

the Dutchess of Cell, who came hither from the Court two days before. This day His Majesty was entertained with Hunting the Wild Boar about a League from this Place. The Electress of Hannover; with the Electoral Prince and the Princess his Sister, arrived here this day from H. S. to wait on His Majesty. His Majesty intends to go from hence on Tuesday next, and to be the Friday following at Loo, where the Elector of Bavaria is expected soon after to make His Majesty a Visit.

Brussels, Octob. 19. The Elector of Bavaria has resolved to increase the Number of the Forces to be kept on Foot for the Defence of the Spanish Netherlands, by taking a strong Body of the Forces of Brandenburg and his own into the Service of Spain. His Electoral Highness intends in a few days to go and make His Majesty of Great-Britain a Visit at Loo. Monsieur Dyckvelt sets out to-morrow for Holland; and Monsieur d'Odyke is shortly expected here from Paris.

Hague, Octob. 21. The States of Holland and Westfriseland met here last Wednesday, and have since had under Consideration the Account they received from the Dutch Commissioners at the French Court, of their Proceedings in relation to the settling the Tariffa, and other Matters of Trade, wherein hitherto they have made but little Progress. Monsieur Goes, who is appointed to reside at the Court of Denmark on the part of the States-General, is preparing for his Journey thither. Two Plaçaets have been published here, one to forbid the Exportation of Corn, and the other the Distilling of Spirits from it.

Paris, Octob. 18. N. S. The Ceremony of Mademoiselle's Marriage with the Duke of Lorraine was celebrated at Fontainebleau the 13th Instant; The same Evening the Dutchess of Lorraine came hither in the King's Coach, and was lodged in the Palace-Royal, and attended by the King's Servants. The 15th, the Provost of the Merchants and the Echevins waited on her Highness, and having complimented her on her Marriage, made her the Presents usual on such Occasions. The 16th, the Duke and Dutchess of Orleans, and the Duke de Chartres, took their Leaves of her Highness and return'd to Fontainebleau; and in the Afternoon she began her Journey to Lorraine, being accompanied by the Princess of Lillebonne; and attended by the Sieur des Granges one of the Masters of the Ceremonies, with divers Officers of the King's Household, and a Party of the Guards du Corps, who are to wait on her to the Frontiers.

Barbadoes, Aug. 4. The Honourable Mr. Grey, His Majesty's Governor of this Island, arrived here the 26th of the last Month, having been saluted by the Cannon from the Forts and Castles before which he passed. Upon his coming to an Anchor, he was complimented by the Council and Assembly. The next day he came ashore, the Men of War and the Forts firing all the while, and upon his Landing the Council waited upon him, and conducted him (Major Garth's Independent Company and some Militia Horse being drawn up in his Passage) to the Council-Chamber, where his Commission was read, and the usual Oaths were administer'd to him, and to the Members of the Council; after which, they entertained him at Dinner. In the Evening the Governor, attended by several of the Council, went to Mr. Bond's House two Miles from the Town, where he will continue till the House intended for him be fitted up. On Tuesday the 2d instant the Assembly met, and attended him in the Council-Chamber, and Mr. Maxwell their Speaker made a Speech, expressing great Duty

and Loyalty to His Majesty, and congratulating the Governor's safe Arrival.

Whitehall, Octob. 13. This day was published a Proclamation of the Lords Justices, for putting the Laws in Execution against Forestalling, Regrating, and Engrossing of Corn.
