octob. 12. The Count de *Tirimont*, and the Sieur *Brockhoven*, who are appointed on the part of His Catholic Majesty to Treat with the French Commissioners for Regulating the Limits of the Dominions of the two Crowns in the *Netherlands*, have received full Powers from *Madrid* in the Form which the French desired, and they will go in a few days to *Lisse* to renew the Conference there, which were discontinued by reason of some Defects in their former Commissions. The Elector of *Bavaria* is gone to *Mons* to view the Fortifications of that Place. The Commissaries of War are sent to take a Review of the Spanish Forces in the several Places where they are Quartered in the *Netherlands*.

Hague, Octob. 14. The States of *Holland* and *West-Friseland* are to meet to-morrow. The Great Council of War, which has been assembled here some time, separated yesterday for a few days. Monsieur *d'Orlyke* is shortly expected home from his Embassy to the French Court. The Count de *Frise*, Ambassador from *Denmark*, is preparing for his Publick Entry, which he designs to make this week. The Count de *Denhof* is expected here in a short time from *Berlin*, being to reside at the Court of *England* as Envoy from the Elector of *Brandenbourg* in the Room of the Baron *d'Obrezinsky*, who is recalled.

Paris, Octob. 15. N. S. The Marriage of Mademoiselle to the Duke of *Lorraine* was celebrated at *Fontainebleau* the 13th Instant, the Duke *d'Elbeuf* being that Prince's Proxy. The same evening Mademoiselle returned hither, accompanied by the Duke and Dutcheff of *Orleans*, the Duke *d'Elbeuf*, and the Princeff of *Lisbonne*. The two latter are to accompany her in her Journey to *Lorraine*, which she will begin to-morrow; An Officer, and 30 of the King's Guards, are ordered to attend her, and the King defrays the Charges of her Journey through his Dominions. The Count *d'Armagnac*, the Chevalier de *Lorraine*, and Count *Marfan*, who are all of the family of *Lorraine*, are gone Post, in order to be with the Duke of *Lorraine* when he meets his Dutcheff, which will be at *Barr*.

Dublin, October 1. This day the House of Commons read for the first time a Bill for Confirming the Estates and Possessions held and enjoyed under the Acts of Settlement and Explanation. Then the Committee appointed to draw up their Address of Thanks to the Lords Justices for their Speech, presented the same, which was read and agreed to by the House; They ordered such of the Members as are of the Privy-Council to wait on the Lords Justices, and know when they would be attended with it. 'Twas ordered, That Leave should be given to bring in Heads for two Bills; One for Enlarging the Gate
